

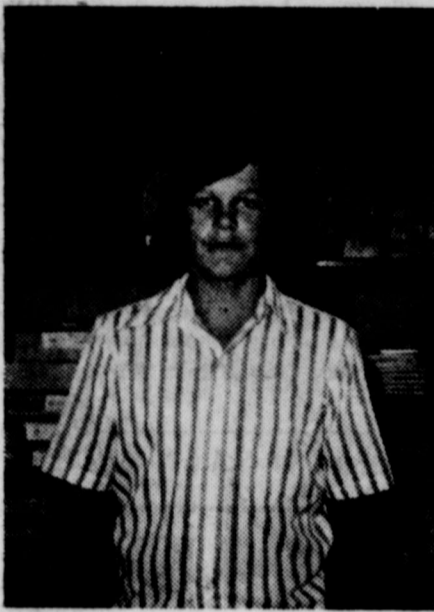

They built the hospital from scratch into the place so many of us depended on to receive sympathetic and efficient help when we needed it. But now it is closed, following their untimely deaths.

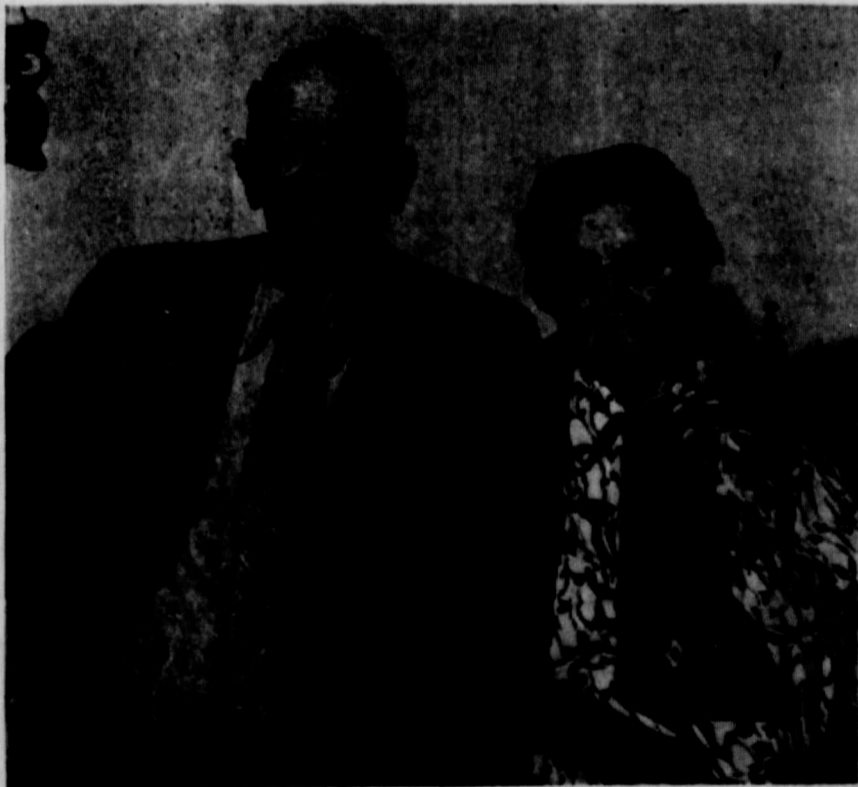
Rex and Ann Harris have assured us that they are doing their utmost to get somebody to take over and re-open the hospital, even at a great financial loss to them. They are deeply concerned that Bronte does not have a doctor and that they had to close the hospital.

Then, too, there are many side effects which affect the community. It had one of the biggest payrolls in our town and some 32 persons were put out of work by the closing.

There is also another matter with which we are deeply concerned. Hurley Pharmacy has always been dependent to some degree on the Bronte Hospital's patients for its business. We certainly don't want to lose this fine family and the efficient service they render to our community. We talked with Elmer Wednesday afternoon and he said they have every intention of keeping the pharmacy open and operating for us. But, we must all realize, there has to be some business or he cannot remain open to serve the Bronte community.

We hope and pray that the hospital can be re-opened. But until this comes about, we would like to

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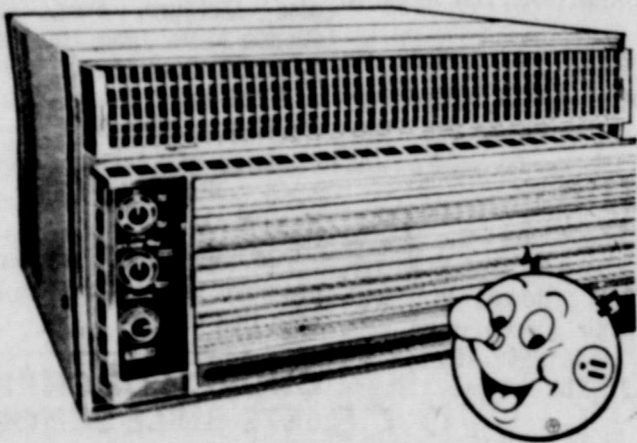

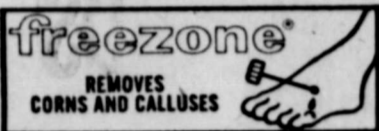

Soil Stewardship Week May 23-May 30, 1976

**SOIL STEWARDSHIP  
WEEK OBSERVANCE  
SET FOR MAY 23-30**

Soil Stewardship Week will be observed this year from May 23 to 30. Conservationists all over the nation will be observing progress in the conservation effort.

This country is blessed with vast supplies of land and water. Nowhere else on earth is there such an extent of productive soil with a temperate climate accompanied generally with bountiful rains and snow.

Along with clean air and sunshine, they are the requisites of life and need to be safeguarded carefully as the treasures they are. We need their produce here, as do many other countries throughout the world.

Once we had more than we do now. But during our early years and up to the beginnings of the nation wide soil conservation program in the 30's, we lost millions of tons of irreplaceable topsoil from millions of acres. Many of the land users plowed badly, used the land too intensively, and stripped grass and trees from land wholly unsuited for cultivation. The results were widespread sheet erosion, destructive gullying, and dust storms with every year of drought.

During the past 40 years, through the efforts of many conservation programs, our record has improved sharply. On the basis of present land use and treatment, about 40 per cent of our productive land is protected against waste and damage. This means approximately 60 per cent is in need of conservation treatment, which may include conversion from cultivation to less intensive uses.

The erosion problem on our cropland has been aggravated in recent years by the large demands for agricultural production for both domestic and export markets. Larger farms with larger machinery are being farmed more intensively and often with less regard for the safety of the land itself. A substantial acreage not suitable for cultivation is being put to the plow.

So far, soil conservation throughout most of the United States has been based on the voluntary participation of landowners in the work of Soil Stewardship. Many conservation leaders are asking whether new inducements are needed to deal with the spoilers. Are heavy soil losses a price of adequate farm income? There must be a better way.

As we enter the third century of our nation, we begin on the unfinished work of America. The needs of the land are as diverse as they are urgent.

Soil Stewardship material has been given to the churches in the district. This observance is being sponsored locally by the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.
