## Annual County Fair Set For Next Month

Plans are progressing right along for the annual Coke County Fair which will be held at the Coke County Recreation and Show Center in Robert Lee. The theme chosen for this year is "Century III—Forward Ho." The date set for the fair will be Sept. 16-19.

## KRUEGER TO TOUR IN THIS AREA

On Aug. 14 Congressman Bob Krueger will tour the Runnels Soil Conservation District. This district serves all or parts of Runnels, Nolan, Tom Green, Taylor, Coke and Coleman Counties.

Beginning in Rowena at 8:30 a.m. Krueger will tour the area throughout the morning with soil conservation district officials, examining the work of their programs such as waterways, brush management, terrace work and irrigation.

Shortly after noon, Krueger will speak at a barbecue in Norton. At that meeting, the Soil Conservation District will elect its new directors.

Krueger said, "I appreciate being invited to examine the conservation projects by the people who work for the Soil Conservation District. I have always supported their work, and this will give me a chance to see their efforts first hand."

"There has been an effort in recent years," he continued, "to cut back funding for these projects, but the work they do in land management and conservation is far too valuable to rural areas to eliminate. I intend to continue my support of their programs."

## COKE HAS FIFTH SCREWORM CASE

Coke County had its fifth case of screwworms last week. A sample submitted by Royce Fancher from his place nine miles north of Bronte was confirmed as being screwworms.

The last previous case confirmed in the county was found four weeks ago on Teddy Pitcock's place near Sanco. Statewide and area wide, the numbers have increased following the early July rains. All operators are encouraged to be on the lookout for additional cases in this area. Also, operators are requested to send a sample of all flesh eating maggots to the Mission Laboratory for identification. This lets the program administrators know where the worms are occurring and also will insure receiving drops of male sterile flies.

Collecting and submitting samples plus spraying all livestock will help support the program.

The fair has become a big event for Coke County with persons from all over the county exhibiting their goods, of many varieties.

There will be a variety of exhibits in both the Youth and Adult Divisions, including canned foods, regular baked goods, clothing and needlepoint, agriculture or horticulture, crafts, art, hobbies and floriculture. There will also be commercial exhibits.

Plans are being made to have the Beau and Belle Coronation again this year along with youth activities and a Saturday evening program.

Everyone is asked to help make this year's Fair a big success—maybe even bigger and better than last year's exhibition, which was described by many as "the best one yet."

Persons all over the county are urged to get their entries ready and make plans to attend the big four day event.

## SWINE FLU VACCINE TO BE GIVEN NEXT WEEK IN COUNTY

Swine flu vaccine will be administered next week to citizens of Coke County. Mrs. Edward M. Cumbie of Bronte is coordinator for the program, appointed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

The vaccine will be administered Aug. 20 at the Bronte City Hall from 6-8 p.m.

Robert Lee residents may take the shots Aug. 21 from 6-8 p.m. at the West Coke County Hospital.

This is a voluntary program for everyone in the area, 25 years and up. Older citizens are especially urged to take part in the program. There is no charge for the service.

Living in Century III was the theme of the meeting the Texas Association of Extension Home Economists held Aug. 4-7 in Kerrville. County Extension Agents from Districts 7 and 13 were the host districts. The meeting was held in the Inn of the Hills.

Among the speakers were Dr. Jennie C. Kitching, Assistant Director for Home Economics; Dr. J. E. Hutchinson, Director Emeritus; Dr. Dan C. Pfannstiel, Director Texas Agricultural Extension Service; and Honorable Wilhelmina Delco, State Representative.

The group of 150 agents and visitors enjoyed an educational tour of the LBJ Park on Thursday morning. Lunch and a slide presentation, "Remodeling, Restoring and Renovating for Century III," was presented by Mrs. R. P. Smith of the Gillespie County Historical Commission. Mrs. Smith and other members conducted a tour of restored and renovated homes and buildings of the area.

Mrs. Frederica Seamen, Brazoria County, was named president-elect during the annual business meeting.

Officers were installed by Miss Claudia Williams, State Agent, Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Others installed included the Coke County Extension Agent, Mrs. Fay C. Roe. Mrs. Roe is director for District 7 and served as State Recruitment Chairman for 1976. Mrs. Roe was named a voting delegate for the Texas Association to the national meeting to be held in Portland, Ore., in October.

Texas has a membership of 350 Extension Home Economists. It is the largest membership in the nation.

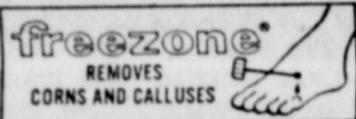

# How high will gas bills go, and when will they level off?

There is no sure answer. It depends, to a large extent, on what Lone Star has to pay its natural gas suppliers.

Just a few years ago, Lone Star paid only about 19¢ for a thousand cubic feet of gas.

Today, we have to pay almost \$2 for a thousand cubic feet of new gas.

But you are still being charged at a much lower rate than that. You see, we are still buying old gas at lower rates under old contracts. So the average cost for gas, the cost that primarily determines your bill, is still just a little over \$1 per thousand cubic feet.\*

As our older contracts expire, and new, higher-priced gas is purchased, the average price will continue to rise (even if we don't buy any new gas). We can foresee an average price of around \$2 per thousand cubic feet in a few years.
