Frank Robert Hearn, 61, died at 11:08 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 9, in the Clinic Hospital in San Angelo. He was taken to San Angelo about midnight Tuesday by Newby ambulance. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage.

Services are pending.

Born Sept. 6, 1915, in Potter County, he came to Coke County in 1926. He married Ruby Eubanks July 15, 1942, in Bronte. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and Baptist Church, and was a World War II veteran. He had been employed by Union Texas Petroleum for 21 years.

HORNS LOSE '76 SEASON OPENER TO FORSAN BUFFALO TEAM, 36-0

The Bronte Longhorns opened the 1976 season on a sour note last Friday night when the Forsan Buffaloes whipped them 36-0. It was the worst defeat hung on a Longhorn team in several years.

The Horns were completely dominated by the bigger and more experienced team from Forsan. The Buffaloes built up a big 28-0 half-time lead and coasted the final two quarters for the win.

The first half of action was all for Forsan. The Horns looked good at times on defense but could never get their offense to moving. Poor tackling by the Horns accounted for part of the Buffs' scoring with Forsan ball carriers appearing to be down several times only to break free for a long gainer or six points.

The Longhorns, led by Wayne Coalson, playing his first high school game ever at quarterback, did come back in the final half to

put some pressure on the Buffalo defense. The Horns' running attack was helped along by Eliseo Sanchez, Randy Parker and Donnie Jackson, all of whom were getting their first taste of starting at the running back positions.

With the help of a stout defense and several 15 yard penalties against the visitors, the Longhorns moved into Buffalo territory several times in the final half only to have the drive bog down short of the goal line. Good defensive play was turned in at times by several Longhorns including Coalson, Parker, Sanchez, Joe Bob Ragsdale, Jackson, Darren Koening, Bruce Vaughn, Jeff Easterly, Joe McCarty, Larry Dye's, Donnie Hamilton, Jimmy Tidwell and Mark Ball.

Though they were whipped pretty soundly last Friday the Longhorns never quit trying and were still knocking heads with the Buffaloes when the game ended.

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Coke Ladies Report on European Tour

(Editor's Note: This is another article telling about the trip to Europe of Mrs. Charlie Boecking of Bronte and Mrs. W. T. Roach of Robert Lee. The ladies have left Switzerland and are going for a tour of Germany and Austria.)

We all enjoyed the ride on the chartered train from Switzerland to Munich, Germany. We were assigned to compartments, six to a compartment. The countryside was truly a delight with the colorful, clean, storybook houses and well cared for cattle and farms. Parts of all the three countries we visited are experiencing a drought and don't expect to have a good harvest this year. I hope our West Texas presence didn't bring this on.

We arrive at our Hotel Vier Jahreszeiten on schedule. After some patient coaching on the part of the hospitality desk, we learned to pronounce the name of our hotel.

We passed on the City Tour of Munich that afternoon and decided to explore on our own. You can see we are getting very brave and by now adventurism.

We got a city map from the hospitality desk and started out. We did some shopping which we hadn't any time for before, and also enjoyed having time to talk and visit with the people in the shops. It wasn't long before age and the fast pace of the last few days caught up with us and we had to rest and wash.

The next morning we were bright eyed and ready for the Bavarian Castle excursion. We saw the wonderful sight of the Ammersee Valley and stopped at the Church of the Wies. This is a masterpiece of Bavarian Rococo art. I went into a nearby grocery store here. This always makes me feel like I'm seeing local color and besides I got some delicious wafers there.

If anyone had told me that I could climb a mountain even one-third of the way, I'd have said "No Way!" but I did in order to see the Castle of Neuschwanstein. It was built by the dream King Ludwig II. It is said that it is the castle that Walt Disney fashioned his Disney World Castle from. It is unbelievably beautiful. The view from up there is worth every foot of the climb.

Another place that I just did not get to stay as long as I would have liked was Oberammergau, the famous Passion Play village known all over the world for its wonderful woodcarving and Hummel figurines. There's a marvelous legend and history in this village. As we drove through the City of Munich we tried not to be too obvious about our seeing the war damage. They are very busy restoring buildings to their former state, but there are still many signs of damage. I didn't especially like this feeling and didn't dwell on it.

Some of our group elected to go to Berlin the next day, but a good many stayed in Munich, including myself. It was kind of good to have a day to have your hair done and write some post cards to friends.

The ones who did go to Berlin said they were glad they went but were very glad to be back in Munich. Enough said.

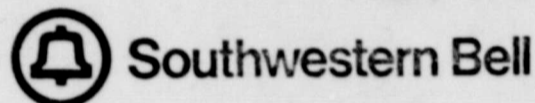

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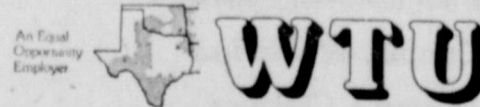
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LEGAL NOTICE

The City Council of Bronte, Texas, has determined to file an application for Community Development Block Grant funds.

The primary objective of the Community Development program is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment and expanding the economic opportunities of persons of low and moderate income. This objective is to be achieved through the elimination of slums and blight and detrimental living conditions, conservation and expansion of housing and housing opportunities, increased public services, improved use of land, increased neighborhood diversity, and preservation of property with special values. Thus, the program is versatile. A community, after determining its own problems, can determine how best to solve those problems itself.

Cities and counties are eligible to seek these funds. The Dallas office of the Department and Urban Development which administers the funds has established a maximum amount available based on population. \$100,000 is the maximum for which the City of Bronte is eligible to apply. Because of the many applications filed, not all applicants can be funded. HUD has established a selection process which will help determine who gets funded. That process requires HUD to review every application to insure that an effort is being made to satisfactorily perform previously funded tasks, to implement previously accepted housing plans, and that the current request is for activities which are eligible. If HUD is favorable to our application on those three factors, the application will receive points based on six items. The points will be totaled and funds will be awarded the cities and counties with the highest number of points. The six items are: 1) the extent of substandard

housing; 2) the proportion and extent of poverty in the area; 3) the extent to which the activities benefit low or moderate-income families; 4) the extent to which the proposed activities expand or conserve low or moderate-income housing; 5) the effort to alleviate a serious threat to health or safety; and in some cases, 6) if the funds will be used to acquire Federal or State grants.

Part of the requirements for obtaining the grant are that citizens be given at least two opportunities to publicly express what they feel our local problems are and how they should be solved if this money is received. Citizens are also to be informed of the purposes of the grant, the selection criteria, the citizen participation requirements, the funding limits, and the possibility that funds are not available to fund every application submitted.

The City in filing this request certifies to HUD that the program, if awarded, will be conducted in a nondiscriminatory manner. Also, the City would certify to the enforcement of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

Activities eligible for the Community Development program are:

1. For the acquisition of real property which is blighted, deteriorated, deteriorating, undeveloped, or inappropriately developed properties; appropriate for rehabilitation or conservation activities; appropriate for the preservation or restoration of historic sites, the beautification of urban land, the conservation of open spaces, natural resources, and scenic areas, the provision of recreational opportunities, or the guidance of urban development; to be used for the provision of some public works, facilities and improvements; or to be used for other public purposes where necessary to the community development program.

2. For neighborhood facilities

which: a) are designed to serve a particular neighborhood and provide services for that area if the area population is less than 10,000; b) provide health, recreational, social, or similar services; c) may be either single or multipurpose in nature.

3. Senior centers.
4. Historic properties (including private where public access is available).
5. Utilities.
6. Streets, street lights, traffic signals, signs, street furniture, and trees.
7. Water and sewer facilities but not sewage treatment works.
8. Foundations and platforms for air rights sites.
9. Pedestrian malls and walkways.
10. Parks, playgrounds, and other recreational facilities.
11. Flood and drainage facilities where unavailable through other Federal programs.
12. Parking facilities, solid waste

disposal facilities, and fire protection equipment and facilities under some circumstances.

13. For code enforcement in delineated areas which are deteriorating and where such efforts in conjunction with other activities may be expected to halt the decline.

14. For clearance, demolition, removal, and rehabilitation of buildings and improvements.

15. For special projects which will remove barriers to the mobility of the elderly and handicapped.

16. For relocation of families displaced by program activities.

17. Funds may also be used to provide other public services needed to support the community development program and for which other Federal assistance is not available.

18. Funds may be used to match or acquire other Federal funds for activities consistent with the program.

gram.

19. Also, for planning necessary to the development and completion of a workable community development program.

20. For reasonable administrative costs.

In completing the application for Community Development funds the City will need to determine local housing conditions and the needs of local residents for various type of housing assistance both for owners and renters. Then a program on how the needs should be met will be submitted.

First meeting will be Sept. 14 and the second meeting will be Sept. 21 at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

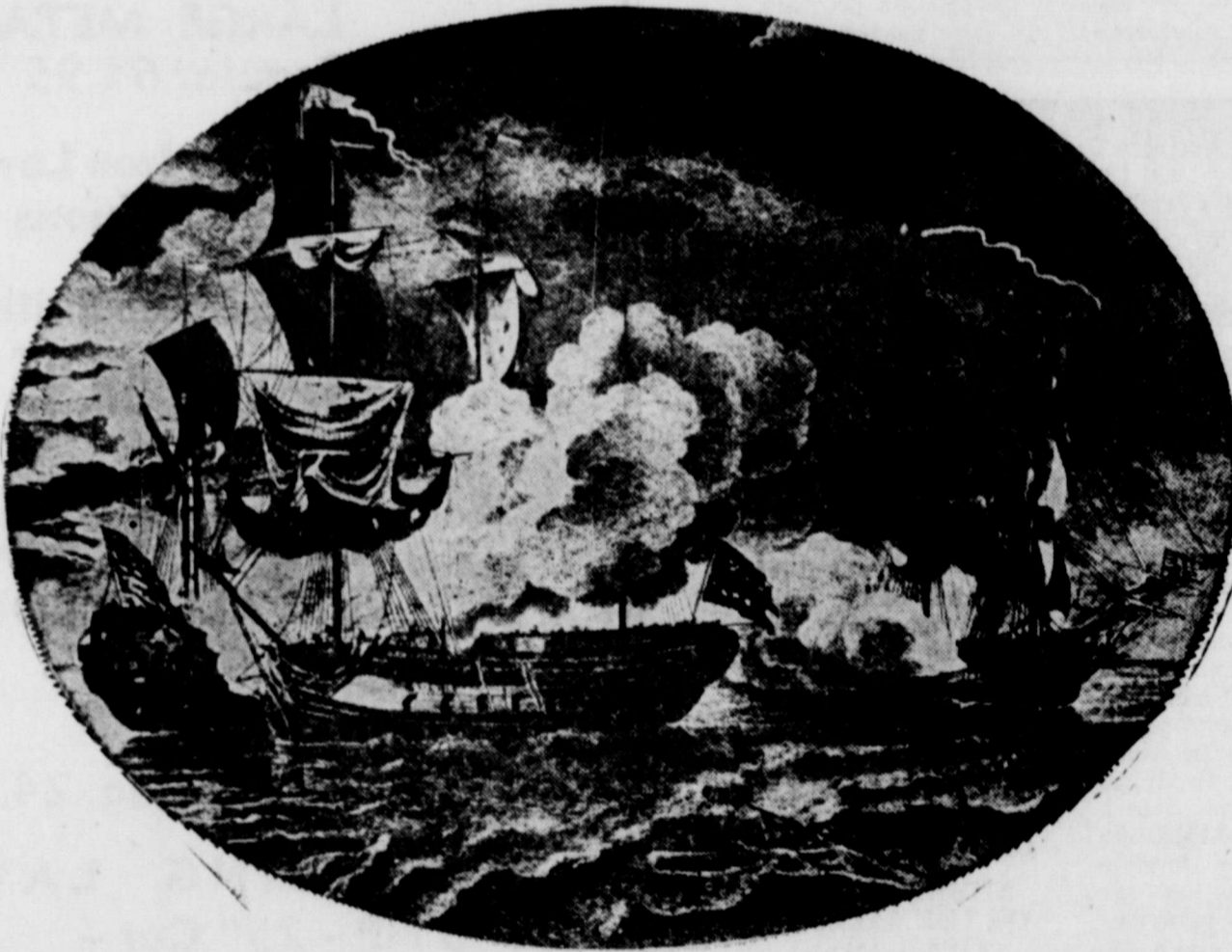


