### SCREWWORM CASES **INCREASING IN COKE**

Coke County screwworm cases for the year jumped to a total of 21 with four new cases scattered over the county last week.

James Arrott reported one case from his place four miles southwest of Tennyson; a second case from Bryan Gartman eight miles northwest of Robert Lee. The othpositive case from his place four miles south of Blackwell and the of Bronte, was the site of the other confirmed screwworm case.

During the previous week two cases were reported on the Arledge Ranch 12 miles north of Robert Lee. The other two cases were found in calves by Douglas Gart. man, five miles north of Robert Lee, and by David and Joe David Key, from their place 12 miles west of Robert Lee.

Help from cool weather is still Newborn calves and lambs seem to be favored target and need special attention.




How do the insurance companies set the rates for auto insurance?

Auto rates are determined by both statistical losses in given territories and the personal driving records of the individual policyholders. Statistics for a particular territory are gathered by taking the number of losses per age group along with the premiums paid ... setting the stage for general auto rates. After standard rates are set, the individual driving record plays a big part in the premium a person will pay for his auto coverage. If a driving record is good, the standard or minimum rate is paid. A driver, considered a "poor risk," will pay larger premiums to have adequate coverage.



ON

- \* For best results, use flat bottom utensils with tight fitting covers. Utensils of medium or heavy weight aluminum conduct heat faster, transfer heat evenly and respond quickly to temperature changes.
- \* Match the utensil to the size of the unit. Use 8 inch units for large utensils. Use 6 inch units for small to average sized pans: ~
- \* Use high setting for a quick start for any surface cooking, or to boil water quickly. When cooking temperature is reached, switch to a lower setting.
- \* Do not pre-heat the oven for roasting or broiling, but do pre-heat the oven to the temperature given in the recipe for baking.
