

Mr. Sid Stapp, who is farming this year on what is known as "the old Fellmore Farm" got the honor of raising Mason county's first bale of cotton for 1922 when he brought in a balewhich was ginned by the Planters Gin on Monday morning of this week. Mr. Stapp had 1350 pounds of seed cottore and he got a 450 pound bale of him cotton. The ginning was free and it is said Hofmann Dry Goods Company bought the bale for 21 cents a pound We are informed a premium of about \$45 was made up for Mr. Stapp.

W. A. Cunningham, who is farming on the "old Starks homestead" ran Mr. Stapp a close race for the honors, ashe reached Mason with a bale of cotton Monday afternoon. This bale was also ginned by the Planters Gin and from 1550 pounds of seed cotton he received a 518 pound bale of lint.


AUTO CRIPPLES BROOKLYN BRIDGE

Brooklyn's famous bridge has had to succumb to the motor car. An army in crossing a bridge "breaks step" that the weight of the men may be more evenly divided. Automobiles going over bridge are "in step" so frequent are the explosions of their motors. The bridge built 40 years ago was intended to accommodate horsedrawn vehicles and pedestrians only. Then came the big trolley cars and subway trains. The bridge, with its four immense cables of 5,925 wires each, was able to stand this strain. Finally automobiles came, especially huge trucks which for years have pounded incessantly over the bridge's gigantic span. Now motor-drawn vehicles are prohibited until the big bridge can be rebuilt in 5 years at a cost of 50 million dollars which is twice the cost of the present bridge. Bridges like people, must keep up with the times.-Capper's Weekly.



INCOMES OF TEXAS. **ROADS INCREASED**

Total Increase for Period of Five Months Is Over Million Dollars.

Austin, Tex .- For the five months ending May 31 the income from operation of Texas railroads showed an increase of \$1,106,570, or 12.48 per cent over the same five months of the previous year. The increase was due to a material reduction in operating expenses, as operating revenues decreased.

For the five months ending May 31 last the operating revenue was \$73,-692,249 and operating expenses \$63,-716,221, leaving the net income \$9,-976,027. The ratio of operating revenues to operating expenses was 86.46 per cent against 90.17 for the same five months of last year.

According to the railroad commission's computations the figures for the five months ending May 31 last, compared with those of the same five months of the preceding year, are as follows:

Operating revenue: Freight revenue \$53,765,348, decrease \$12,470,697, or 18.63 per cent; passenger revenue \$14,-418,155, decrease \$3,477,359, or 31.19 per cent; mail revenue \$1,435,428, decrease \$184,380, or 11.38 per cent; express revenue \$2,018,462, increase \$741,375, or 58.03 per cent; other revenue \$2,054,853, decrease \$728,918, or 26.16 per cent; total operating revenue \$73,692,248, decrease \$16,519,979. or 18.51 per cent.

Operating expenses: Maintenance of way and structures \$13,983,006, decrease \$2,755,258, or 16.51 per cent; maintenance of equipment \$15,326,353, decrease \$3,560,969, or 18.85 per cent; traffic \$1,680,516, decrease \$124,905, or 6.92 per cent; transportation \$29,283, 117, decrease \$10,621,526, or 16.62 per cent; miscellaneous operations \$318,-654, decrease \$72,420, or 29.75 per cent; general \$3,304,716, decrease \$354,336.

TEXAS COTTON CROP TO BE 2,752,920 BALES

Austin, Tex.-Answering inquiries from the president of the American Cotton Association, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture George B. Terrell declared that the condition of the cotton crop on August 1 indicate a yield of 2,752,920 bales for Texas, and there may be further reduction account of hot winds causing cotton to shed. The Texas crop is badly damaged by boll weevil, leaf worm and drouth, Terrell said. He predicts a maximum crop of 11,000,000 bales, or 2,000,000 short of the world needs.

The present short crop, Terrell de clares, warrants a price of 25 to 30 cents, and "nothing short of a conspiracy to bear the price can keep cotton at the present low price."

WASHINGTON NEWS.

A senate elections subcommittee Thursday agreed upon an amendment to the corrupt practices act which limit campaign expenses of senators in general elections to \$10,000.

Tariff duties on dyes and other coal tar products which were declared by opponents to be equivalent to an embargo, were approved Friday by the senate 38 to 23. Republicans and democrats split on the issuance, seven republicans opposing the increased rates and five democrats supporting it.

Cottonseed crushed during the year, August 1, 1821 to July 21, 1922, amounted to 3,001,449 tons, compared with 4,069,166 the previous year, and the quantity on hand at mills July 31 was 13,880 tons, compared with 99,821 a year ago, the census bureau announced Saturday.
