IN A FREIGHT WRECK IN PENN-

Over Twenty-one Are More or Less In-Chia a Chinese Stronghold

BRISTOL, Pa., Oct. 29 .- A disastrous freight wreck on the Pennsylvania railroad near Corrydon station occurred about 7 o'clock yesterday evening, in which three men were killed and a score or more injured. A construction train having on board about forty laborers pulled up near Corrydon and stopped to take in more workmen. While the train was at a standstill fast freight No. 1147, E. W. Stout, engineer, and William Rich, conductor, crashed into the work train. The trainmen escaped by jumping. Several cars were wrecked in the crash. John McNulty, Stephen Daley and Frank Stone, all of this place, were caught and instantly killed. Of the twenty or more who were injured, nearly all live in Bristol. Three or four ways a health tol. Three or four are so badly hurt that they may die from their injuries. All of the Bristol physicians were summoned to the scene of the wreck, and after attending to the wounded, sent some to this place and others to Philadelphia hospitals.

The Japs Victorious Again. WASHINGTON, Oct. 29. - The Japanese legation received a dispatch yesterday which confirms the news published in a dispatch from Shanghai of a second victory of the Japanese army under Marshal Yamagata. The telegram is dated Hiroashama and reads as follows: "Before dawn of October 26, our army under Marshal Yamagata attacked Kink-Len-Chin, one of the important strongholds upon the Chinese frontier. The place was defended by 16,000 troops under Gens. Lin and Song. They fled after offering only a slight resistance, and the Japanese forces took possession of the fortifications and the city. They captured thirty large field guns, an immense quantity of rice, etc., and more than 300 tents. The Japanese doss is twenty killed and eighty-three wounded. The Chinese loss is more 200 killed; the exact number of wounded not being known.

Earthquake at San Diego. SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 24. - The city and neighboring towns were vis-ited yesterday afternoon by a series of earthquakes of more than ordinary severity. The first shock occurred at 8:30 p. m. and was followed at intervals of a quarter of a minute by two other shocks, the last being the strongest ever experienced here. people living in brick houses swarmed into the streets on hearing the cracking of walls and crunching sounds. Buxton and the murdered woman are alleged to have been criminally intimate for two or three years past.

A Severe Earthquake. LONDON, Oct. 29. - A Buenos Ayres dispatch received states that an appalling sarthquake has occurred throughout the Argentine republic. The dispatch says that the city of San Juan de la Frontera, capital of the province of the same name, has been totally destroyed. Hundreds of lives are reported to have been lost. No details of the catastrophe have been received.

Me Touches the Key Note on State Issues, and Defines his Policies.

On fast Tuesday night the Hon. S. J. Chapman spoke to a fair audiance at the court house here, in the interest of his candidacy tor the state legislature.

His remarks upon State issues were directed to questions of vitalimportance to the people of this district and also the entire state. He first, after a few preliminary remarks, took up the school land question, both as to actual settlers and leasors and advocated a reduction in the prices of each. He said that he was a member of the state legislature at the time these lands were placed upon the market and then, as now, there were but two objects in view in the enactment of the laws placing it upon the market and to lease, and that to provide for the public schools of the country, and to place the lands within the reach of the citizens of the State in the order to promote settlement, and that experience has clearly shown that the prices had been placed to high to accomplish either end as evidenced by the forfeitures of claims, both purchases and rentals and the deficiency in the school fund, which apportionment is already more than one dollar to each scholastic child in the state and if present conditions continue will fall more during the next year as the lands are failing to bring in the amount of revenue that should be derived from it. His remedy for this was make reductions in the price to both set ler and leasor, so that each could pay for the use of the land from the benefit derived from it, both grazing and agricultural, and that the purchaser should be exempt from taxation until he can nequire a c title, (for three years) and the leas or be protected for a term of years on all grazing lands.
