Land Office Circular.

Austin, Texas, March 27 .- The land commissioner has issued the following to the publec:

This will give you notice that the act authorizing the forfeiture of school land sales under acts of 1881 and 1883, as well as all others which may have to be forfeited from time to time, will not take effect until ninety days after the adjournment of the legislature. This will give sll parties who desire to put their school land ac.

such endorsement of "lands forfeited" to institute a suit in the district court of Travis county, Texas, against the commissioner

of the general land office for the purpose of contesting such forfeiture and setting aside the same up on the ground that the facts did not exist authorizing such forfeitnres: but if no such suit has been instituted as above provided, such forfeitures of the commissioner of the general land office shall then become final and concusive; provided that if any purchaser shall die or shall have died his heirs or legal representatives shall have one year in which to make payment after the 1st day of November next after such death.

This act is cumulative is not iutended to deny the state the right o institute any legal proceedings that may be deemed necessary to secure the purchase money or possession of the land so sold. And this act is intended to be applicable to all purchases heretofore made under any or all of the various acts of the legislature under which lan t may have been 000, which he read ly made. sold by the state.
