



The property owners in whose premises the joints are kept were also warned in unmistakable terms that they had better abate the nuisances at once or the people of Topeka would not be responsible for the damage that might ensue to the buildings. With the reading of the ultimatum there was a hush of expectation, as there had for several days been ru mors that some important declarations were to be made. The words of condemnation and warning brought forth murmurs of approval that gained strength with each minute, finally sweeping over the entire audience and culminating in the wildest enthusiasm. As the reader finished and submitted the ultimatum to the approval of the audience old men and conservative. ministers of the gospel leaped to their seats in their enthusiasm and waved handkerchiefs, gesticulated and cheered to the echo. The cheering lasted for several minutes. The ultimatum, which was adopted by rising vote, is in part as follows:

"To those immediately engaged in the illicit business, whether wholesale or retail, we have to say that the long controversy of the public with you must now come to an end. You have openly and persistently defied our laws; you have made yourselves the agents of even greater criminals outside of the state, who have supported you in your unlawful traffic; you have gathered about you a criminal element that is a menace to the safety of the community and have maintained places that engender and encourage all vices; you have introduced the most corruptfluences into our local politics, and for years you have scorned all appeals and warnings that have been paid you by the virtue-loving portion of the community. Now we feel that the time has come when we must speak to you peremptorily. We cease now to endeavor to persuade; we command. You must stop this lawless and iniquitous business and stop it at once. And we hereby notify you that we must have unquestionable evidence, absolutely satisfactory to the committee of public order which we today constitute, that all your illicit goods, together with all the fixtures and furnishings of the places where your unlawful business has been carried, shall have been removed and shipped from the city before 12 o'clock noon Friday, Feb. 15, 1901.

PRESIDENT'S POLICY

In the Philippines Vigorously Attacked by an Ohio Republican.

Washington, Feb. 11.-An attack on President McKinley's colonial policy and an impassioned plea for Filipino and Cuban independence, coming as it did from a Republican member from Ohio, created a pronounced sensation in the house of representatives, and was applauded alike by Republicans and Democrats.

Speaking to a resolution introduced by himself, which declared that it is the purpose of the United States in the Philippines to aid their inhabitants in establishing a free government, Seth W. Brown, representing the Sixth Ohio district, first startled his Republican colleagues by his plain words, and then held closest attention of the entire house for a half hour by his plain, ing the jointists till Friday next at 12 matter-of-fact way of presenting the o'clock noon to quit business. Mr. Brown began his remarks by saying that an amendment would be offered to the army appropriation bill, providing for the establishment of a civil government in the Philippines which would protect the inhabitants After touching briefly on the impracticability of making states of the islands, he declared that the outlined policy of the administration was to keep the islands permanently as dependenas the republic endures."

Commenting on this. Mr. Brown continued: "Certainly he did not mean that we will maintain our authority over the Filipino states of the Union. He must have intended to express his belief that we will maintain our authority over Filipino colonies."

Mr. Brown protested against this conclusion vigorously, and went on to show what a colonial policy would lead to. It would be vastly more expensive for the United than for any other nation. It wolud require a large and expensive army and a large and expensive navy.

As indices of the increased expense, Mr. Brown pointed to the large appropriations of the present session. "It is stated," he said, "that the appropriations of this session will reahc \$760,-000,000, and the startling statement is also made that the military budget of this republic will amount during the coming year to more than half of that sum, or about \$400,000,000."

Further evils that would follow a colonial policy were enumerated as entangling alliances likely to involve us in foreign wars, the destruction of the Monroe doctrine and a radical departure from our successful course in the past. It could be maintained only at the cost of violating the principles involving the very life of a free government-it would require us to govern without the consent of the governed.

In suggesting a future coures to follow, Mr. Brown declared there was but one thing we could do. It would involve no retreat, and would not be inconsistent with what we had hitherto done. This was to announce boldly and at once to the world and to the Filipinos, in the language of the Cuban resolution, that we disclaim any intent to exercise jurisdiction or sovereignty or control over the islands only until a stable government shall have been established.

BRYAN ON THE BILL

Pertaining to Finance Now Before Coinage Committee

SAYS REDEMPTION NOT NECESSARY

The Nebraskan Dwells Upon the Provisions of the Pending Measure in the form of a Letter.

Washington, Feb. 8. - Chairman Southard of the house committee on coinage received from W. J. Bryan the latter's view of the pending bills before the house making the standard silver dollar redeemable in gold. After thanking the committee for the courtesy of inviting his views, he says in

"The bill has a double purpose First, to convert standard silver dollars into subsidiary coin, and second, to make silver dollars redeemable in gold on demand. In discussing the subject, however, it will be more logical to consider the latter proposition first, as redemption is only a step toward retirement.

"There is no necessity for redemption. The legal tender law will maintain the parity between gold coin and silver dollars so long as both can be used to an unlimited etxent in the payment of public revenues and private debts. I should say, perhaps, the parity will be substantially maintained for local and temporary conditions may, under any law, put a small premium upon any kind of money."

'Mr. Carlisle thought it a mistake to commerce paying in gold, but thought it dangerous to interfere with the custom after it was once established. By the same logic, it can be argued that we should not establish the custom of redeeming the silver dollars in gold.

"The measure recommended by the committee gives the financiers exclusive control over the national debt. They can increase it at any time by presenting silver dollars for redemption and compelling an issue of bonds to replenish the gold reserve. They can in the same way contract the volume of money in circulation, since money drawn into the treasury by an issue of bonds cannot go out again unless it is used to meet current expense, and that is only possible when the expenditures exceed receipts, loaned out to future banks.

"In the second, the conversion of the standard silver dollars into subsidiary coin is equivalent to the retirement of silver as standard money, and by this last act in progress instituted some twenty-five years ago, and persistently pursued ever since. If this is continued gold will be the only legal tender money, and bank paper the only credit money. Bank notes not being a general legal tender, and gold not being in circulation among the people, the masses will be doing their business with money that will not legally discharge their debts.

"To convert a standard money into credit money is to narrow the foundations of our financial situation and at the same time enlarge the superstructure. Such a course weakens the system and both hastens catastrophe and intensifies it when it comes."




