close. They issued an ultimatum giv ing the jointists till Friday next at 12 o'clock noon to quit business. If this is not done warning was given that
a thousand armed men would immediately move
them by force.
The mutiny was called by a comand was attended by nearly all prominent business men of the city There was a feeling of intense earnest ness prevailing in the meting. Conservative men, who have hitherto advocaled moderation in the dealings with
the lawless element, insisted in mistakable terms that the time had come when forbearance had ceased to be a virtue and that the people of To peka should take the law in their own

aided Mrs. Nation in her saloonsmashing her
with prayer.
After a few short, snappy addresses,
which worked up the high degree of enthusiasm, an ultim tum was proposed and passed amid the loudest cheerfng. The ultimatum com-
manded the officers of the city and manded the officers of the eity and
county to perform their duty regarding the closing of the joints. The offcers were warned that they nad waited long enough. The property owners in whose premises the joints are kept were also warned in unmistakable
terms that they had better abate the nuisances at once or the people of T damage that might ensue to the build Ings. With the reading of the ultima tum there was a hush of expectation, as
there had for several days been rumors that some important declarations
were to be made. The words of con demnation and warning brought forth murmurs of approval that gained strength with each minute, finally sweeping over the entire audience and
culminating in the wildest enthusiasm. As the reader finished and submitted the ultimatum to the approval of the
audience old men and conservativ ministers of the gospel leaped to thel seats in their enthusiasm and waved
handkerchiefs, gesticulated and cheerhandkerchlefs, gesticulated and cheer-
ed to the echo. The cheerIng lasted for several minutes. The ultimatum, which was adopted by rising vote, is in part as followe:

"The bill has a double purpose First, to convert standard silver dol ars into subsidiary coin, and second o make silver dollars redeemable in
gold on demand. In discussing th subject, howeven it will be more log ical to consider the latter proposition
first, as redemption is only a step tofirst, as redempti
ward retirement.
"There is no necessity for redemp
tion. The legal tender tain the parity between gold coin an silver dollars so long as both can used to an unlimited etrent in the payment of public revenues and private debts. I should say, perhaps, the par ity will be substantially maintaine may, under any law put a small pre mium upon any kind of money." Mr. Bryan cites the premium on sil
ver in New York in 1893, caused b ver in New York in 1893, caused by
