Other breeds and the number exhibited were Milking Shorthorn 26 head; Brown Swiss, 16 head; Guernseys, 6 head and Holstein, 1 head.

Harrison Insurance Agency of Dimmitt gave \$50.00 in premiums to the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed. \$6.00 was given the Grand Champion and \$4.00 the reserve champion. They also gave a \$10.00 prize to the best showman which was won by Doyle Davis of Hart 4-H Club.
