Denton Powers, Robert Lee Man, Died March 27th

Denton Powers, 68, well known Robert Lee resident, died at 10 p. m. Thursday, March 27, at the Fred Ashworth home, three miles northwest of Edith.

He underwent major surgery last fall at the Veterans Hospital in Big Spring, but failed to regain his health. After leaving the hospital he spent some time at a nursing home in Brownwood and for several weeks had been cared for by the Ashworths and his brother, George F. Powers. Funeral services were held Saturday at 4 p. m. at the Robert Lee Baptist Church, with Rev. Ernest James of Main Avenue Baptist Church in Brownwood, officiating. Burial was in Pecan cemetery, northwest of Edith, under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Great nephews serving as pallbearers were Frederick and Douglas Ashworth, Marion Sparks, and Cecil, Roscoe and Preston Blanton. Honorary pallbearers were Roy Hood, Floyd Harmon, Glenn Waldrop, Keith Hood and Fred Ashworth.

Mr. Powers was born Sept. 11, 1889, in Erath County, and came with his parents, William L. and Julia E. Powers, to Coke County late in 1899. They settled in the community west of Edith where they raised their family.

After the death of his father in 1902 Denton remained at home with his mother until her death in 1923. He never married. Denton served eight months in the army in 1918. He worked for some time on the J. J. S. Smith Ranch. He had made his home in Robert Lee since 1936 until he was stricken by illness last year. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Surviving are three brothers, George F. Powers of Edith, Wm. D. Powers of Paducah and Morgan Powers, who resides in California.

Mrs. Fred Ashworth and Mrs. Luther Sparks are among the several surviving nieces and nephews.

David Furr Is Growing, Walking Better

Everyone will be happy to read the following report from Mrs. James Furr of Silver, concerning the excellent progress being made by their little son, David:

Mr. Kirkpatrick: So many people tell us they never can learn of David's progress unless they read it in The Observer, so I'm sending this for you to censor, if you think it might not be worth while.

Two months ago David needed new crutches which are 1 3/4 in. longer than the old pair.

Last week he was fitted with new surgical shoes which are a few sizes longer than the last pair. He usually outgrows his abdomen and pelvic brace (corset) every three months. He also got this new brace this week.

In July his doctors tell us he will need new full leg braces. So he is definitely growing just as any normal youngster.

Several weeks ago David was enrolled in a speech therapy clinic at San Angelo. He is a nervous stutterer but he is very determined to get rid of this habit.

Ten months ago David was walking 45 minutes daily and he is standing or walking the majority of the day now, just as

MORE RED CROSS FUNDS

Mrs. Sam Jay, auditor of the Red Cross fund drive for the west part of the county, announces \$430.23 had been taken up the middle of this week. It is understood Coke County lacks \$200 of making its \$1,000 quota. The drive will be continued another week.

Late Rush For 1958 Car Tags

The last minute rush to buy new 1958 car licenses was the busiest ever known here, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Paul Good.

A total of 1,290 passenger cars were registered in Coke County, more than had been expected.

State officials announced the deadline would be extended to include Tuesday, April 1, and many auto owners needed the one day of grace to procure their car tags. Driving on the highways April 2 or thereafter is prohibited without new license plates.

Commercial trucks registered in Coke totaled 245, while 288 farm pickup trucks were licensed here.

Mr. Good said fees would amount to around \$35,000 and this figure could grow to \$40,000 by the end of the year. All car tag money is retained for road building purposes in the county.

Fractured Arm Sustained By Judge Jeff Dean

County Judge Jeff Dean received serious injuries in a fall Tuesday at Bronte.

The well known county official has been crippled up the past few years with arthritis, but he has been getting around with the aid of crutches.

Tuesday afternoon he drove to Bronte and lost his balance and fell as he tried to enter the post office. He was taken to the Bronte Hospital where it was disclosed he had a broken arm and numerous bruises.

It was first thought he might have sustained a fractured hip, but X-rays did not show other broken bones. The fractured arm between the left elbow and shoulder, was complicated and Judge Dean was transferred to Shannon hospital in San Angelo where he was treated by a bone specialist.

The injury was placed in a cast and the arm is in traction. Mrs. Dean was with her husband at the hospital Tuesday night and again Wednesday night. She advised The Observer that he is doing as well as can be expected. It is hoped that he can return within a few days to his home in Robert Lee.

Judge Dean is a candidate for re-election. He has gained considerable weight recently and has been getting to his office more.

McAdams Named Mayor in Quiet City Election

Robert Lee's municipal election Tuesday resulted in W. D. McAdams being elected mayor, and Wayman Robertson and Curtis Walker re-elected as commissioners. There was no contest and only 27 ballots were cast.

Cumbie Ivey, Jr., who has served as mayor the past two years, was not a candidate for re-election. Both Robertson and Walker have been on the city commission two years.

McAdams is a former councilman, having served when J. S. Ferrell was mayor. The new mayor is local manager of West Texas Utilities Co. and during his ten years of residence in Robert Lee has taken an active part in civic affairs.

The old commission wound up its affairs at a meeting Tuesday night after which McAdams was sworn in and assumed his office.

Reports of Mrs. Sam Jay, city secretary, showed the city's finances in good shape with balances in all funds.

NEW MAYOR AT BRONTE

J. A. Stephenson was elected mayor of Bronte Tuesday as 203 voters cast ballots in what was considered a heavy city election turnout.

Stephenson received 145 votes to 55 for his opponent, Dr. John R. Harris.

Three additional elected were Billie Gene Thomas, incumbent, with 148 votes, C. E. Bruton, 122, and H. A. Springer, 111.

Joe George Wilkins with 89 votes and Ben Oglesby, incumbent, with 107, were defeated.

Holdover aldermen are Matthew Caperton and Bob Wilson.

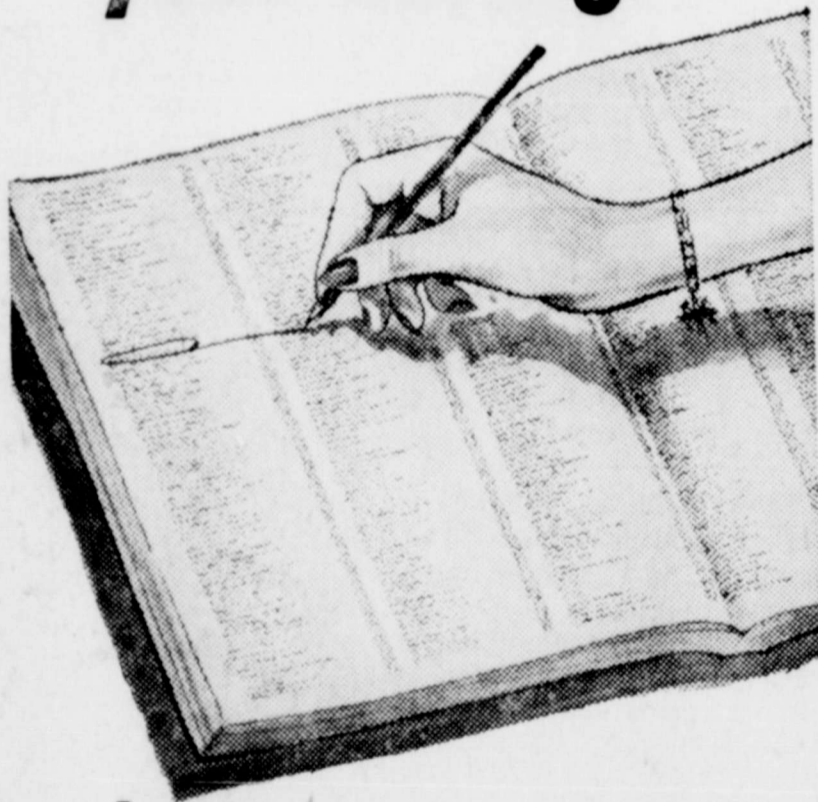

Meet Mrs. Otto Wojtek

Mrs. Otto Wojtek, our commercial teacher, is next in line of seniority of RLHS. It doesn't seem difficult at all for this happy and efficient teacher to demonstrate which finger to use in typing, what each little crook and curve means in shorthand, or which column to use in bookkeeping.

Mrs. Wojtek started and finished school at one of our rival towns, Santa Anna, but that's alright; she yells for Robert Lee now! John Tarlton, Daniel Baker, and McMurphy were the colleges Mrs. Wojtek attended.

Before making Coke County her permanent residence, Mrs. Wojtek taught two years in Coleman County, three years as primary at Wildcat, one year at Silver as primary teacher, then returning as principal to Wild Cat for three years. Later she moved to Robert Lee where she taught for two years during the war. Mrs. Wojtek left the school system to devote more time to her husband and to assist him in business. Later she returned to Robert Lee School as secretary, in which capacity she has served four years, two of which have been part time teaching in connection with duties in the office of the Superintendent.

Mrs. Wojtek made the following statements:
