Fox and Varmint Poison Bait To Go Out This Week

Farm and ranch operators are again advised that poison bait to kill off varmints will be distributed this week at the county agent's office in the court house.

Friday afternoon, April 3, and Saturday forenoon, April 4, are the dates when the supply of bait will be available.

It is being furnished FREE by the county and is a vital part of the county-wide program devised to combat the spread of rabies. Carl Baker, district field agent of the Predatory Animal Control Service, will be in the county this week to supervise preparation of the bait and administration of the program.

Fresh horse meat with strychnine will be used as bait. It is to be placed on the farms and ranches by the operators themselves.

A further warning is that dogs must be kept up where the bait is set out. Mr. Baker says the bait will deteriorate quite rapidly and there should not be any danger from it after two or three weeks at the most.

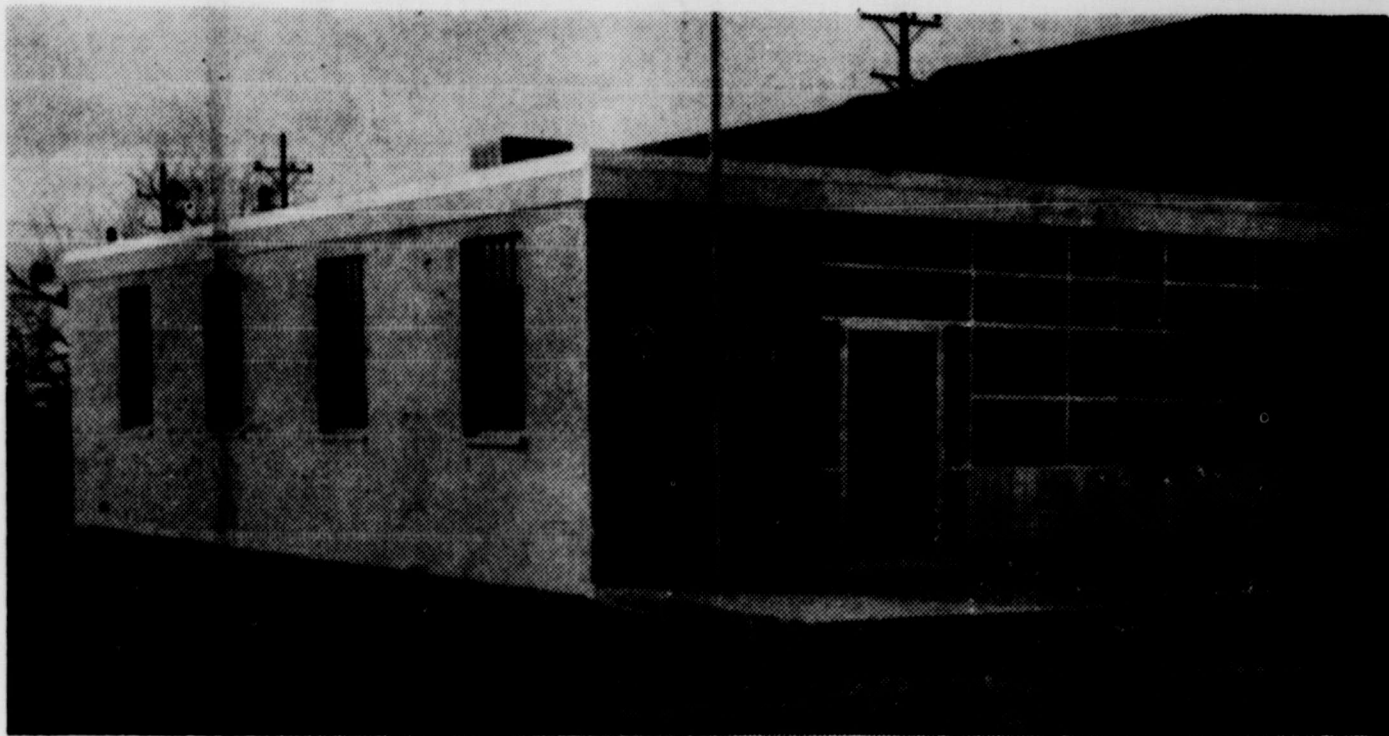

School Board Election Set For Saturday

72 Per Cent of Coke Autos Have Been Inspected

A representative of the Department of Public Safety reported this week that Coke County vehicle owners are doing well in getting their cars and trucks inspected. Seventy-two per cent of the registered vehicles already have new inspection stickers, according to a survey made of the five inspection stations in the county.

A total of 2,398 vehicles were registered and 1,737 have been inspected.

Deadline for all vehicles to be inspected is April 15. Coke County inspection stations include Ivey Motor Co. and Vaughan Chevrolet Co. in Robert Lee, and Bronte Motor Co., Home Motor Co. and Caperton Chevrolet Co. in Bronte.

INJURED BY TRACTOR

An outstanding improvement for Robert Lee is the new post office which has been occupied since early last week. For the past eight years the post office was located in the R. C. Russell building across the street from Ivey Motor Co.

The new location is directly west of the court house and second door south of Robert Lee State Bank. The store building in between is owned by Fred Roe, who is remodeling the front and plans to make extensive improvements for any interested tenant.

The government does not own the building, but is following a plan of leasing post office quarters from private owners. Bleakley & Rice of San Angelo erected the Robert Lee post office, using plans and specifications provided by the postal department.

The building is located on two lots purchased from Mr. Roe for \$1,500. The lots are each 25 ft. wide and 140 feet deep. The building sets on the north side of the lots and a gravel driveway extends along the south side and in the rear.

The building is 26 ft. 8 inches in width and 45 feet, 4 inches long, providing 1,208 feet of floor space. It is constructed of haydite tile, with face brick and aluminum trim.

Equipment is new throughout including lock boxes, tables, desks, cabinets, iron safe, etc. A new feature is the service department at the north end of the lobby where a wide counter permits patrons to buy stamps, mail packages, etc.

Forced heating and air conditioning is provided. The rest room for employees is tile trimmed and hot water is provided, as well as refrigerated drinking water. A large storage room is located in the rear, with a mail vestibule in the northwest corner at the rear where mail is unloaded and dispatched.

Owners of the building are well known San Angelo business men. Jack Rice is district agent for Mutual Insurance Co. of Omaha, and Jack Bleakley is a building contractor. Their lease with the government is for ten years, with options of two additional 5-year periods. Rental is said to be in the neighborhood of \$1,500 per year and their estimated investment is thought to be \$12,000 or more. The San Angelo men have other similar projects in West Texas.

FFA Youths Placed High in Judging Contests at Houston and San Angelo

The Robert Lee FFA Livestock Judging Team scored 437 points out of a possible 450 to top the Sheep judging scores to become the number one sheep team in the recently completed Houston Livestock Show Judging Contest.

Kenneth Wink and David Waldrop made perfect scores to tie for the overall high sheep individuals. 486 individuals making up 162 teams competed in the Contest. This is the largest number of teams to ever compete in a Livestock Judging Contest in Texas.

Kenneth Wink placed 12th high individual out of the 486 individuals and was awarded a \$125 gift certificate to purchase a Registered Heifer.

Out of the competing 162 teams the Robert Lee team ranked 20th with a team score of 1347 out of a possible 1500 points. The judging included 3 classes of hogs; 3 classes of sheep and 4 classes of cattle.

Individual scores included Kenneth Wink 480; Douglas Ashworth 443 and David Waldrop 424 points. 500 points was a perfect score.

The team composed of Wink, Ashworth, Waldrop and Butch Service placed first in the recently completed Concho FFA District Livestock Contest held at San Angelo Junior College.

The team scored 1717 points to defeat Sterling City 1645, Big Lake 1631, San Angelo 1587 and Lake View 1571 to win the Concho title for the third successive year. The team placed 5th in the overall contest behind Wylie 1776, Miles 1761, Odessa 1729 and Abilene 17-

18. Kenneth Wink tied for third overall high individual and Butch Service was the second high individual in sheep. The team was the 2nd high team in sheep.

Individual scores include: Kenneth Wink 604; Butch Service 561; Douglas Ashworth 552; David Waldrop 538; Frankie Blair 496; Carlton Boone 479; James Harmon 473 and Ricky Counts 447.

SMALL TALK

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

In order that Mrs. N. C. Pentecost (Mary Jo Bird) and her friends will not be disappointed too badly, will comply with the request that I answer some questions asked in her recent letter.

Concerning the loyalty matter, I have never accused rural people of being less loyal to Robert Lee than a lot of folks living right here in town. And it still goes with me. A good citizen should be loyal to his home town and its institutions no matter where he lives. You admit you're loyal!

I said in a news article when the road bond petition was filed that "Robert Lee citizens feel they have paid county road taxes and auto license money over a long period of years and received very little in return. Many city streets are impassable in wet weather, while most parts of the county rural roads are well graded and surfaced for all weather travel."

You wrote that the article said Robert Lee people were tired of paying taxes (not county road taxes) and that's the difference. You got to quote me right, or your case will be thrown out.

Then the telephone business. Robert Lee city officials and business men did about everything they could, and still you kick. We backed the group who tried to get REA phones, but it couldn't be done because General wouldn't give them enough territory. But Robert Lee city officials stood pat. Instead of the new lines costing \$700 a mile, everyone who previously had a telephone is being given new installations at no additional cost. You tell your husband about that, if he don't know it.

Now you brought up another matter, suggesting that the rag tags have been putting over all these bond issues. Little taxpayers that is, people who don't own big spreads and shouldn't be allowed to vote on such matters. How much wealth do you think would be a proper limit of eligibility?

The law says "qualified voters with taxable property who render it for taxation." Some people don't pay taxes that should. Some people have property and quite a lot of it that they don't turn in for taxes.

You stated that Robert Lee and Bronte together are paying only 3% of the county taxes and the big burden was upon the farmers and ranchers. Well the complete story is that town lots in Robert Lee and Bronte last year were assessed at \$688,380. That don't include personal property, merchandise, autos, etc. But here's the big statement: More than 590 thousand acres of land in Coke County was assessed at only \$2,714,920. (\$4.52 an acre. Would you take \$50?) That is just 11% of the total taxing value. Oil properties are assessed for 80% of the 25 million dollar total.

Notes From The Oil Field

Perkins-Prothro Gets A Producer On Johnson Lease

Perkins-Prothro Oil Co. of Wichita Falls has completed a new producer on the Johnson ranch southwest of Silver for a daily flowing potential of 135.07 barrels of 46 gravity crude.

It is J. W. Johnson et al "B" Tract 1, located in Sec. 68, block 2, H&TC Survey, 20 miles northwest of Robert Lee. The 24-hour test was completed March 24, with production through a quarter inch tubing choke from casing perforations between 6,496 and 6,628 feet. The pay section was fractured.

Casing pressure was 275 pounds, with 500 pounds pressure on the tubing. Gas-oil ratio 733-1.

McCutchen & Graham were the drilling contractors and their rotary is now drilling Perkins-Prothro No. 12 on the Blanks C lease.

HAYRICK WILDCAT

TXL Oil Corp. of Midland is drilling its No. 1 J. W. Labenske, a 4,400-foot wildcat, 11 miles northeast of Robert Lee. Location on a 160-acre lease, is 330 feet from the south and west lines of Section 387-1A-H&TC. The prospector is 4 miles west of the Rawlings multipay field. It was drilled Monday at 2,160 feet in shale.

Barney Carter of Tyler will re-enter and clean out to 5,630 feet a 5,716 Ellenburger failure, two miles north of Bronte. It is scheduled as the 1-A Sam Gray. Location is 330 feet from the north and west lines of Section 429-1A-H&TC. The prospector was originally drilled by J. K. Wadley and plugged and abandoned June 12, 1949.

Sun 1-C Price, four miles southeast of Silver, drilling Monday at 3,710 feet in lime and shale.

Petroleum Drilling Co. No. 3 Fred Roe, 2,750 feet in shale and lime. Surface casing was cemented to 300 feet.

Humble has completed its No. 6 I. A. Bird, southeast of the Bird ranch house, but a potential has not been filed.

Robertson Bros. had the drilling contract and is now on Humble No. 4 McKinley.

Humble has staked two more locations on the R. H. Harris Ranch in the I. A. B. (Menielle Penn) field 14 miles northwest of Robert Lee. The locations are numbers 14 and 15.
