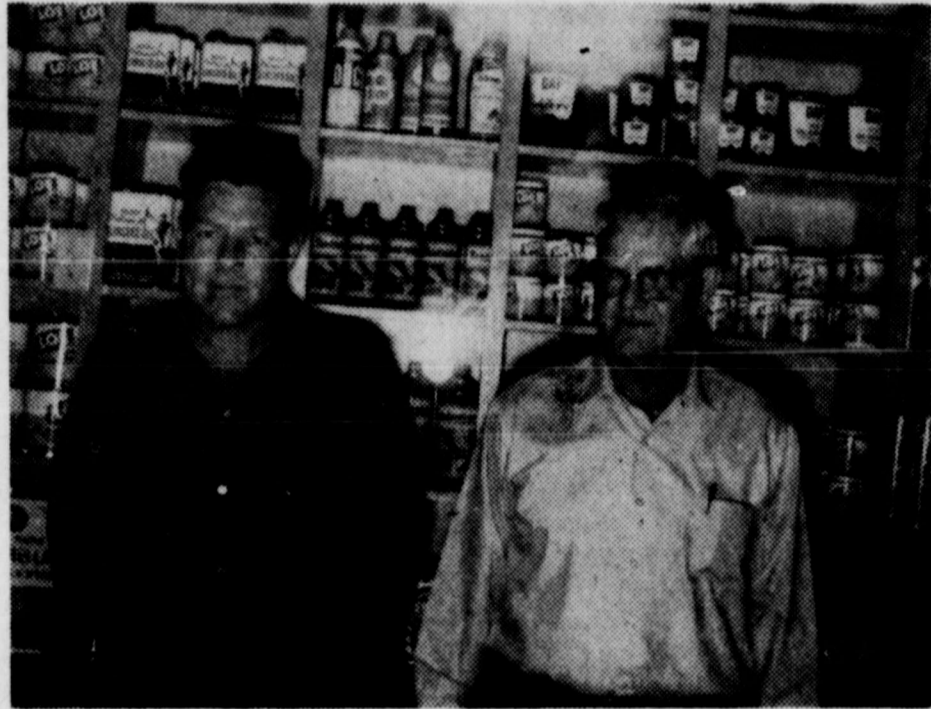

Brown Lumber Co. Buys Percifull Hardware Store

Brown Lumber and Supply of Robert Lee, owned by John and Dale Brown, purchased Percifull Hardware here from Will Percifull at the end of last week.

Will Percifull has operated the hardware establishment for the past 3½ years which he purchased from Curtis Walker. Percifull, a native of Robert Lee, said that he "wanted to spend more time with

his farming and livestock interests." He said that he felt that the Browns would be able to better serve the residents of Coke and adjoining counties by operating the hardware business in conjunction with their building and lumber supply business. Percifull's stock farm is 6 miles from Robert Lee.

John Brown and his son, Dale,

established the Brown Lumber and Supply business in Robert Lee approximately three years ago.

"We wanted to increase our services for the residents of Robert Lee, Coke and adjoining counties, and we felt that we could serve them if we had the hardware and housewares establishment," the Browns told The Observer Monday.

The new owners of the hardware store said that they intend to maintain a complete stock of hardware, housewares and building supplies at all times. "Our customers' desires will always be our first consideration," the Browns said. "That is why we are expanding at this time."

They further stated that they believe in the stability of the economy and continued growth of Robert Lee and Coke County, and that they wanted to keep pace with the area by increasing their services.

Both Browns are married and own their homes in Robert Lee.

John Brown is a lifelong resident of Robert Lee and has engaged in the construction of houses and buildings since 1920.

Dale Brown was born and reared in Robert Lee. He graduated from Robert Lee High School. He joined his father in the lumber business a short time after he was discharged from the U. S. Army.

Veterans Of World War I Meet Feb. 2

A meeting of World War I Veterans has been set for Thursday night, Feb. 2, at the county park building in Robert Lee. Starting time is 7 o'clock.

A Coke County Barracks of WWI veterans was organized at the courthouse last month, when a dozen veterans were on hand to launch the movement. H. O. Whitt of Bronte was elected commander and A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee was named quartermaster.

Other barracks officers are to be selected at the Thursday night meeting and membership and other matters of interest to the veterans and their widows are to be discussed.

Commander Whitt plans to see that every eligible veteran in Coke County is contacted and asked to join the organization. Any veteran who had more than three months service during World War I is eligible for membership.

Annual dues are \$5.00. Of this amount more than half goes to the state and national organizations and includes subscriptions to the state and national publications.

Veterans of 1917-18 may pay their dues to either Mr. Whitt or Mr. Kirkpatrick or any member of the Coke County Barracks.

First District Loss Handed Hi-Liters

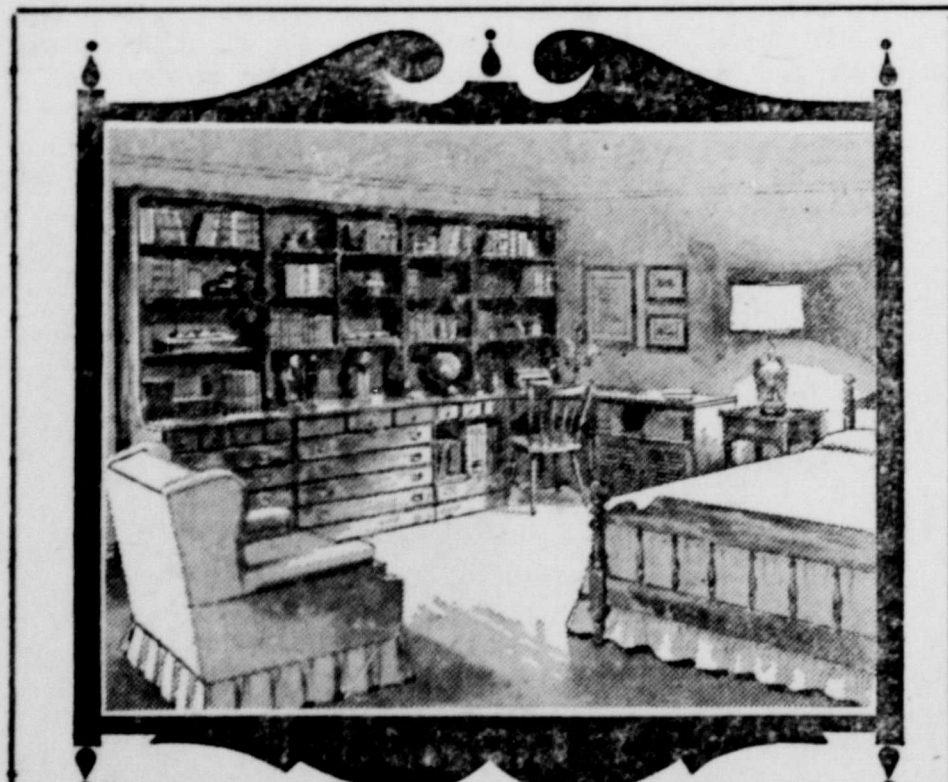

The Robert Lee-Bronte boys game will be played at a later date.

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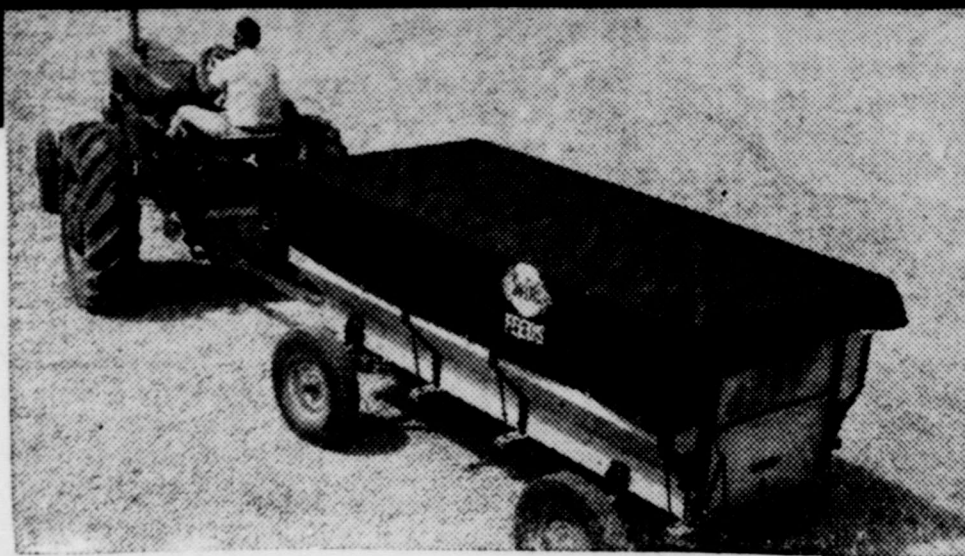

der, and that if his bid should be accepted he will enter into bond as herein provided, and upon failure of said banking corporation, association or individual banker that may be selected as such Depository to give the bonds required by law, the amount of such certified check shall go to the County as liquidated damages and

The Coke County 4-H club member's 29 entries in the Abilene Fat Stock Show made an excellent showing, winning 21 ribbons in the area show and winning \$74.00 in prize money.

Six of seven steers entered showing in classes containing 42 steers each, placed among the top 20 animals. Darrell Pitcock exhibited the top placing steer. County Agents News Column

If you are like me you have not filed your 1960 income tax return. And you have not pruned those trees and bushes yet.

We still have a few copies of the 1960 Farmers Tax Guide if you would like to have a copy. They can be helpful in preparing this years report and also in planning for the coming year or years.

Our farm management specialist tells us that too often the following two portions of the farmers tax return are overlooked or minimized when they are perfectly legal deductions that the government expects qualified operators to make use of: The first year depreciation allowables and paying wages to qualified children of the family. More information on the subjects can be obtained from the tax guide, a tax consultant or one of the internal revenue offices.

Now to the tree pruning. In pruning a tree, shrub or brush, have a purpose or purposes in mind with each plant you prune — and do not be afraid to prune.

Pruning should be done for one or more of the following reasons and so done will add to your table or to the beauty of your property. First, removal of dead, diseased or weakened wood. These limbs need to be removed. Shape is the most common reason for pruning. Decide on the type or shape you prefer, then prune — annually — to get the shape you want. Fruiting or stimulation is sometimes a factor in pruning. Always keep in mind that most fruits are produced from last year's wood or this years new wood or a combination of the two (bloom on one, pollen on the other.)

There are other reasons for pruning, but the ones mentioned above are the important ones to most of us. Again, prune annually, or even more often on some plants, and prune to add the beauty, production or life of plants in your yard, garden or orchard.

What is one part per million? During the last two or three years we have heard a lot about residues on crops in terms of parts per million. The following examples may help you to interpret the size or quantity of one or more parts per million:

1. One inch is one part per million in 16 mills.
2. One part per million is one minute in 2 years.
3. Lay your hand on the ground and it comes 5 parts per million of an acre.
4. One teaspoon of DDT drifting onto 5 acres of alfalfa puts 1 PPM. in the hay, and the Federal Law says that the hay must contain none.

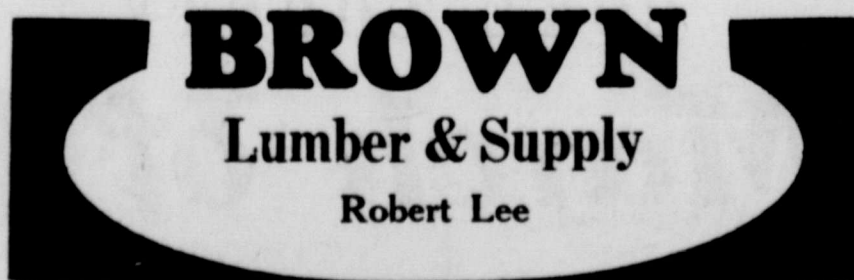

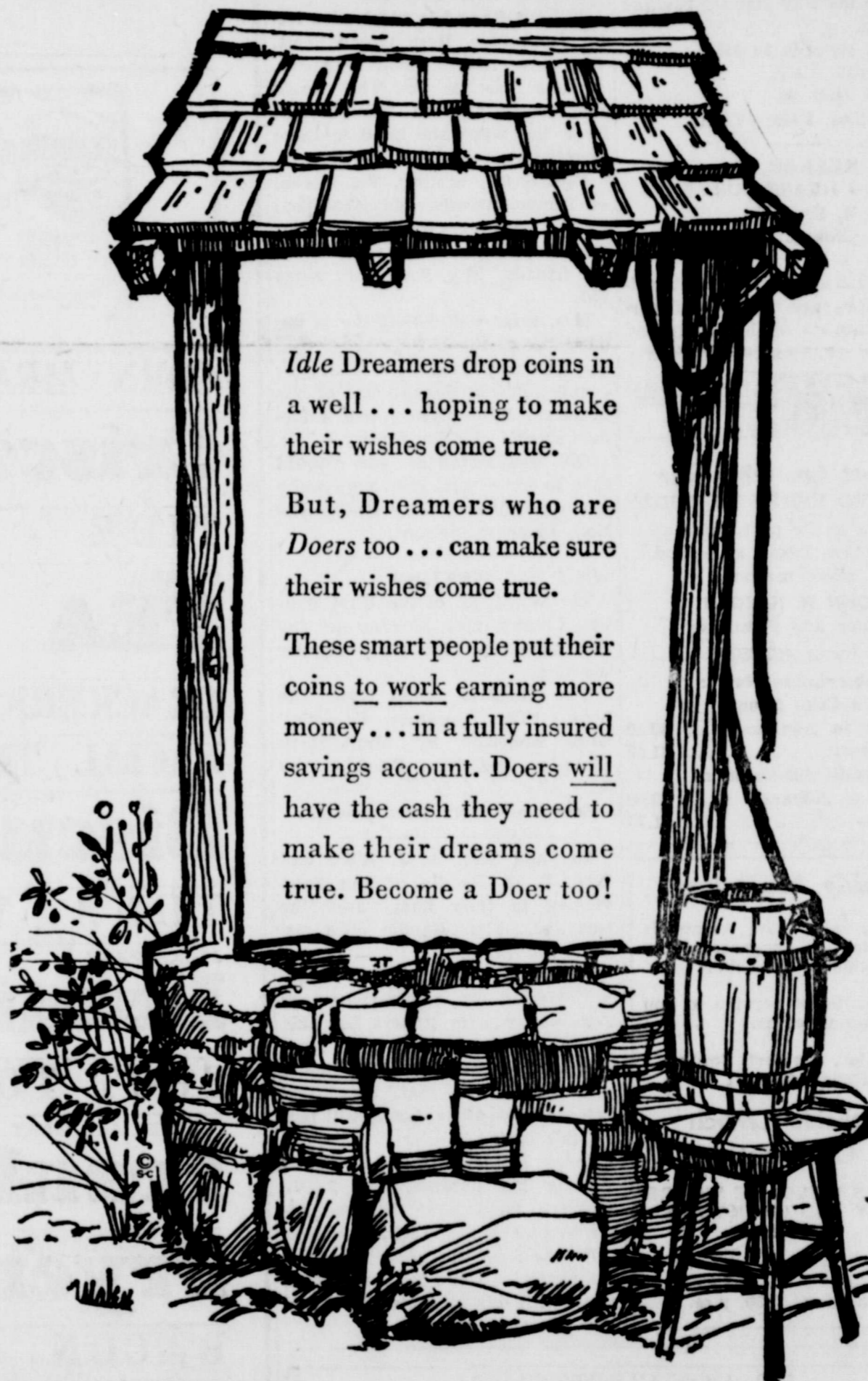
