Senator Smith Is Guest in Home Of Bob Vaughans

State Senator Preston Smith visited in the home of former classmates at Texas Tech College in Lubbock, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Vaughans of Robert Lee, Monday night.

Senator Smith was enroute to Waco to meet with friends and supporters in his campaign for Lieutenant Governor.

He has served six years in the Senate, representing the 11-county 28th Senatorial District. He served as President Pro-Tem of the Senate during the First Special Session of the 57th Legislature and was "Governor for a Day" on Aug. 4, 1961.

Beginning in 1944, Smith served six years in the House of Representatives.

A businessman for more than 25 years, Smith's expressed purpose in public office is "to work as hard as I can to help provide sound, practical, business-like government that will faithfully serve

all the people of Texas, without waste, corruption or duplication. "There's more than one way to put a business in the black, and there's more than one way Texas can overcome its financial problems without raising taxes.

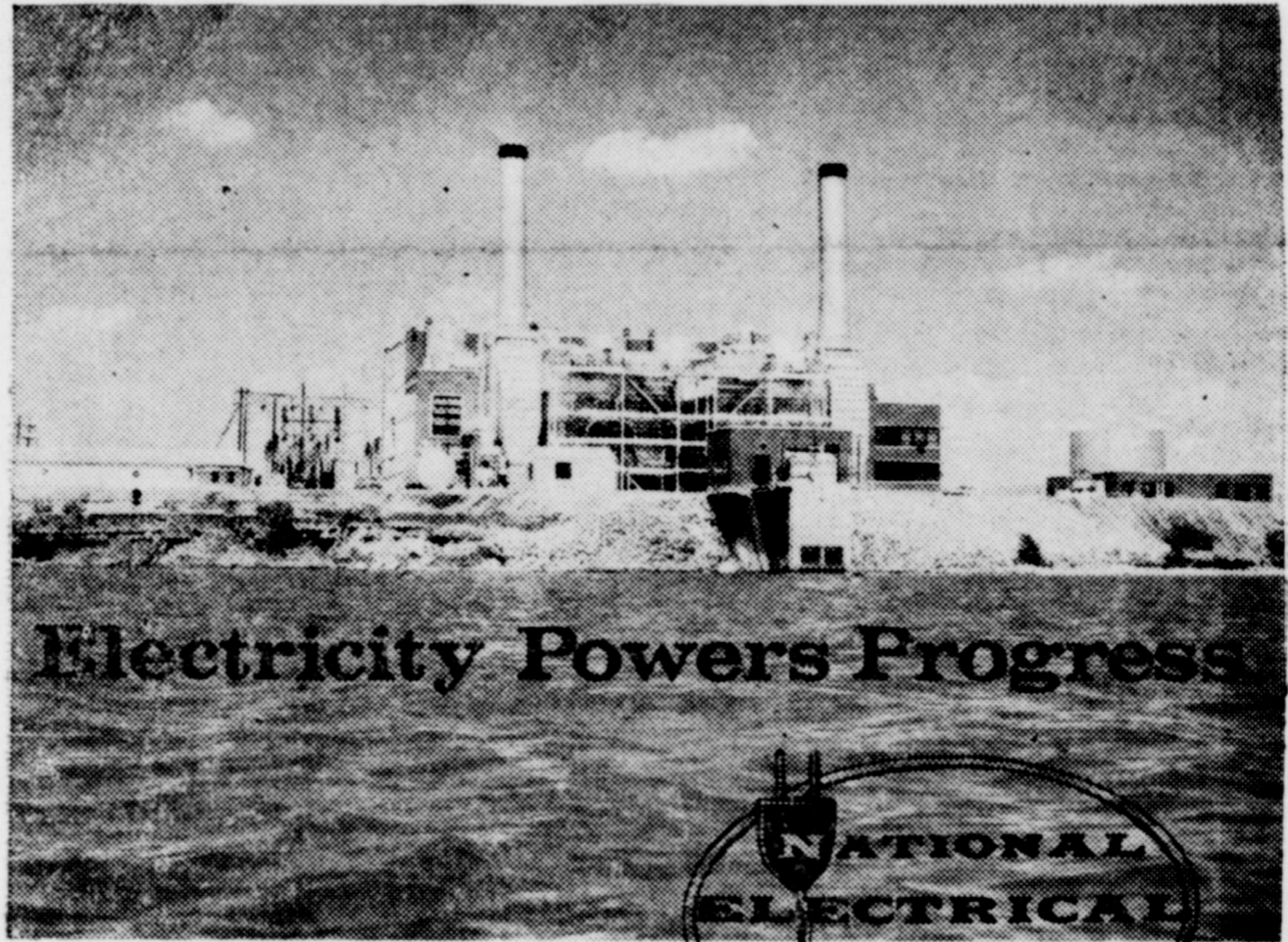

Home Demonstration

I have received a fashion forecast in which I think you will be interested.

The spring forecast for women's fashions calls for prices to advance slightly.

Some economists are predicting a general clothing price increase of about 2.5 per cent from 1961 levels.

Imported goods are expected to continue to be used in quantity.

Discount houses and low mark-up stores have sprung up in many localities. As a result, many established retailers are moving toward self-service or fewer services in an effort to meet the changing competition.

The fashion look for dresses this season will feature femininity.

Look for sleeves, normal waistlines, waist-length jackets, ruffles, bias cuts and soft skirts.

Many different shapes will be in vogue. These will include the princess style, flared skirts, raised waistlines, over-blouses and popular jacket dress.

Three-piece costumes also will be featured, with open cut-away jackets made with narrow revers. Tunics, overblouses or tuck-in blouses will be worn under coats and jackets of varying length. Stoles will be used for daytime as well as evening.

Agriculture News

The El Paso Fat Stock Show was a good one as usual. The competition was keen in all classes. The limited number of animals sold at auction seemed awfully small in such fierce competition.

James Bird Pentecost's two hereford steers both placed ninth in classes of 28 steers. One was shown in the heavy weight class and one in the middle weight class.

When the list of buyers at the county show was published, we unknowingly left off four business concerns. In addition to the firms mentioned earlier, Ivey Motor Company of Robert Lee; Power Feed Mill and Plains Machinery Company, both of Abilene; and Dankworth's Packing Company of Ballinger made purchases in the county show auction sale.

The soil moisture situation is not what we had hoped it would be at this time of year and the forecasters are not painting a rosy picture for the immediate future. However, if moisture should come before it is too late

to make the small grains respond the addition of nitrogen fertilizer is worth consideration.

If your crop has been grazed and/or is on sandy soil the benefits will be noticeable. Nitrogen added if the moisture is available would boost both grazing and grain yields. Many fields in the county would be benefited by the addition of nitrogen if we receive the moisture to produce added grazing or grain.

Two general discussion meetings have been scheduled for next week that I would like to mention. J. E. Quisenberry, County ASCS office manager, the County ASCS Committee members, Tom Wiginto, C. E. Arrott and Fred McCabe; W. E. Jacoby, SCS Work Unit Conservationist, and I will conduct meetings in Robert Lee and Bronte to explain the 1962 Feed Grain program. Also, if there are questions on other programs we will discuss them.

The meeting in Robert Lee will be held in the conference room in the courthouse, on Tuesday, February 20, at 7:30 p.m. The Bronte meeting will be at the same hour on Thursday night, February 23, in the vocational agriculture building in Bronte. All farm or ranch operators are invited.
