### MULTI-PAY FUTURE IN NE IAB STILL SOMETHING FOR OIL MEN TO GUESS ABOUT

Publicized now as a multi-pay field, with one well in the Gray Sand at 6,400, another flowing in the Ellenburger on the Lara Reid place, in addition to the Meneille Sand at around 5,000, the NE IAB Field still offers a guessing game as to future development.

A new location is reported on the Fred Campbell tract, to be drilled to the Ellenburger.

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Lofton recently visited Weldon Neil (Jiggs) and family, who works for Union Carbide at Texas City.

Col. E. V. Spence, general manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, keeps saying for the press that a dam will be built on the Colorado River.

CRMWD has not got around to accepting the Upper Colorado River Authority's invitation to meet with them in working out anything so far as future water

supply of Robert Lee is concerned— or hadn't done so at last report. The Big Spring Herald of Sunday, December 1, said a consulting geologist was due there to make studies of two potential dam sites.

McClelland Engineers moved in last week to test foundation for a site just up the river from Robert Lee. Tuesday they were drilling a test hole on the Frank Bryan place, back of the gravel pit. They

reported hitting some hard drilling in places.

Hardly a month goes by, according to the Big Spring Herald, that the CRMWD does not receive some inquiry from oil companies or combines of oil companies about a future supply of water for repressuring.

Demand for water seems to be speeding up the study of the site.

### NURSING HOME, HOSPITAL PROJECTS IN PROCESS OF STUDY, DEVELOPMENT

The nursing home project in Robert Lee is still breathing, with a firm figuring with the BCD on possibly building a larger home than the one first proposed.

Meanwhile, the Hospital Board has been making study of the nursing home features of the Federal hospital grants, in connection with hospital construction.

While no definite commitment has been made, a dentist—at least one—has been to Robert Lee to look over the situation, and R. B. Vandiver, Hospital Administrator, said Tuesday that prospects are good that a dentist will move to Robert Lee.

Several architects are still working on tentative plans and estimates for hospital construction, and private opinion is that probably a proposal may be ready to submit to the voters at the time of the Democratic primary election in May, or thereabouts.

Meanwhile, Lone Star Gas Company pushed ahead with their line from Robert Lee to Bronte to connect up with the network of pipe already placed in the town of Robert Lee.

### HUNTING IN BIG BEND

Frank Coalson cured his mild case of "Buck Fever" with a 2-day deer hunt at Big Bend National Park. He was joined by J. E. Quisenberry, Weldon Fikes, and O. B. Jacobs.

This rugged country in Brewster County sets the scene for approximately 1,500 deer hunters in 8 days, each on a 2-day hunt.

Three of these men were fortunate enough to bring a deer home. Mr. Fikes got an 8 pointer, Mr. Jacobs, a 2 pointer, and Mr. Coalson, a 4 pointer.

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



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

### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

If the income tax cut bill passed by the House is approved by the Senate, it should be quite helpful in aiding the economy of the country, and in encouraging small business to expand and furnish more employment.

As a matter of fact, insofar as the provisions for independent business are concerned, the bill passed by the House meets 99% of the proposal favored by the nationwide votes of independent business proprietors who, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, heavily favored the plan prepared by the Senate Small Business Committee under the chairmanship of Senator John Sparkman.

It is to be expected during Senate consideration of the measure there will again be raised the issue of forcing the administration to promise to curtail expenditures to match the \$11 billion in tax cuts.

It seems obvious that federal expenditures must be cut. The overwhelming majority of the independent business proprietors favored such reductions in polls by the Federation.

But in analyzing the debates, it is well to mentally keep from putting the cart in front of the horse.

The administrative branch of government can ask for any amount of money. But under the Constitution, only Congress

can grant the money.

By the same token, the administrative branch of government has no control if the Congress wants to go hog wild on spending, except the restraint imposed by use of the veto power, which again can be outvoted.

And perhaps the most practical way for government to achieve economy is for the Congress to drastically limit the amount of money it will vote for all purposes in any given year.

There is nothing unusual about such a procedure. Many families go through the same experience. When the breadwinner is bringing in lots of money, there is steak on the table every night. If he runs into some difficulty, then it is pork and beans.

There is nothing immoral in revamping outgo to fit into the boundaries of income. And as a matter of fact, if there were a straight 20% cut in the funds made available by the Congress, there is little doubt that all departments could cut 20% with no loss of efficiency.

So, during the debates on the tax cut it is important to bear this constitutional fact in mind.

There is nothing in the Constitution that provides that any Congressman can be jailed, exiled, or otherwise prosecuted for failing to vote for all the money requested by the administrative branch. There is a difference between desire and common sense. It can be presumed that practically every woman yearns for a mink coat, yet millions find it possible to be reasonably happy with a less exotic garment.

Of that number, 836 Doctor of Philosophy or Doctor of Education degrees (representing slightly more than 71 per cent of the total) came from the University of Texas. A 1960 report from the U. S. Office of Education shows that the University leads the South in the number of doctoral degrees granted.
