





AG OPINIONS - A compact of water districts and river authorities may act for the state in getting \$40 million in federal funds which the state might otherwise lose for 1970-71, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held. In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that an independent school district may solicit bids from class ring manufacturers and grant exclusive privilege to one such manufacturer \$2.00 to service voluntary student purchase of rings. Whether grant can extend for five years is a question before federal courts.

TRAFFIC TOLL - Governor Smith expressed "deep concern and disappointment" over the 1970 Texas traffic toll.

Smith noted an increase of nine fatalities-a rise to 3560 in 1970 -over 1969 and an economic loss toll over \$1 billion.

Governor said his only encouragement is that, with nearly 500,000 more drivers and a billion more miles traveled over the preceding year, the official death rate per mile traveled remained the same as 1969.

Smith pledged aid through news campaigns and called for public support of legislation, police concentration on traffic offenses and forceful treatment of violators by judges.

Sun Oil Co. is undertaking a \$12 million program to expand the capacity of its Snyder Natural Gasoline Plant, located five miles northwest of Snyder.


Sun operates the plant for itself and 61 other owners. Some 50 Sun personnel are employed in Scurry County.





Saving Bond Sales **Reported for Coke**

Seres E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Coke County during February totaled \$8,-280, according to County Bond Chairman G. C. Allen. Sales for the first two months were \$9,411 -31 per cent of the 1971 sales goal of \$30,000.

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$17,302,962 in Savings Bonds during February compared to 1970 sales for the same period totaling \$16,678,196 -an increase of \$624,766 or 3.7 per cent. Sales for the two-

month period were \$34,678,727 for 19 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.9 million.

Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds were \$431 million -an 11 year peak for February. Sales for the first two months totaled \$861 million-12.8 per cent above 1970. Redemptions were 22 per cent below 1970 for the lowest February in five years.

Drought, Lack of Cover Responsible For Dust Storms, Damage to Land

Clyde W. Graham, SCS state conservationist, says Texas dust storms have reached alarming intensity. "Acres damaged by wind erosion this blow season are already higher than any year since 1965," Graham reports. "If we don't get widespread rains soon, wind erosion damages may reach mid-1950 levels."

Graham said the record breaking drought is a major cause of the problem. Many areas report winter rainfall to be the lowest since records were started.

"Dry weather last fall kept er crops," Graham continued. "The drought has also reduced the effectiveness of emergency tillage which some farmers rely on to prevent wind erosion. And high wind velocities in the December to May blow season always seem to accompany a severe drought."

He said the combination of drought, high winds and lack of cover was causing serious land damage across a wide section of the state. The storms are also creating health problems for people with respiratory ailments. Reports from SCS offices tell of roads and streets blocked with sand and 6 foot drifts against houses. And it's not just a farm problem. Sandy land being stripped bare for urban developments is blewing, too.

About 2 million acres of land in Texas has been damaged by wind erosion this year which is about the same as 1965. This compares to only 126,000 damaged last year. The most wind erosion in the past 20 years occurred during the 1956 blow season when 2.7 million acres were damaged.

Graham expressed concern that the 2 million figure for 1971 may double unless it rains soon.

He pointed out, however, that conservation programs pushed by his agency and by local soil and water conservation districts have been extremely valuable in curtailing wind damages this year. While the 2 million acre figure is high, it isn't close to the 15 million acres damaged during Dust Bowl days of the 1930s. "It's remarkable how land covered with a good surface mulch of crop residue is being protected from wind erosion," Graham said. "Farms and ranches cover-

Dust storms that have rav- ed with conservation measures inaged Texas in recent weeks may stalled under the Great Plains thering the wind storms especially well."

> Graham said that in the last 15 years some 500,000 acres of cropland subject to wind damage in Northwest Texas have been planted to protective grasses. Nearly a million acres of depleted rangeland have also been seeded. Better grassland management is holding down wind erosion on range and pasture land.

"But 2 million acres of land being damaged by wind this year is simply intolerable," Graham said, "especially when you realize it could have been prevented. It's easy to blame it all on the drought but that's only part of the cause. We've been urging people for years to do a better job of leaving crop residues on the soil surface. Many listen but some do not."

Graham said that when you have good moisture, as we have had in recent years, wind velocity drops. And emergency tillage works as a good standby measure. As a result, people get by without wind damage during good rainfall years in spite of the fact that their land may be bare. This lulls many farmers into complacency and they ignore sound conservation farming principles.

But right now, the state conservationist said all that will help is a good rain.



Easter eggs taste and look best when hard cooked instead Oklahoma are here spending sevof hard boiled. Cooking below eral days visiting in the home the boiling temperature means more tender egg whites, less dark coloring around the yolk and less cracking of shells during cooking.

To hard cook eggs, cover a pan of water and bring it to a boil. Remove from heat, and carefully lower eggs into the boiling water. Let stand for about 20 minutes in the hot water. Immerse cooked eggs immediately in cold water.

To prevent dye from staining the egg white, use eggs that have no cracks, and keep the dye water warmer than the egg. If a warm egg is left in cool water, the dye may seep through the pores of the shell.

When selecting eggs for coloring, check appearance and shell color. Brown shelled eggs color just as well as white shelled ones. Brown shells yield bright, vivid colors; white shells are best



Eggs dye best when hot, plus hot water dyes are fastest. Prepare dye according to the manufacturer's instructions. Immerse eggs until they become the shade desired. Let eggs dry, then use your imagination.

Hardcooked dyed eggs may be eaten, but within a day or so.

Electric Scissors

Electric scissors make a useful and time saving addition to your home sewing equipment.

They are available in a wide variety of sizes, shapes and weights. Varying from six to eight inches in length and four to 11 ounces in weight, models can be powered from either a wall plug or batteries.

Basically, all electric scissors consist of a small motor encased in plastic with a pair of short blades in front. The stationery lower blade is set at an angle, and slides along the cutting surface to guide and support the appliance. The upper blade does the cutting by means of thousands of tiny snips. Al-


