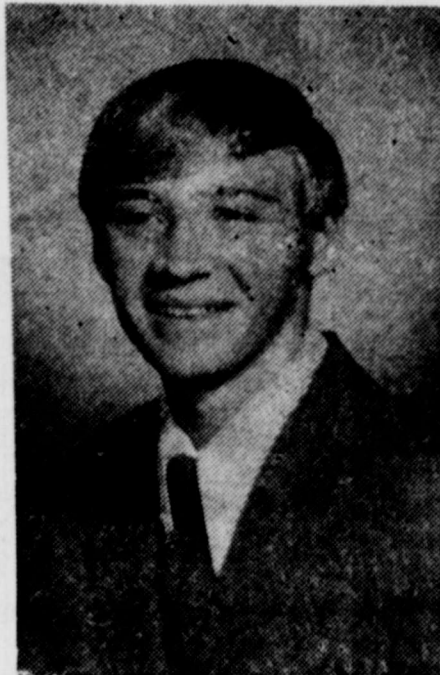
Three Elections Set Saturday

Three elections will be held here Saturday when voters will elect a mayor and two aldermen to the City Council, two trustees to the school board and three directors to the board of West Coke County Hospital District.

Polls in all three elections will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The city election will be held at the City hall. Names on the city ballot will be S. E. Adams for mayor and Royce Hood and Jimmy Bell for councilmen. All three are incumbents. Holdover council members are Frank Hearn, Dale Wojtek and Bob Large.

Incumbents Wilbern Millican and J. C. Wallace Jr. will have their names on the school board election ballot. Holdover trustees are Foy Askins, D. J. Walker Jr., Joe Flowers, Bobby Baker and Glen Wemack. Balloting will be at Robert Lee School.

On the hospital board election ballot will be J. D. Hammon and Funnell Smith, incumbents, and Fern Havins, new candidate. Balloting will be at the courthouse. J. E. Quisenberry, longtime member and secretary of the hospital board, is not running for reelection. Holdover members are Victor Wojtek and W. E. Jacoby.

Voters of precincts 1 and 3 will vote on county school trustees. Incumbents George Newby of precinct 1 and D. O. King of precinct 3 are on the ballot.

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4-H'ers to Sponsor Rabies Vaccination

The Coke County 4-H Clubs will sponsor a rabies vaccination program Friday, April 5, for the benefit of area pet owners.

Dr. Paul Hudman, DVM from San Angelo, will be present to administer the vaccine.

Two stops are planned for the convenience of pet owners. Dr. Hudman will be in Robert Lee in the County Park from 9 to 10 a.m. He will move to Bronte and vaccinate animals from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m.

Pet owners are encouraged to have their dogs and cats vaccinated annually as a rabies preventive measure. Pets four months of age or older should be vaccinated. The fee for the rabies vaccine will be \$4.00. Dr. Hudman can give distemper, hepatitis and other shots to pets while he is here if they are desired.

2768 License Tags Sold in County

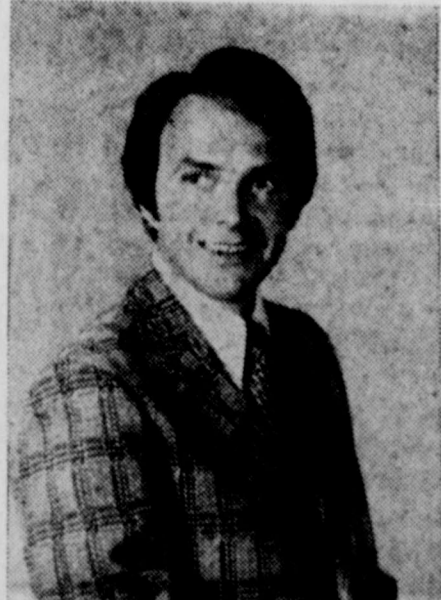

Firemen Fight Raging Fires

The Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department was called out Sunday at 3:30 p.m. to help battle an unruly range fire which had started near the Tom Green-Coke County line at a roadside park. With strong west winds blowing the fire spread quickly through the dry grass and brush. Because of the hilly, rocky country, it was hard to control the fast spreading blaze.

Firemen and trucks were called from Robert Lee, Bronte, Grape Creek, Wall, Ballinger, San Angelo Emergency Corps and Good-year Tire Test Facility. Bulldozers and graders were sent from Robert Lee, Gooty and Tom Green County to grade out fire lanes and push back the burning brush. Robert Lee's Firemen's Auxiliary was on hand to serve food to the firefighters.

Firemen were called back to the scene Monday afternoon when windy weather caused the fire to flare up again. An estimated 7,000 acres of rangeland was burned on the West Ranch and John Osgile Ranch before the fire was brought under control late Monday afternoon.

Saturday morning Robert Lee firemen were summoned to a grass fire near Hillside Grocery where about an acre of grassland burned. Sunday afternoon they answered calls to two small grass fires, one near Lake Spence and the other near Bobby Baker's place southwest of town. The only damage reported was burned fence posts.

Tuesday morning, firemen were called to the mobile home of Mr. and Mrs. John Oneil at the corner of S. 11th and Bishop Streets when their kitchen was heavily damaged by fire believed to have started from an electrical short. The Oneils moved their mobile home here last Saturday from Colorado City. He is employed as engineer-technician for Sun Oil Co. at Silver.

Tuesday at 4 p.m. R. L. firemen went to help fight the range fire near Talpa. The Firemen's Auxiliary again was on hand to serve food to the firefighters.

FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence

Parks and Wildlife Department fishery biologists are currently engaged in a striped bass "hunting" expedition at Lake Spence.

Each year, striped bass at Lake Spence are caught and stripped of eggs during the spawning period. The eggs are hatched under hatchery conditions and the young fish are then made available to many lakes over the state.

Bill Follis, biologist in charge of the striped bass program at Spence, said last week that the largest female striper caught in nets so far was an 18 pounder.

Last spawning season, fishery men at Lake Spence hatched over two million young striped bass. Follis hopes this year's haul will amount to around three million.

Sport fishermen have been enjoying good success with striped bass at Spence. The fish have been schooling near the main body of the Lake Spence.
