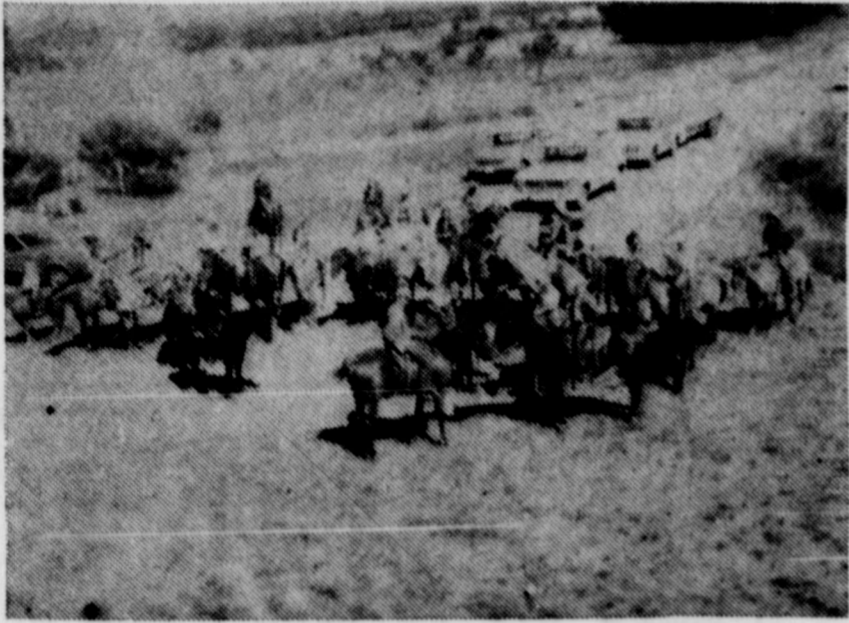

Sheppard Funeral Rites Held Here

Funeral services for Delmir Morris Sheppard, 49, of Midland were held Thursday of last week at 5:30 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church in Robert Lee with the Rev. A. A. Kendall, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under the direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Sheppard, a native of Robert Lee, was fatally shot in the head early Wednesday at his trailer home southwest of Midland. His wife, Audrey McArthur Sheppard, was charged with murder.

He was born in Coke County April 21, 1925, son of W. D. and Norma Whiteside Sheppard. He was a World War II veteran and operated a pipeline service firm in the Midland area.

He is survived by his wife of Midland; four sons, Stanley Wayne, Johnny Temp and Harold Mack of Midland, and A. J. of North Dakota; a daughter, Norma of North Dakota; his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Ruth of Robert Lee; a sister, Mrs. Jack (Nelda) Brock of Austin; a brother, Bert Sheppard of Spearman; and three grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Hawley Fields, Finis Harmon, Crowley Harmon, David Key, Fred McCabe Jr. and Wilbern Millican.

SCD Director To Be Elected

They are running some special prices on grocery items the three days next week and invite everyone to take advantage of the savings. In addition to groceries, they sell gas and oil and carry a complete line of fishing tackle and bait, as well as other items needed by fishermen and campers.

George Newby reported that due to recent rains, there are a large number of sunken graves in the Robert Lee Cemetery that need attention. He estimated at least 200 graves have caved in, some two feet or more. It was reported that the County Commissioners plan to haul dirt to the cemetery and city employees will help distribute the dirt to the lots. Workers are needed to fill the graves. Newby said he had had numerous phone calls from persons willing to contribute money if he could get someone to do the needed work. Mayor Adams said the city would help all they can on the project.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough reported that a survey of the Robert Lee Cemetery revealed there are 134 unmarked graves, some of which cannot be identified and some that can. She asked that anyone who can help with the identification to notify the Historical Survey Committee, whose members are working on a program to get markers on graves that can be identified.

Mrs. Yarbrough said everyone is invited to exhibit antiques at the Coke County Fair. She also reminded those present of the marker dedication to be held in San Angelo Oct. 19 when the 12 counties which were cut out of Tom Green County will be honored.

He was born Jan. 8, 1889, in Edith, the son of N. L. and Caldonie Warren Stewart, who settled in Coke County in 1883. He was married to Georgia Payne Dec. 20, 1914, in Robert Lee. She died in January 1939.

He was a retired stock farmer, a member of the Baptist Church and a longtime member of the Fryrick Masonic Lodge.

Survivors are: one daughter, Mrs. Weldon (Bryce) Fikes of Robert Lee; two brothers, Ray Stewart of Lamesa and Curtis Stewart of Albuquerque, N. M.; one sister, Mrs. Virgil (Daisy) Duncan of Big Lake; two half-brothers, Lacey Stewart and Lee Stewart of Fort Worth; two half-sisters, Mrs. Nelda Tuck and Mrs. Isabelle Patterson of Fort Worth; three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Dogies Lose, But Look Good

The Robert Lee Dogies played a fine ball game last Thursday night at Roscoe, even though they come out on the short end of an 18-6 score.

Munoz of Robert Lee kicked in to the end zone to start the game. Starting their drive at the 20, the Clodhoppers made three 1st downs and with the help of two offside penalties, pushed to the Dogie 35. Two outstanding plays by the Dogie defense, set the Hoppers back for a 3rd and 20 to go. The Dogies then got the ball as Randy Collins intercepted a Roscoe pass and ran it to the Hopper 35. After two plays and a 1st down Terry Ross carried over from the 5 to score 6 for the Dogies. PAT attempt failed.

The Clodhoppers came back to even the score by running the Dogie kickoff all the way back for a touchdown. Roscoe's Jimmy Mullis carried the ball 80 yards

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COKE GIRLHOOD FRIENDS MEET AFTER 50 YEARS

During the last week three women who were close girlhood friends and members of early Coke County families got together for a visit more than 50 years after they had been schoolmates in Robert Lee School.

The three are Mrs. Earl C. Evans, the former Layla Taylor, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Taylor Sr.; Mrs. Virgil Durnell, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Will Hamilton; and Mrs. Hope H. Herrington, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Beeman.

The reunion was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Durnell at their Five Oaks Ranch on Rock-springs route, near Uvalde.

Mrs. Durnell and Mrs. Herrington still subscribe to the Observer

and during the visit the three women looked at old clippings from the paper that told of activities in which they were involved from 1910 to about 1920, such as "Ruth Hamilton, Layla and Lola Taylor and Lena Mae Beeman attended a birthday party for Dorothy Kemp, the young daughter of Judge and Mrs. Samuel B. Kemp." Also old clippings that gave programs presented for and by the Daughters of the Confederacy in which the names of Evah Buchanan (now Mahon), Ila Ruth Turney (now Barnes), Ruth and Willie Bell (Denman and Clark), and Lois Preslar (deceased) appeared.

Mrs. Durnell's father was Robert Lee postmaster in 1904 and was Coke County sheriff about 1920-22. Her mother was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Pearce and worked in the Observer office many years. Mrs. Hamilton was an AP correspondent while here and later at Alpine.

Mrs. Herrington's father was editor and publisher of the old newspaper, The Rustler, forerunner of the Observer, and later sold pianos to many Coke County families. Her mother was the former Miss Lela Newton, who had set type and helped get out The Rustler while her father, J. C. Newton, was its editor and publisher.

Mrs. Evans' father was a teacher, groceryman, justice of the peace and put in the old ice plant in Robert Lee, the first in Coke County.

Mrs. Evans now lives in Big Spring and Mrs. Herrington near Carrizo Springs.

SCS Collecting Irrigation Data

Despite urbanizing trends in Texas, agriculture remains a major sector of the Texas economy. Irrigation today has grown to phenomenal proportions with irrigation farming providing over half the value of all Texas crop production. Being the predominant practice in several Texas farming areas, irrigation is the largest consumer of water in the state.

Annually collected data is generally available for other forms of

water use, but not for irrigation. Irrigation inventories have been made in some localities, and acreage for some irrigated crops have been estimated for the state. This data has been useful but often insufficient to fulfill the planning needs of state and federal agencies necessary to assess and project agricultural water use and needs accurately. This data has not been generally available.

To fill this void in basic data, cooperative arrangements were made with the Soil Conservation Service to inventory Texas irrigation periodically. The first inventory was in 1958 and additional data is collected on a five year interval. Other inventories were made in 1964 and 1969, coinciding

with the years for which U. S. Census of Agriculture data would also be available. By providing data from four inventories over a 16 year period, it is possible to make comparative analysis and indicates some trends in Texas irrigation.

When the field information is collected and sent to the Water Development Board in early 1975, all data for each county will be placed on a data card. Each data card will list the acres irrigated by water source, sprinkler acreages and the potential acreage for each individual basin-zone-district segment found in the county.

After the information has been collected and processed, it will be published in a bulletin.

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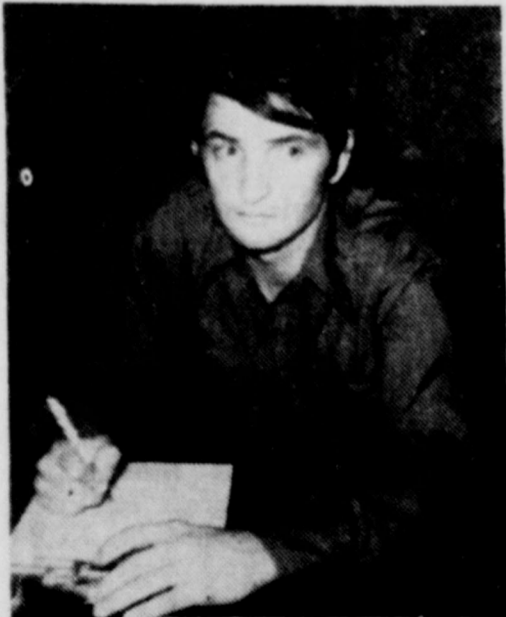
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FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence

Kickapoo Dams Work, Rains Show

The floodwater retarding structures on the Kickapoo Creek Watershed above Bronte worked very well during the recent heavy rains. Water went through the principal spillway (drawdown tube) on three of the dams. Excess water was held in the flood detention pool and released at a controlled rate of flow to prevent flooding downstream. This was shown by water flowing in the Middle and West Kickapoo Creeks through Bronte for over 10 days.

If all the water stored above the dams had run off without restriction some flooding might have occurred on the creeks downstream. L. W. Duncan reported that the dam on his place northwest of Bronte lacked just a few feet going through the emergency spillway. And one of the dams on the Ed Rawlings ranch had water close to the emergency spillway.

The dams that functioned worked as designed and there was no danger of failure on any of them. This is another example of a whole community working in conjunction with civic clubs and other local organizations, and with state and federal agencies to benefit the rural and town people in the same project.

The directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District are responsible for the operation and maintenance of the structures to keep them safe and in an effective working condition. Technical assistance is furnished the directors by the Soil Conservation Service. Directors are Carroll Robbins, Preston Davis, Royce Fancher, Louis Galloway and L. W. Duncan.

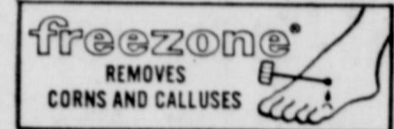

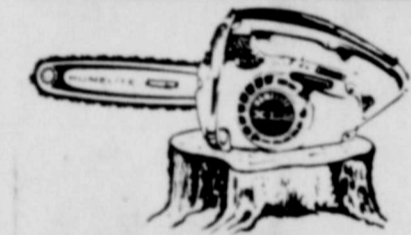

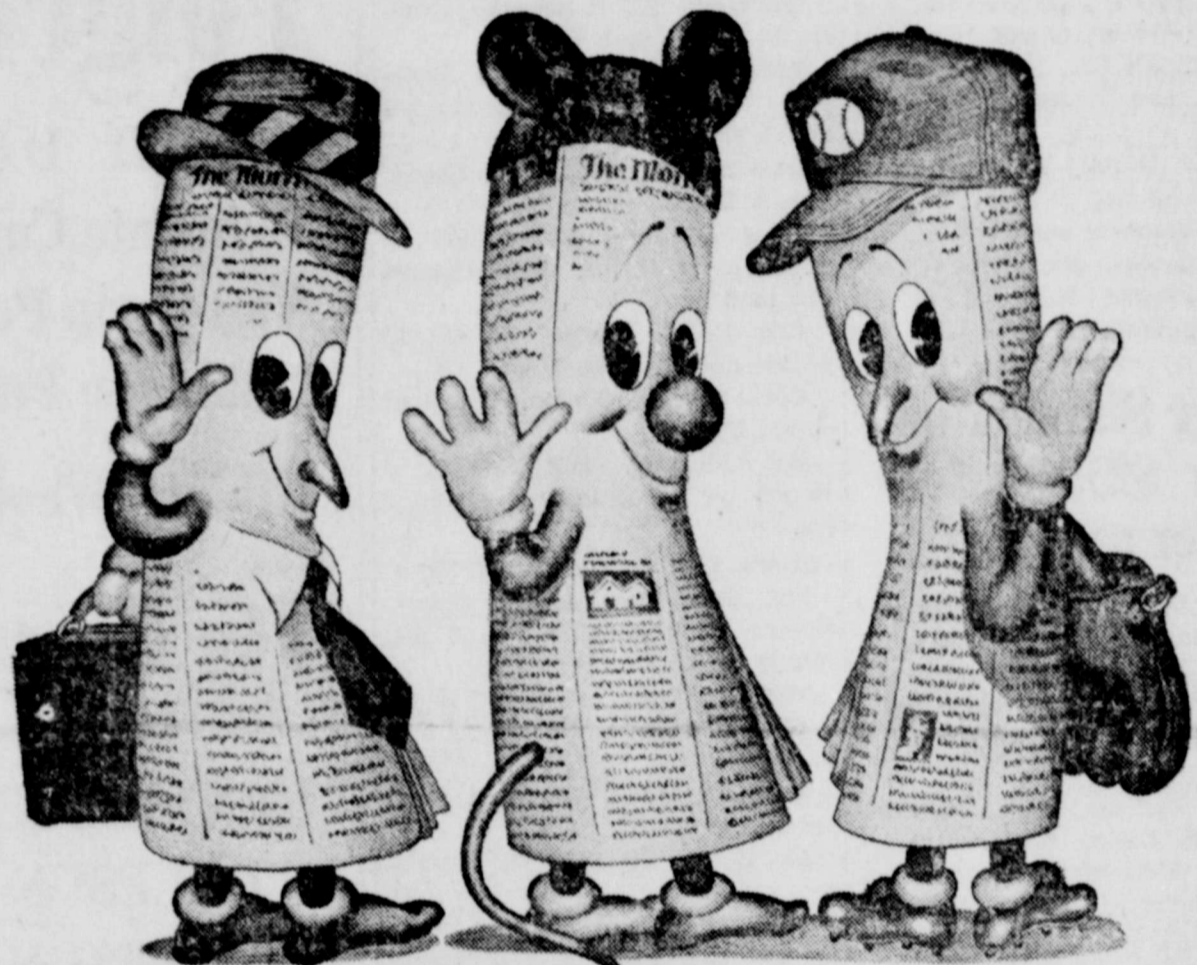
