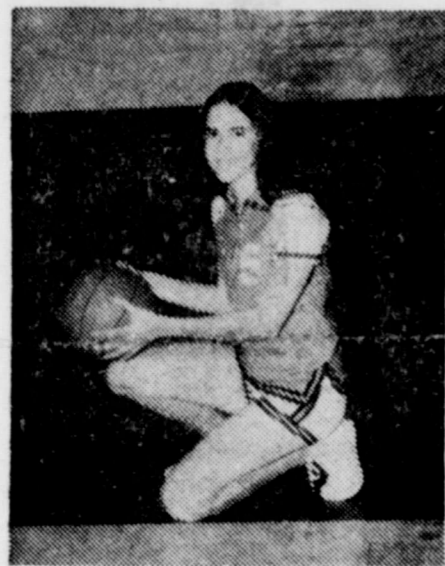

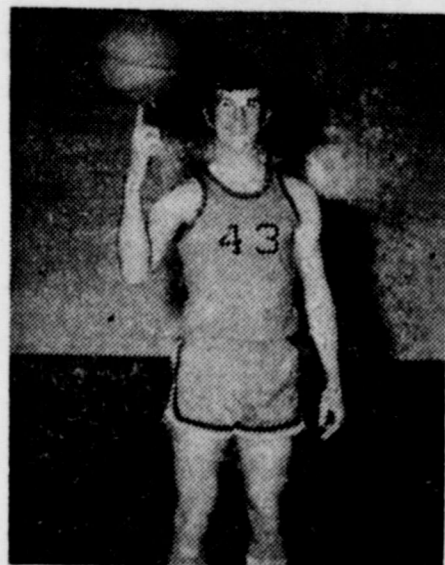

Coke County Cars Have New Tags

License tags for vehicles which operate on public roads were sold by the office of Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs up through Monday and he reported a total of 2863 sold in Coke County.

The Robert Lee Steer golf team continued to lead in district play after a tournament last weekend at Menard. The team chalked up a 314 score to outpace Eldorado's 315 by one stroke. However, when results of the first district tournament held at Sonora, are considered, the local lads' score of 644 is well below Eldorado's 663.

Robert Lee B team is in third place with a 341 at Menard plus 362 at Sonora for a 703 total. Other totals show Junction with 737; Menard 744; Eldorado B 761.

Gary Wornack and Billy Matlock tied for medalist honors last weekend with 74. Others on the A team scored as follows: Mike Davis 76; Randy Bessent 81; Craig Bessent 83; Bobby Duncan 84. Members of the B team shot as follows: Mickey Baker 83; David Meadows 84; Clark Tinkler 100; Barry Clark 103.

Medalist standings in the district race place Wornack's 152 in the lead; B. Matlock 158; 3. Mike Davis 162; tied for 4 are R. Bessent, Terry Warnock and Billy Donaldson with 164.

Stella Bickley and Liz Bickley were selected to forward positions on the mythical team.

In addition, Miss Cooley was selected as a guard on the second team of All-State players by the Amarillo Globe-News.

Girls receiving honorable mention in the District 9-A selections were guard Carla Wojtek and forward Vicki Gartman of Robert Lee.

Only member of the Robert Lee Steer team to gain All-District honors was senior Doug Herford.

Three elections will be held in Robert Lee Saturday as qualified voters go to the polls to elect two school board trustees, two directors of the West Coke County Hospital District and three city aldermen.

Only three candidates are running for the three positions on the City Council, but there are contested races in the school board and hospital board elections.

The city election will be held in the City Hall with Opal Jacoby serving as election judge. Hank Baker, Lewis Heuvel and Allen Clendennen are seeking the three positions as city aldermen. Incumbents Frank Hearn and Dale Wojtek did not seek re-election and the other position to be filled is the spot vacated by Robert Large when he resigned in January. Holdover members of the Council are Aldermen Jimmy Bell and Royce Hood and Mayor S.

E. Adams.

Three candidates are running for the two vacancies on the school board. D. J. Walker Jr. and Foy Askins, incumbents, and Ben Bessent are on the ballot. It has been reported to the Observer that a write-in campaign is underway in the school trustee election. Holdover trustees are Bobby Baker, Glen Wornack, J. C. Wallace Jr., Wilbern Millican and Joe Flowers. The election will be held at the school building with Jeffie Roberts the presiding judge.

Four candidates' names are on the ballots for the West Coke County Hospital board election and two places are to be filled. Candidates include one incumbent, W. E. Jacoby, plus Joe R. Ash, Maurice Yarbrough and Derwood Mumford. Incumbent Victor Wojtek did not seek re-election. Holdover directors are J. D. Harmon, Finnell Smith and Fern Havins. The election will be held at the courthouse with Patti Ivey the judge.

Polls in all three election will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

According to a check Wednesday morning absentee voting was light with eight casting ballots in the school trustee election, three for city aldermen and two for hospital district directors.

Funeral services for Mrs. John (Ollie Millicent) Cole, 87, a former long-time resident of the Sanco community, died at 7:20 a.m. Tuesday in the Sweetbriar Nursing Home in Brenham. Mrs. Cole and her late husband were also former residents of Bronte.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday (today) in the Robert Lee Baptist Church, with the Rev. Roy Epperson, pastor, officiating.

Burial will be beside the grave of her husband in the Sanco Cemetery, directed by Newby Funeral Home.

The former Ollie Goss was born Nov. 29, 1887, in Cook County, came to Coke County at an early age, and lived many years in the Sanco community.

She was married to John Cole of Sanco where they lived for many years. They later moved to San Marcos and then lived in Bronte for several years. Mr. Cole died several years ago. She had lived in Brenham three years and had been a resident of a nursing home there since last December.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Bernice Nickels of Brenham and Mrs. Nell Longwood of San Antonio; eight grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

County Pharmacies Burglarized

A number of burglaries which have occurred in Robert Lee during the past are being cleared up, according to Sheriff J. Lee Ensor.

However, in spite of the jailing of four suspects and the release of another on bond and charges being filed against a sixth, more burglaries took place last Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Ensor said he expects to have several more suspects under arrest by the end of the next week.

The burglaries last weekend involved drug stores, the Coke County Pharmacy in Robert Lee and Hurley Pharmacy in Bronte. The same burglars apparently robbed both stores, as their method of operation was about the same. Both stores were entered through the back door after it was rammed open by

some sort of attachment to the front of an automobile.

Hurley said the intruders took approximately 1500 pills and some injections from his store, valued at about \$150. They also took valuable insurance papers, an electronic calculator and a Bible.

Irv Zeitler, operator of Coke County Pharmacy, said the burglars were not quite so hard on him, as they took only about 600 pills valued at approximately \$50.

Sheriff Ensor and Deputy Marshall Millican are being assisted in the investigation by Texas Ranger Arthur Sikes of San Angelo.

Ensor said he felt arrests of five persons and arrests which are to follow would clear up a number of Robert Lee burglaries, including those at:

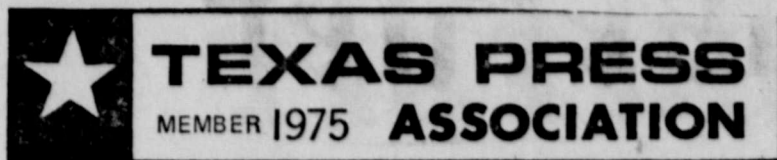
Bell Auto Parts, Roach's Dry Goods, a car belonging to I. B. Ball, Jack Trimble's Recreation Hall, a shed behind a house belonging to S. E. Adams, the O. G. Kennedy house, Mathews Lumber Co., Texaco Service, another car burglary (owner not identified), Northside Church of Christ, and the theft of a car from the parking lot of Ivey Motor Co.

Ensor said a theft case in Nolan County was cleared up through questioning of the Coke County suspects.

Ensor said the theft cases are being followed up and more suspects probably will be arrested during the next few days.

Sensible food shopping is important to every homemaker, and it doesn't happen automatically.

A plan of action helps get the shopping trip organized. This can include tentative menus for a week, based on the Basic Four Food Guide, and a shopping list based on these menus.

Write out the list and don't rely on memory — the list will help avoid impulse buying.

Watch the newspaper for advertised specials and bargains. And in the store, watch for unadvertised specials. These may cause a change in menus, so the plan of action should be fairly flexible.

Turning to specific advice, compare quality and prices at different stores. It's usually desirable to pick a convenient, reasonably priced store and stay with it.

Compare quality and prices of store brands as well as national brands. Sometimes store brands may be cheaper and a better buy. Reading the label will help consumers compare nutritional information to determine which is the best buy.

Purchase the right quantity to fit the family's needs. As a rule, larger quantities of staples may be cheaper. But if they spoil before being used, they're no bargain.

One important consideration in making a plan of action is family preference. The plan should be flexible enough to meet the needs of the changing market also.

Sweetness—The Choice Is Yours
Recently consumers have been faced with the fluctuating cost of sugar and are looking for alternative sweeteners.

The common sweetening alternatives include brown sugar, corn syrup, honey, maple syrup, molasses or sorghum and artificial sweeteners. The sweeteners may be more or less expensive than sugar, and consumers will need to check local prices to determine which alternative is the best buy.

A new publication, MP-1176, "Sweetness—The Choice Is Yours," helps consumers determine costs comparisons of different sugar alternatives. In addition, a sweetening conversion chart, general sweetening stretchers and recipes using sugar alternatives are given.

Coach Butler Not Re-Hired

The contract of Coach Kenneth Butler was not renewed for another year, and the matter has disturbed the community greatly, according to response received during the last couple of weeks at the Observer office. Butler is junior high boys athletic coach, assistant high school football coach and teaches Texas history and American history in the classroom.

According to the minutes of the March 6 meeting of the school board, when the motion was made to re-hire Butler, the vote was tied with Glen Womack, Bobby Baker and J. C. Wallace Jr. voting to renew his contract, and casting votes against Butler's re-hiring were Joe Flowers, Foy Askins and Wilbern Millican. Board President D. J. Walker Jr. cast the deciding vote. Walker was contacted by telephone last week, but said he had no comment to make on the matter.

Since he had not had any previous indication that he was not going to be re-hired, Butler requested a hearing with the board which was held March 17. Petitions bearing approximately 150 signatures supporting Butler and asking that he be re-hired, were presented to the board prior to the hearing. However, in a vote taken by the board members following the meeting with Butler, the result was the same with four against him and three for him.
