Chasing the Assassin.

A Santa Fe dispatch of November 28th says: The remains of Col. J. Francisco Sanches Chaves arrived in Santa Fe this morning from Pinos Wells, where he was assassinated Sat urday evening. They will lie in state at the capitol Wednesday forenoon. The funeral will take place Wednesday afternoon.

The territory is thoroughly aroused over the deed and this afternoon Governor Otero, Solomon Luna and other leading men held a conference on ways and means to effect the speedy capture and conviction of the assassin. Suspicion is well fixed, but no tangible proof has been disclosed.

The bloodhounds from the penitentiary took up the trail of the murderer last evening and followed it for a mile, when darkness set in. The traff was aken up again this morning.

New Teachers.

The Board of Regents of the New Mexico Agricultural and Mechanic Arts College at Las Cruces met at Las Cruces December 1st and elected Professor Charles E. Paul of the Kansas State Agricultural College, head of the mechanical department of the territorial institution, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Professor Charles Mills, made necessary by the continued illness of Mrs. Mills. Mr and Mrs. Mills will take up their resi dence at San Diego, California.

The board also elected Miss Mand E McFie, daughter of Judge John B. Mc-Fie, to the position of teacher of vocal music, which was made vacant by the death of Miss Nona Murphy. Miss Mc-Fle is at present studying music in Paris but will return to America in time to take up the duties of her new position by January.

Fire at Indian School.

An Albuquerque dispatch of December 2nd says: A fire of unknown origin destroyed the industrial depart ment building of the government Indian school here early this morning; resulting in a loss to the government of between \$1,800 and \$2,000.

Mr. Allen, superintendent of the school, said this afternoon that the fire started about 6 o'clock, while the children were at breakfast. Although it had a good start when first discovered, nearly all the goods in the department were saved by hard work on the part of the faculty and students. The building was a frame structure. 110x30 feet, and housed the shoe shop, the failor shop and two carpenter shops. It will be rebuilt immediately.

The city fire department received an alarm from the school by telephone and went to the fire, but the building was almost totally destroyed by the time the department reached the scene.

Five men said to belong to a band of cattle rustlers operating near the Bell ranch, were brought to Las Vegas on the 28th first, charged with having been caught in the act of slaughtering four head of stock. The Bell ranch people have been on the verge of war with the rustiers for months. Many miles of fences have been cut cattle have been killed or driven off and one man, who disappeared, is said to have been murdered by the rustlers.

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Pueblo Indians Dissatisfied.

An Albuquerque dispatch of Novem ber 26th says: Pablo Abeita, the secretary to the governor of the Pueblo Indian vilage of Isleta, was in the city to-day to consult with Ellsworth Ingalls of Kansas, a special government attorney.

Abeita says the Pueblo Indians are dissatisfied with the land courts and other courts of the United States government, with the manner in which they have been treated, and the encroachments of the white man, without any interference from the government, upon their lands. He says a conference of the delegates from all the villages was held at Sandia village the other day, and four delegates, one of whom is his brother, marcelino Abeita, were selected to visit the City of Mexico, confer with President Diaz, and hunt up in the archives of the Mexican government old documents of grants of land and concessions to the Pueblo Indians which were made by the Mexican government under the Guadalupe Hidalgo, and other treaties with the United States.

Abeitas says this government has cut up their grants, giving them worthless patented lands, and the documents which they will secure from the Mexican government will prove that the United States has not treated them fairly.

"If the Pueblo Indians," said Abeita, "always peaceful and law abiding, cannot get justice from this great government, the Indians sooner or later will have to open negotiations with the Mexican government of the estalishment of a colony of Pueblo Indians in that republic.'

The Abeitas are enlightened Indians and fluently speak and write the English language.

Deputy Sheriff Fined.

Vicente Afmijo, deputy sheriff of Bernalillo county, had a load of suspense lifted off his shoulders yesterday when Judge Baker in the District Court fined the deputy \$50 for contempt of court. Armijo paid the fine. It had been hanging over his head for just a year and a month, in fact since he served a warrant upon Ignacio Gutierrez, a prominent citizen of Corralles, while that gentleman was serving as judge of election of ditch commissioners in October of 1903. The serving of the warrant was not the offense of Armijo against the court but it was the condition of the warrant when it was presented to Gutier-The clause allowing the furnishing of bond, which is printed on all warrants save those for capital crimes, had been scratched from this warrant. Armijo told Gutierrez, when the latter desired to furnish bond, that the clause had been scratched off the warrant by the court. This. of course. proved to be untrue, the clause in question having been removed in the sheriff's office. Sheriff Thomas Hubbell testified on the stand, when the case came up for hearing, that he knew nothing about the issuance of the warrant or the scratching of the bond clause, and this let the blame fall on Armijo, the court announcing that he would take the penalty under consider ation. It had been under consideration ever since until yesterday, when the fine was imposed.

The arrest of Gutierrez in October. 1903, it is alleged was part of a scheme to "throw" the acequia election, in which he was judge.

Gutierrez not only carried influence n Corralles, but in his position as judge he could look after the sacred ballots being deposited in the box in his precinct. The warrant was issued and when served on him he promptly offered bond. This was refused, Arm ijo telling him that the bond clause had been stricken from the warrant and that the court desired to see him at once, thus forcing him to quit the election booth. The plan worked successfully, since the opponents of Gutierrez carried the day.—Albuquerque Journal.

Drowned in "Fool Killer." Stevensville, Mich., Dec. 2.-Peter

Nissen, who started across Lake Michigan in his boat "Fool Killer No. 3," was found dead on the beach two and a half miles west of here yesterday. He is supposed to have been washed ashore during the night. His "Fool Killer' was about twenty rods down the beach from the body and was much damaged. A life preserver and his overcoat were fastened to the basketshaped car in the boat. The body was brought to Stevensville, where it lies in the town hall. The hands and face are frozen and the features reflect his suffering. The clothing on the body was somewhat torn. It is thought that Nissen could not have been dead a great while when the body was

found, as rigor mortis had not set in. When the wrecked aquatic balloon was examined one of Nissen's business cards was found, on the back of which was a note from the dead adventurer. saying an air hose upon which he depended to renew his supply of air had broken and that he was doomed to die

Internal Revenue Receipts.

Washington, Dec. 2.—The annual report of Commissioner Yerkes of the Internal Revenue Bureau shows that for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1904. the receipts of the bureau were \$232,-904,004, an increase of \$2,163,079 over the collections for the next year preceding. The cost of collection was 1.93 per cent. as against 2.07 for the year 1903 and 2.83 per cent., the average cost of collection since the formation of the bureau.

The estimated receipts from sources of internal revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1906, are \$230,000,000.

Tunnel Scheme Approved. San Francisco, Dec. 2 .- Jacob Schiff, the New York banker, who is heavily interested in the Hawalian roads, while here recently approved E. d. The total receipts from all sources for the fiscal year were \$143. months and during that time nothing 582,624, and the total expenditures \$152,362,116, leaving a deficit of \$8, 779,492. The deficiency the previous year was \$4,560,044. Mr. Madden says: "It is believed that as soon as the rural free delivery service is fully established the increase in the expenditures on account of that service each year will not be more than the normal increase for other nems of the service and that within a short time after such normal conditions obtain the postal service will again be self-sustaining, a condition which has not existed since 1883."

Extension of the free delivery service has resulted in an increase of 1.12a in the number of postoffices discontinued during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1904, according to the annual report of J. L. Bristow, fourth assistant postmaster general. During the year there were 2,549 postoffices established and 5,587 discontinued. SENTENCED FOR FRAUD.

Colorado Supreme Court Punishes Election Thieves.

Denver, Dec. 6.—With formalities so brief that the entire proceedings consumed less than ten minutes, the Supreme Court yesterday morning imposed jail sentences and heavy fines upon four officials from Ward 5, Precinct 8, and discharged a fifth, against The four men were convicted of having violated the court's injunctive order regarding the Denver elec-

Chief Justice Gabbert delivered the decision of the court, the other members concurring. The court's findings follow in full:

"The court finds that you, Frank Kratke, Joseph Ray, Charles Kofsky and Edward O'Malia, willfully violated the mandates of the injunction issued in the case of the People ex rel. vs. Tool, being docket No. 4,930 on the records of this court, in two particulars: "First-With respect to the appointment of an election clerk in Precinct

8 of Ward 5. "Second-In permitting divers and sundry persons to repeatedly vote at such election. You are, therefore, adjudged guilty of contempt in manner and form as charged in the informa-

"In pronouncing sentence we shall take into consideration the moral turpitude involved in the commission of the acts which constitute the attempt of which you have been found guilty. There can be no doubt, from the testimony, but that the two judges of election and Clerk O'Malia knowingly and willfully permitted a great many persons to repeatedly vote at the election to which I have referred. There is not the slightest excuse offered for having committed these unlawful acts. In the commission of these acts you were not only aided and abetted by the respondent, Frank Kratke, but by his presence and his actions he encouraged and protected persons in the commission of these unlawful acts in the way of re-

"The court adjudges as a punishment that the respondent, Frank Kratke, shall be confined in the common jail of the city and county of Denver for the period of one year, and fined in the sum of \$1,000 and costs, to stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

"The respondents, Joseph Ray and Ed. O'Malia, are committed to the common jast of the city and county of Denver for the period of six months, each fined in the sum of \$500 and coste, to stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

"The respondent, Kofsky, is committed to the common jail of the city and county of Denver for the period of three months and is fined in the sum of \$250 and costs, and will stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

"We are not satisfied from the testimony that the respondent, Carl Wilson, is guilty, and for that reason he will be discharged."

Japanese Defeat Reported.

lows: "The naval estimates for the ne fiscal year are large, the largest ev submitted, notwithstanding the fa that they have been cut down fro those sent in by the bureaus more tha those sent in by the bureaus more than \$17,000,000. We have asked for less than the money actually required to continue the naval program as laid down by the general board, of which Admiral Dewey is the head, notwithstanding all who have studied the question carefully agree that this pregramme should be carried out.

The past year was an important one in the history of our naval construc-tion. Never before were so many war inform him that Congress was ready to ships launched by this or any other nation in one year. Vessel for vessel and type for type I believe our new ships will compare favorably with those of character of work now being accomplished, not only in construction, but

in all branches of the service. "New ships necessarily require more officers, more marines and more enlisted men, and the appropriations are quite likely to increase steadily for some years to come. The more ships we have the greater our fixed charges make repairs and take proper care of the fleet.

"Attention is earnestly invited to the recommendations made to the chief of the Bureau of Navigation respecting the need for more officers and men in order to carry on the work of the navy. It is useless to build ships unless provision is made to man, care for and use them.

Secretary Morton favors medals of honor of two classes in the navy-as in the army-one class for acts of gallantry in times of peace, the other for heroism in war. The savings system for enlisted men





New Teachers.

Fire at Indian School.

An Albuquerque dispatch of December 2nd says: A fire of unknown origin destroyed the industrial depart ment building of the government Indian school here early this morning; resulting in a loss to the government of between \$1,800 and \$2,000.

Mr. Allen, superintendent of the school, said this afternoon that the fire started about 6 o'clock, while the children were at breakfast. Although it had a good start when first discovered, nearly all the goods in the department were saved by hard work on the part of the faculty and students. The building was a frame structure, 110x30 feet, and housed the shoe shop, the tailor shop and two carpente

shops. It will be rebuilt immediately. The city fire department received an alarm from the school by telephone and went to the fire, but the building was almost totally destroyed by the time the department reached the

Pueblo Indiana Dissatisfied.

An Albuquerque dispatch of November 26th says: Pablo Abeita, the secretary to the governor of the Pueblo Indian vilage of Isleta, was in the city to-day to consult with Ellsworth Ingalls of Kansas, a special government

attorney. Abeita says the Pueblo Indians are dissatisfied with the land courts and other courts of the United States government, with the manner in which they have been treated, and the encroachments of the white man, without any interference from the government, upon their lands. He says a conference of the delegates from all the villages was held at Sandia village the other day, and four delegates one of whom is his brother, Marcelino Abeita, were selected to visit the City of Mexico, confer with President Diaz, and hunt up in the archives of the Mexican government old documents of grants of land and concessions to the Pueblo Indians which were made by the Mexican government under the Guadalupe Hidalgo, and other treaties with the United States.

Abeitas says this government has cut up their grants, giving them worthless patented lands, and the documents which they will secure from the Mexican government will prove that the United States has not treated them

"If the Pueblo Indians," said Abeita, 'always peaceful and law abiding, cannot get justice from this great government, the Indians sooner or later will have to open negotiations with the Mexican government of the estalishment of a colony of Pueblo In-

dians in that republic. The Abeitas are enlightened Indians and fluently speak and write the English language.

Deputy Sheriff Fined.

Vicente Afmijo, deputy sheriff of Bernalillo county, had a load of suspense lifted off his shoulders yesterday when Judge Baker in the District Court fined the deputy \$50 for contempt of court. Armijo paid the fine. It had been hanging over his head for just a year and a month, in fact since he served a warrant upon Ignacio Gutierrez, a prominent citizen of Corralles, while that gentleman was serving as judge of election of ditch commissioners in October of 1903. The serving of the warrant was not the offense of Armijo against the court but it was the condition of the warrant when it was presented to Gutierrez. The clause allowing the furnishing of bond, which is printed on all warrants save those for capital crimes, had been scratched from this warrant. Armijo told Gutierrez, when the latter desired to furnish bond, that the clause had been scratched off the warrant by the court. This, of course question having been removed in the sheriff's office. Sheriff Thomas Hubbell testified on the stand, when the case came up for hearing, that he knew nothing about the issuance of the warrant or the scratching of the bond clause, and this let the blame fall on Armijo, the court announcing that he would take the penalty under consideration. It had been under consideration ever since until yesterday, when the fine was imposed.

The arrest of Gutierrez in October, 1903, it is alleged was part of a scheme to "throw" the acequia elec-

tion, in which he was judge. Gutierrez not only carried influence in Corralles, but in his position as judge he could look after the sacred ballots being deposited in the box in his precinct. The warrant was issued and when served on him he promptly offered bond. This was refused. Armijo telling him that the bond clause had been stricken from the warrant and that the court desired to see him at once, thus forcing him to quit the election booth. The plan worked successfully, since the opponents of Gutierrez carried the day.—Albuquerque Journal.

Petrolinio Jaramillo was convicted at Las Vegas of the theft of a cow by evidence showing he had possession of the hide and had fresh meat in the house. As he always had borne a good reputation and the evidence was circumstantial the judge sentenced him to eighteen months and remitted the sentence during good behavior.

An Albuquerque dispatch of November 30th says: The Bernalillo county commissioner case took a sensational turn this afternoon when Severo Sanchez, the governor's first appointee telegraphed his resignation to the capital, thus leaving the office open to Carlos P. Sanchez, the governor's second appointee. The latter's bond, which was refused at the recorder's office yesterday, was accepted to-day and the situation is again serene, except that there is a possibility that T. C. Gutierrez will resign on the morrow. If this occurs the board of county commissioners will be antagonistic to the county administration, which has ruled the past six years, and startling developments in county affairs may be ex pected.

Because he shot a friend with a load of peas and thought that he had committed murder and would have to go to jall, Ramon Garcia, of the Ranchos de Albuquerque, near Albuquerque, blew his brains out with a pistol. Garcia had been fooling with a gun loaded with dried peas. The gun exploded, the charge of peas striking a young man standing a few feet distant. The latter jokingly fell to the floor, clasping his hands over his breast, and pretended to be lifeless. Garcia thought his friend dead and ran home and committed suicide.

END OF ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION CAUSES POSTOFFICE DEFICIT

Department Shows Nearly Double the Tribute to the Memory of the Late Sen-Deficiency of Previous Year-Decrease in Number of Postoffices.

Washington, Dec. 3 .- An increased previous year is shown by the financial statement for the postal service, incorporated in the annual report of E. C. Madden, third assistant postmaster general, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904. The report shows however, that the increase in expenditures is on account of the rural free delivery service. Were it not for this extraordinary expenditure the postal service now would be about self-sustaining. The total receipts from all sources for the fiscal year were \$143. 582,624, and the total expenditures \$152,362,116, leaving a deficit of \$8, 779,492. The deficiency the previous year was \$4,560,044. Mr. Madden says: "It is believed that as soon as the rural free delivery service is fully established the increase in the expendi tures on account of that service each year will not be more than the normal increase for other uems of the service and that within a short time after such normal conditions obtain the

SENTENCED FOR FRAUD.

Colorado Supreme Court Punishes Election Thieves.

Denver, Dec. 6.-With formalities so brief that the entire proceedings consumed less than ten minutes, the Supreme Court yesterday morning imposed jail sentences and heavy fines upon four officials from Ward 5. Precinct 8, and discharged a fifth, against found. The four men were convicted of having violated the court's injunctive order regarding the Denver election

Chief Justice Gabbert delivered the decision of the court, the other members concurring. The court's findings

"The court finds that you, Frank Kratke, Joseph Ray, Charles Kofsky and Edward O'Malia, willfully violated the mandates of the injunction issued in the case of the People ex rel. vs. Tool, being docket No. 4,930 on the records of this court, in two particulars: "First-With respect to the appoint-

ment of an election clerk in Precinct 8 of Ward 5. "Second-In permitting divers and sundry persons to repeatedly vote at such election. You are, therefore, adjudged guilty of contempt in manner and form as charged in the informa-

"In pronouncing sentence we shall take into consideration the moral turpitude involved in the commission of the acts which constitute the attemp of which you have been found guilty There can be no doubt, from the testimony, but that the two judges of election and Clerk O'Malia knowingly and willfully permitted a great many persons to repeatedly vote at the election to which I have referred. There is not the slightest excuse offered for having committed these unlawful acts. In the commission of these acts you were not only aided and abetted by the respondent, Frank Kratke, but by his presence and his actions he encouraged and protected persons in the commission of these unlawful acts in the way of re-

"The court adjudges as a punishment that the respondent, Frank Kratke, shall be confined in the common jail of the city and county of Denver for the period of one year, and fined in the sum of \$1,000 and costs, to stand committed until such fine and costs are paid. :

"The respondents, Joseph Ray and Ed. O'Malia, are committed to the common jail of the city and county of Denver for the period of six months, and each fined in the sum of \$500 and costs, to stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

"The respondent, Kofsky, mitted to the common jail of the city and county of Denver for the of three months and is fined in the sum of \$250 and costs, and will stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

We are not satisfied from the testimony that the respondent, Carl Wilson, is guilty, and for that reason he will be discharged."

Japanese Defeat Reported.

Mukden, Dec. 6.-There is a persist ent rumor that the force of Japanese sent to turn General Rennenkampf's flank has been repulsed with great loss. The story is not yet officially confirmed, but details are given with great circumstantiality.
It is stated that General Rennen-

kampff, who knew the movement was maturing, awaited the Japanese at the mouth of one of the captured passes and the Japanese turning force threw themselves unsuspectingly into the ambuscade, where, after the fight, the Russians - collected 500 Japanese corpses. It is added that there are 1,000 more Japanese corpses which it has been impossible to collect, owing to the fire of the Japanese. This does not include the Japanese loss in

The Russian loss, according to this account, was only thirty or forty men.

The weapon used was a colts 44 caliber revolver, the ball entered the face just under the left eye and came out at the back of the head just at the base of the brain. Death was instantaneous. Hinton had only been in this county about three weeks. The story of the trouble is

Hinton had been to town in the afternoon and was drinking some but was not drunk. He came to his place about three and one half miles east of town and ordered his wife to get some shells for his revolver, saying that he was going to a literary society. Mrs. Hinton refused, whereupon he set to beating her after which he drove her and her sister, who was staying with her. out of the house threatening to kill them if they ever returned. Mrs. Hinton went to her father's house one half mile west, and told them what had happened. Willis Large her brother, then came to town, arriving about dark, and requested Deputy Sheriff Johnson to go with him and arrest Hinton. Johnson refused to go without a warrant. Large then called by phone Justice of the peace Morris and asked him to come to his office and issue a warrant for the arrest. Morris agreed but after communicating by phone with Johnson it was decided not to do anything until morning. Large begged and entreated the officer to go with him but to no purpose. finally he remarked, "well I guess I will have to go and do the best I

Arriving at his father's house at about 8 o'clock he found there his father, mother, two sisters and grandmother doing what they could for his other sister, Mrs Hinton, who was having spasms resulting from fright and beating. On Tuesday night, December 6, Jack Hinton was shot and killed by Willis Large, his brother-in-law. The weapon used was a colts 44 caliber revolver, the ball entered the face just under the left eye and came out at the back of the head just at the base of the brain. Death was instantaneous. Hinton had only been in this county about three weeks. The story of the trouble is as follows:

Hinton had been to town in the afternoon and was drinking some but was not drunk. He came to his place about three and one half miles east of town and ordered his wife to get some shells for his revolver, saying that he was going to a literary society. Mrs. Hinton refused, whereupon he set to beating her after which he drove her and her sister, who was staying with her, out of the house threatening to kill them if they ever returned. Mrs. Hinton went to her father's house one half mile west, and told them what had happened. Willis Large her brother, then came to town, arriving about dark, and requested Deputy Sheriff Johnson to go with him and arrest Hinton. Johnson refused to go without a warrant. Large then called by phone Justice of the peace Morris and asked him to come to his office and issue a warrant for the arrest. Morris agreed but after communicating by phone with Johnson it was decided not to do anything until morning. Large begged and entreated the officer to go with bim but to no purpose, finally he remarked, "well I guess I will have to go and do the best I can" and departed.
