The following is Senate Bill No. 125 , introduced by Mr. Evans. Be it enacted by the legislature

The hours of work may be soarranged as to permit the emoyment they shall not than nine hours during the wenty four

Every employer in es dishments where such female are employed shall provide suitbermit the for them and sha hem when they are not engage in the active duties for which they are employed, and every such employer shall keep posted In a conspicuous place in each room where such females are at work a copy of this act printed in
both English and Spanish. Sec. 3. Any employer seer, superintendeut or other agent of such emsployer who shall violate any of the provisions of this Act shail, upon conviction thereof, be fined for each offence
in a sum not less than twenty
dollars nor more than ant dollars nor m
dred dollars.
