## PORTALES PUBLIC SCHOOLS DOING BEST WORK IN THE HISTORY OF TOWN

A VISIT THROUGH THEM IS MORE THAN WORTH THE TIME OF ANYONE AND SHOULD BE MADE BY EVERY PARENT OR GUARDIAN

The Portales Public schools seem to have the least space given them in the newspapers of the county in any public institution of the county and accordingly one of the friends of the institution will give in the following short outline a summary of the teachers and their work.

Miss Anderson who has the first grade and also the primary tells us that her work is fine this year and it seems to the observer that it must be from the way that the little tots who are in her charge do the work that is told them to do. Miss Anderson seems to be a natural leader for the little folks and the drill which she was giving them during the short stay of the writer proved that the little boys and girls put complete confidence in her and did whatever she said without a murmur.

Miss Vera Humphrey's room which was the next visited proved to be one of the most interesting of all of the rooms of the school and here it was proven once more that it does not always take an experienced teacher to get results. The morning that the writer was in the room was on New Year's morning and the little second graders were making or rather writing their New Year resolutions. Miss Vera stated that she had given them no idea as to what to write with the exception that she told them what a resolution was and as the writer looked over the papers of all of the pupils it was peculiar that each and every child had virtually the same thing written on his or her paper. Such resolutions as "I will mind my teacher, I will study hard, I will not curse, I will not smoke, I will be good", and numbers of others which bordered on these proved very decidedly to the writer that they had training from Miss Vera along these lines or they would not have all had the same thing or so near to it. Another thing that was noticed about this room was the cleanliness and orderliness of the room. When Miss Vera spoke to the children they obeyed the minute they were spoken to and did it with the action that signified that they knew they would please their teacher if they did as they were told the first time.

From the second to the third grade room was not so much of a jump as the second and third grade teachers seem to have several thoughts in common when it comes to teaching but the third grade teacher works on and says that her hobby is to have perfect lessons in her room. Miss Leahy gave the writer the names of six children who have had perfect lessons for as many as sixteen times in succession and one of these children had even done better, having perfect lessons in everything for two weeks and never failing on anything. Another of the hobbies of Miss

Leahy is the drawing work in her room in which she uses to teach the children elementary drawing and also to decorate the room. Her blackboard was adorned by holly and bells which had been put on by the children and showed the taste of grown ups in the work. The children of this room also do work in drawing by listening to stories read and then drawing these stories. One sample of this work was on the board and portrayed the three wise men of the East on their camels going to the star.

Next into the fourth grade room drawing and singing were the most noticeable features outside of the regular book work and Miss Reece states that her children have learned this year more than or about ten songs and that the singing of them puts them into a mood to work which helps them all in the world. She is at present working on a cantata with them to be given soon for the school and the people of the town may look for something real good when it comes. Miss Reece is making a specialty of her drawing in order that the children get the benefit of the maps that they draw and as has been demonstrated by all good teachers of geography the map is one of the best ways to get geography into the child's head and keep it there even if is a beginner like these fourth graders or a senior in geography. Miss Reece has perfect order in her room and says that on a whole her work is better this year than last and the children certainly seem to be satisfied with their teacher and work.

From the fourth grade room we pass into the fifth and sixth grade room which is on the second floor of the building and here we find another teacher that has not had very much experience but is also making good with her children. She seems to be known among her children as the "pretty teacher" and, well of course its none of our business about that but we could say a few things about that ourselves. Miss Fern Foglesong has one of the hardest rooms to manage in the school from the fact that she has two grades for one thing and from the fact that the fifth graders are introduced from their primary work to the intermediate work. She has the great ordeal of trying to teach them their first work in fractions and all of us who have ever had to sit down and go over dozens of times the same example for some child who was just beginning the study of these trouble makers will appreciate the work that she is doing. One thing that we can say for her though is that she is getting the children to understand and that is more than can be said of some teachers who try to teach fractions to a beginners class: Miss Foglesong herself is an enthusiast over reading and

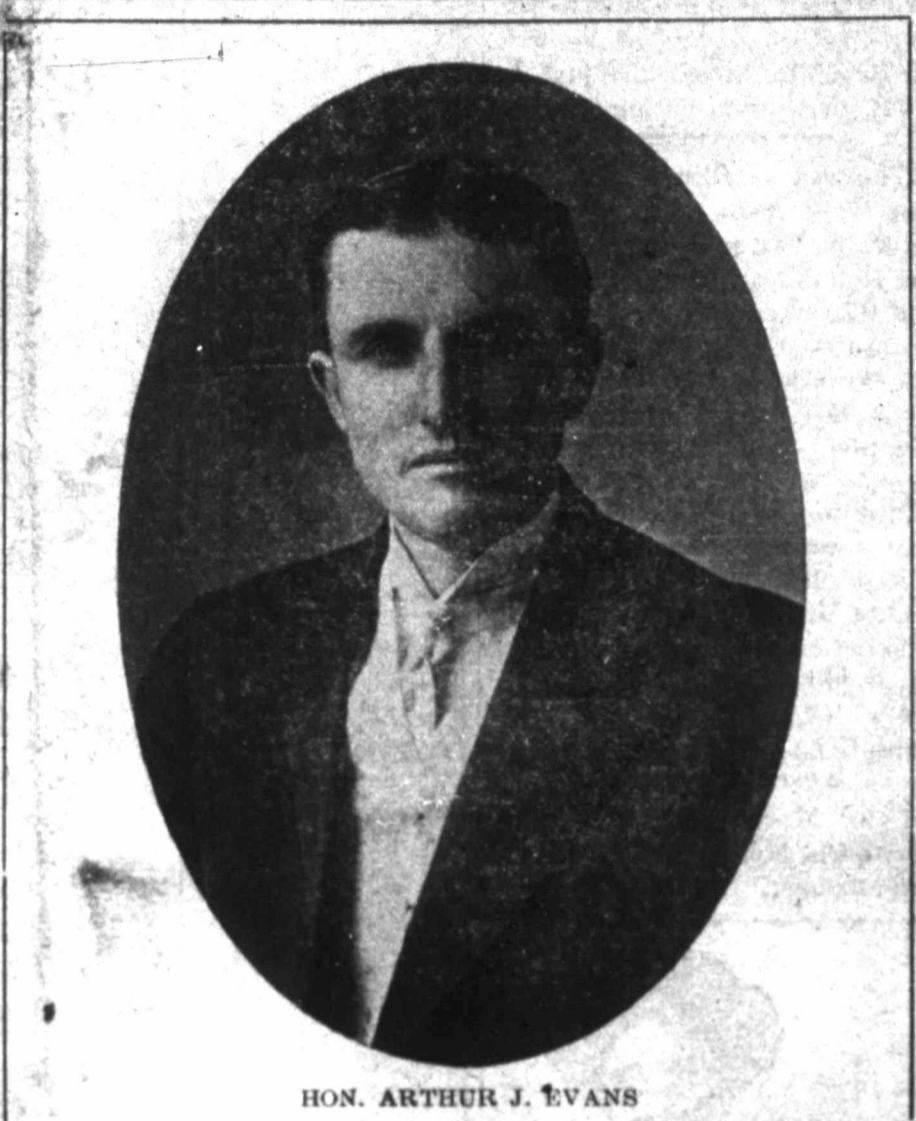
English and says that her best work is along this line. If it is as good as the arithmetic work that the writer saw it must be fine.

Now into the terrible seventh graders. Here is where pupil generally rules teacher unless teacher be some big man who says jump and jump is what happens but in this school Miss Effie Anderson has charge of the seventh graders and she doesn't seem to have any more trouble with them than her sister down stairs has with the first graders. They seem to like their teacher and are doing some fine work for her. It seems that in most of their studies that they are ahead of the page that they should be to by this time of the session. Their English work is perfection itself and Miss Anderson says that they seem to enjoy English possibly more than anything else. She herself is an English enthusiast and of course they more or less absorb the manners and teachings of their teacher.

From the seventh grade we go into Mr. Stafford's room, the eighth grade and here we see what is termed the best class in school by all of the high school and eighth grade instructors. These pupils are under the four instructors, Mr. Deen, Mr. Stafford, Mr. Strickland and Miss Foglesong. These four teachers agree that that the eighth grade are doing the best work in the school and especially in the high school and departmental work. They are being crowded to the limit in order that when they enter the high school next year they will be ahead of the ninth grade or Freshmen and not behind them. Some of the brightest pupils of the school are in this room and before they have finished the high school many things will be heard about them.

Next we go into what is known at the high school as the history room and it shows more taste in the decoration than any other of the school rooms. The walls are festooned with pennants of different schools over the United States showing the spirit of the pupils and teacher, Miss Foglesong. Miss Foglesong is herself and enthusiast over history and she says that the school will in the near future have the best reputation for history of any school in New Mexico and possibly in the west if she can have the equipment and the assistance from the school board and patrons that she has from the students. She selected all history pictures for the room when the pictures were selected for the school and also two large frames were selected which contain the Declaration of Independence and the Gettysburg Address of Abraham Lincoln. Miss Foglesong also called attention to the fact that her room had been recently kalsimined by the Woman's Republic and she states that she

## SENATOR EVANS EXPRESSES HIMSELF

HE SPEAKS OF THE COUNTY SALARY BILL AND OTHER THINGS OF IMPORTANCE

As this week's issue of your paper will be the last before the convening of the legislature, I deem it my duty as well as a pleasure to write my views on some of the leading things that should be done by the legislature at this session.

The county salary bill will be the first bill, in my opinion, to be taken up, of the really important bills. Now the county salary bill is really a big measure, for owing to the many conflicting opinions it is hard to get every one to see alike and get a measure that will suit the taxpayer and the county officer at the same time. Now I have been classified in the list as a low salary man, and if they mean that I am opposed to paying the county officers as much as the state officials, then I plead guilty to emicidment. I am willing to pay the county officials as well as the district officials well for their services, cysnuate with the work they perform and compared to other work simular paid by merchants and corporations. Take a good doorkeeper in a bank or a mercantile establishment, they do not pay, on an average more than \$100.00 per month. Yet you will see some of the county officers wanting \$5000.00 per year. The tax rate now is excessive and if we do not use economy in fixing the salaries and other things coming before the legislature, the tax rate will be so high that people will not invest their money in this state and those having money will leave and invest theirs in states where the rate is reasonable.

I would be pleased if the tax payers would have a meeting and pass a resolution as to what they think the county officials of this county should receive as well as the district attorney and assistant attorney. It has been intima-

ted that the county officials of this state have associations and expect to influence the legislature with a campaign fund or corrupting fund. I do not vouch for this statement for it may be an injustice to the county officials who are to honest and upright to enter into any such unwholy alliance.

Personally I do not think there is any danger of the legislature underpaying any of the county officials unless it be the county superintendent or the county commissioners.

Briefly I will endeavor to give my views as to the compensation of the county officials.

The county should be divided into two classes for salary purposes, class 1 and class 2.

Taking up the sheriff's office first in class 1 counties, I believe he should be paid \$2800.00 per annum net, his traveling expenses and hotel bills being paid by the county. His deputies being allowed by the commissioners court and their salaries paid by the county.

In counties of the second class the sheriff should be paid \$2400.00 per year, the number of deputies and compensation being fixed by the commissioners court and legislature as in counties of the first class.

The Treasurer in counties of the first class should be paid \$2400.00. Their number of assistants being allowed by the commissioners court and their salaries being fixed by the legislature. In counties of the second class the treasurer should be paid \$2000.00 the assistants allowed and paid as in the first class counties.

The tax assessor should be paid in counties of the first and second class the same as the treasurer, assistants allowed and paid as in the treasurer office.

## PRECINCT ELECTION

Monday was precinct election day in precinct number one and a justice of the peace and constable were elected.

The following vote was cast:  
For constable, Bent Clayton, Democrat 165, W. H. Richardson, Socialist 38

For justice of the peace, J. P. Henderson, Democrat 135, Adam Troutt, Democrat 36, Eugene Mayo, Democrat 19, J. J. Roberts, Socialist 20.

The county clerk in counties of the first class should be paid \$200.00 per month and the number of assistants necessary being determined by the commissioners court and their salaries fixed by the legislature.

I think the commissioners in counties of first class should be paid \$800.00 and in second class counties \$500.00.

The superintendent of schools in first class counties should be paid \$2000.00, their assistants allowed and in the other officer's assistants. Superintendents of schools in counties of the second class should be paid \$1500.00 per annum and assistants and their compensation allowed as in superintendents of first class counties.

The classification and compensation as out lined will not please 10 per cent of the county officers and a large number of tax payers, neither can any one draw a salary bill pleasing to every body, it is impossible. I think the county officials should be paid the same for the same work in other lines of business would pay, together with enough over to pay their campaign expenses.

The district attorney of this district should be paid \$3000.00 per annum and the state pay his necessary traveling and hotel expenses. The assistant attorney should receive \$1800.00 per year and his necessary expenses.

Among the legislative acts that should be passed is the creating a board of immigration and appropriating a sum sufficiently large to advertise the state well.

Pass a "Blue sky" act to protect the public from the shark.

One of the most important laws that could be enacted is a direct primary law permitting the people to nominate the officers in stead of the bosses.

The passing a local option prohibition law. Ratifying the constitutional amendment for income tax. Also the constitutional amendment for the election of U.S. Senators by the direct vote of the people.

Overhauling of the tax law, making the rendition at its full valuation and making it felony for any one to swear falsely to his property.

As the law precribes, on the second Tuesday after the convening of the legislature, should proceed to elect a successor to Senator A.B. Fall.

There are many more laws of like importance but I only mention these and hope that the people of this county will do all they can to get these laws enacted. Will be glad to hear from anyone desiring some legislation passed, and on all matters of legislation would like to have your opinion thereon.

**CONVENTION HELD AT ARTESIA AND PORTALES SPEAKS**

**MINISTER CALLED HERE**

**The Matter Of Locating A Sanatorium In State Is Discussed**

The third annual district convention of the Christian Church of the Pecos Valley met at Artesia January 7-9. A very important question to Portales was considered, that of placing a minister at the Central Christian church for three-fourths of the time. A liberal apportionment was given from the state board and the membership of the church are responding with their best efforts. The Benevolent Association of the Christian church is considering the matter of locating a sanatorium for tuberculosis some where in the west. A committee was appointed to select favorable localities in New Mexico, and to urge their acceptance. The locating of such sanatoriums in the south-west is a vital necessity in two ways, first for the purpose of giving the needed care that will ensure a larger number to be restored to health by competent treatment, that can only be given in such institutions. The second reason is that by this method of caring for tubercular patients prevents the infection of other members of families. The next District Convention will convene in Portales some time in November. Rev. J. H. Shepard of Clovis was chosen president and J. P. Deen of Portales Vice president.

### RIGHT CARE OF TEETH

MOST HIGHLY DESIRABLE POINT OF BEAUTY.

Increasing Daily Attention and Constant Visits to the Dentist Are Imperative if Good Looks Are to Be Preserved.

A good, firm white set of teeth is more to be desired than a rare string of pearls. Unfortunately, all cannot possess good teeth, but the few women who have a perfectly good white set of teeth should guard them as they would the finest jewels. On good authority, it may be stated that a bad stomach causes bad teeth, and if the stomach is not kept in good condition, no matter how strong the teeth may be, they cannot last.

Germs develop and live almost everywhere. When there is one bad tooth in the mouth, there is certain to be germs. One bad tooth not taken care of in time may lead to many visits to the dentist and possibly the loss of one or more teeth.

Some years back the dentist would be visited once a year, later on twice a year was considered sufficient, but now four times or every three months is deemed none too often to have the dentist look your teeth over. There may be a tiny cavity, so small in fact, that it is revealed only when the dentist looks through his magnifying glass. But that cavity attended to in time will involve small cost, little pain and result in the preservation of the tooth. Sometimes the dentist's examination may fail to reveal a small cavity way down near a root and if you yourself do not find it soon it will mean a good-sized filling when you next visit the dentist. Therefore, if longer than three months is allowed to elapse between the visits to the dentist it is easy to estimate the damage that may result to your teeth.

Much has been written and said concerning the care of the teeth, and in many instances the statements are exaggerated. One of them—that the condition of the teeth depends wholly on the care given them—is arbitrary and untrue. As a matter of cleanliness and means of adding the preservation and whitening to the beauty of the teeth, increasing daily attention should be given to them, but even under these ministrations teeth will decay, lose their color and become useless, and it is not unusual to see rows of "black" white, sound-looking teeth that have never known brush or dentifrice.

Unsound teeth are due to constitutional defects, unless the teeth have been abused by being made to serve as nut-crackers or having some equally abnormal task forced upon them. Their color, too, if dark, may result from the use of iron as a medicine, or from an acid condition of the stomach, and all brushing, cleaning and polishing that may be given them will not restore them to their original whiteness.

There are also teeth which are of a waxy-white or yellow ivory tint. The former have pearly, transparent ideas, indicating a delicate constitution, and they are frail and doomed soon to decay. The latter are strong and generally belong to a person of vigorous constitution, but no amount of brushing or scouring will ever bleach them to whiteness that is not natural to them.

It is claimed by some that sweets are injurious to the teeth. Pure cane sugar candy or maple sugar will not corrode the teeth, even if one partake copiously of these sweets. The teeth need work and exercise, and if properly used and not abused, whatever is good for the stomach and can be properly digested will not harm the teeth.

The real harm is done when crumbs are left in the teeth, especially over night. Then acid accumulates and slowly eats the enamel, and once this occurs there will soon be a cavity.

Never use a toothpick of any kind. For removing the crumbs between the teeth dental floss is better. It should be drawn between the teeth after eating and always before retiring at night. It is not necessary to use powder every day, but it is necessary to brush the teeth morning and night with tepid water to which a pinch or two of borax has been added. This sweetens the breath and keeps the teeth clean. Two or three times a week brush them with powder, and once a month give them a general cleaning with pulverized pumice rinsing the teeth thoroughly afterward.

A cleansing and refreshing tooth powder may be made with the following ingredients:

Equal parts of pre-bleached, chalky powdered orris root, borax and powdered castile soap. Welch these ingredients, and if a half pound or more, five cents worth of oil of wintergreen may be added. Then sift all through several times. When not using, keep closely covered.

If the practice of rinsing the teeth and month after eating were more generally observed, the teeth would last longer and dentists' bills would be fewer. Pour a pint of boiling water over a tablespoonful of bicarbonate of soda. When cool is may be used to rinse the teeth, as this destroys the accumulation of acid. Larzer proportions may be mixed and kept handy for use. It takes but a moment to rinse the teeth, and this precaution helps in a large measure to preserve them.

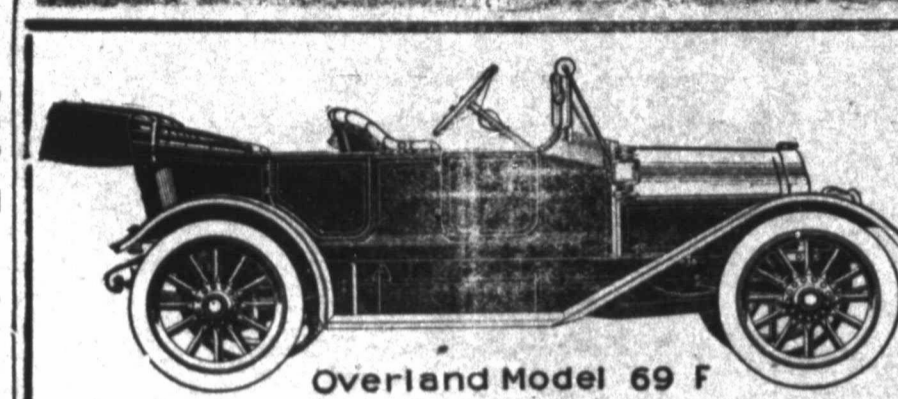

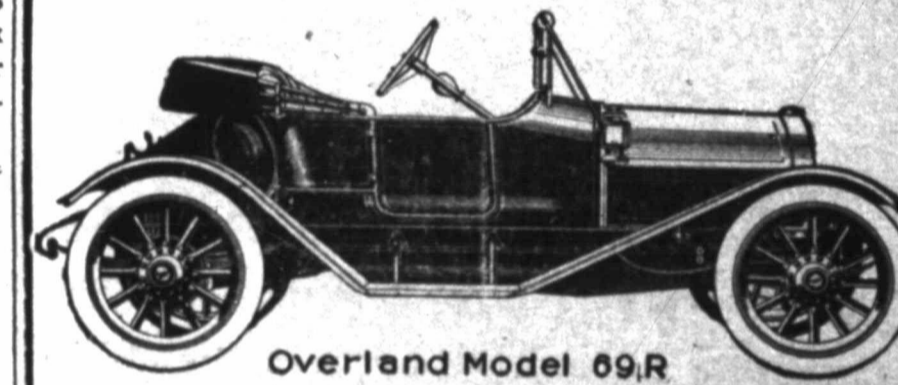

and the pupils are very proud indeed to think that they picked their room over the rest of the school. Miss Foglesong teaches Senior English and German and all of the History classes of the school.

The high school room which was the last school room to be visited was indeed the scene of great activities at the time the writer was there as the morning session was just starting and Rev. Kirkpatrick was to speak to the students that morning. This room is managed by Mr. Strickland, and is the gathering place every morning for all of the high school pupils and the eighth grade where they go to listen to visiting lectures by first one man and then another and when there is no outsider to lecture to them some of the teachers perform the part and give them something interesting for them in the future. Mr. Strickland seems to have perfect control of his room and the branches that he teaches are Trigonometry, Physics, Higher Physiology and eighth grade grammar, spelling and arithmetic. Mr. Strickland is a mathematical man and puts all of his spare time to the study and better mastery of the subject.

Last but not least we went in to the office of the superintendent, Mr. R. A. Deen and here we saw that no dust would ever settle on him so far as being up-to-date was concerned because of the fact that he has rustled we might say and gotten for the school several complete sets of products of the soil which are shown going through the entire process of manufacturing. For instance he has cotton seed in all of its forms, wheat, standard oils,

packing house products and several others. All of these treat of the article mentioned and show it through the entire stage. With all of these products which are shown in bottles or cans come lectures and any room may therefore come and give one of these lectures at any time they may have set out for it. Thus the children get during the year a better knowledge of the way that things are made and raised than the average person knows today.

In a personal talk with Mr. Deen he states that the school is on a much firmer footing this year than last as he knows the scholars and teachers better and also they have confidence in each other and in their school. He says that he has no kick to make except the patrons of the school do not visit it often enough to find what their children are doing. He states that the only drawback they will have this year is the lack of funds possibly and he asks the co-operation of the people in a movement to raise the funds if necessary.
