

Corrosive Sublimate Mercuric: The author has had much better success with this pereservative than any other. It is a very powerful germ destroyer, and like the bichromate of potash, has the advantage of being put up in tablet form. Usully two sizes are offered for sale by the dairy supply houses, one size being sufficient to keep one pint of milk sweet for seven or eight days, and the other or larger size will keep one pint of milk for two weeks. These tables are more expensive than any of the other preservatives, but always satisfaction. Corrosive sublimate is very strong poison, but the tablets are usually comined with coloring matter that gives a warning color to the milk.

> Chloraform, Boracic acid, and Bicarbonate of soda, are used to satisfactory as the three mentioned above. Nearly all of the preservative are poisonous, and following the samples should always be and kept out of reach of children. H. H. Simpson.


