Fine Potato Crop

Mr. W. R. Hamby of Rogers was in the office this week and reported a splendid potato crop grown by his father and himself.

The crop consisted of forty acres and the yield was fifteen hundred bushels. That would seem to be enough, but Mr. Hamby stated that had the yield per acre been equal to the crop of the previous year the amount harvested would have totaled four thousand bushels. Some of these potatoes weighed two or more pounds each. They are a new variety developed from seed brought here from Arkansas. Mr. Hamby calls them "Mexico June." He promised to furnish specimens of them to the Herald office where our friends may see for themselves.

He says this section is not to be surpassed for the production of millet. One of his neighbors planted twelve pounds of seed per acre and harvested two tons per acre. If crops like these can be grown here say men from anywhere ought to find this a good country to live in.

Governor Curry Has Troubles of His Own.

May Be Asked to Resign. Serious Charges Against Him and Ring.

Dispatches from Washington are troubling the sea of Gov. Curry and the ring at Santa Fe. The outlook now is that they won't have such smooth sailing as heretofore. On the contrary it is announced from Washington that owing to serious charges of corruption in Territorial affairs we may have an allround change of officers in New Mexico. The ring rule and corruption are charged with defacing statehood for this term, as will be shown by the following dispatch printed in the Roswell Daily Record:

Washington, Feb. 27.—There will be no statehood legislation for New Mexico and Arizona at the present session of Congress.

At a meeting of the committee on territories today, all members, regardless of party, in a sensational scene, abandoned consideration of the house bill. The members of the committee left the room without any one suggesting further meetings. This remarkable action occurred at the conclusion of reading statements presented by Senators Nelson and Beveridge charging corruption, jury bribing and various other offenses against certain officials and leaders of what is termed the gang who control the political affairs of New Mexico.

Among the statements received was a telegram from J. J. Hagerman, of New Mexico, reflecting upon the character of the people who are in control of political affairs in that territory, and declaring that these men expect to continue their control after the territory becomes a state. He referred to them as "free booters," and says sixty per cent of the voters are Mexicans and one-half that number illiterate and ignorant and easily could be governed by the "gang," to which he referred. He suggested that it would be well to wait until after the next census before admitting New Mexico to statehood.

Another statement was read recounting the difficulties experienced by Ormsby McHarg, who went to New Mexico in 1907 as representative of the department of justice to prosecute land frauds. The statement declares that McHarg was hampered in his work by Governor Curry and the attorney general.

A number of indictments against territorial officials were read as was a letter from W. F. Wilcox, a former newspaper man of Santa Fe, who asserts that his life was threatened and he believes that threat would have been carried out had he not left the territory. It is extremely likely that the committee will conduct an investigation before acting on the admission bill.

The above will show clearly that the foreigner is not the only problem in the way of securing statehood. Corruption in public life has been and is now in the way. But the governor and his ring have the promise of ceasing to be a stumbling block in the way of statehood for New Mexico, as will be shown from the following dispatches printed in the Dallas News last Monday.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Judge Taft is going to be asked, shortly after he becomes President, to do some house cleaning down in New Mexico. This is said on authority of a senator who is a member of the Committee on Territories. This senator added the prediction that as soon as Judge Taft could get around to this matter there would not be a Rough Rider holding an office in New Mexico that is subject to the control of the President.

The plain inference is that Gov. Curry will be asked to resign. Gov. Curry is a Rough Rider. It was by reason of martial disposition at the outbreak of the Spanish War that he came within the vista of President Roosevelt. After the war he was sent to the Philippines, where Judge Taft made him Chief of Police of Manila. It was while serving in this capacity that President Roosevelt appointed him Governor of New Mexico. Gov. Curry has affiliated, in a political way, with Bull Andrews, who is a delegate in Congress from New Mexico.

The testimony which the Senate Committee on Judiciary has gathered is said to be of the most startling and criminating. It shows that a syndicate has gobbled up several million acres of the land which congress gave the Territory several years ago for educational purposes, and that in direct violation of the law, counties and municipalities have issued bonds for promotion purposes which they hope to validate by converting the Territory into a State. An agent of the Department of Justice who sent down there to make an investigation has contributed a most sensational chapter to the volume of evidence which the committee has gathered. He has reported that the courts are easily made to defeat the ends of justice and that the political combination is so powerful that it is hopeless, under present conditions, to punish the guilty. He cites one instance of a member of a Grand Jury being caught in the act of trying to bribe others serving with him, and asserts that when he was convicted he was punished merely by the assessment of a fine of \$200.

Senator Beveridge, it is understood, intends to press his resolution for a Senatorial investigation of conditions in New Mexico, but in the meantime Judge Taft will be asked to make a complete change of officers. The evidence so far taken by the Senate committee will be laid before him early next week.

The mass meeting next Sunday is of enormous importance to the Portales public and ought to bring out every public spirited person in town. If we are interested in the well-being of the county and in building up a more moral citizenship, we ought to be there to boost for and to build the proposed recreation resort and gymnasium.

Our esteemed would-be inebriate created quite a stir last week in the effort to furnish us the excitement of another fire. Roosevelt holders declare that something must be "did". As a partial relief a night watchman has been employed to help start a fire. The general feeling against this mean sort of lawless will serve somewhat as a safeguard for it is certain enough that the full limit of the law will be applied to the punishment of any man found guilty of such crime.

Quality in Politics.

They tell us of the "days of the demagogue" in a way to indicate that that unbecoming day is past and a new era is dawning with the hope that we were to live in a period of high toned political life. History would have been for us if we might have lived on in that hope in its realization but the young American who develops any discrimination at all is forced to the discovery early in his career that the political life of this country either does not represent its intelligence or fails to set a high estimate on the intelligence of the public to whom it makes its appeal. The cheap veneer whose unreal character is so obvious in the demeanor of the average politician does not escape the keen eye of the American commoner. It is sickening to see the attitude of many politicians, not only the smaller ones but those who stand in positions of national prominence. Our state and national campaigns are a constant reminder of the intelligence of the American voter. Cheap demagogues is made use of at every turn and the states are not to be misled by the demagogues. The politicians make a lot of other things as well as a fair minded, intelligent voter. A great number of people from upon such methods and it is time our political appeals were pitched on a higher plane. The "boys" don't enjoy the familiar pat on the back or the free sugar in the local campaign or the loudly proclaimed platitudes of the state and national orators. Let us as plain voters demand a plain presentation of the real issues and get down to business in politics.

The fight for statehood has resulted in a middle which is quite exasperating. The people of New Mexico want statehood. They want it in order that they may enjoy the uncurtailed rights of American citizens. They want it in order to have a "safe and sane" state government representing the ideals of its people and making possible, under conditions of fairness, the development of all material resources.

But we have the harassing condition of a lot of folks working for statehood while they don't seem to want it. There is little reason to believe that the governor and the ring have even begun to want statehood. They are more than content with their present regime of graft and limited control. The dispatch from Washington as copied elsewhere from the Roswell Daily Record indicates clearly that both Republicans and Democrats are afraid to trust anybody if they are not thoroughly disgusted with the condition here.

The people of New Mexico have another grievance besides the one they hold against the ring at Santa Fe—a grievance against the Republican party for the insincerity with which they have made definite promises not intended for fulfillment. The promise of immediate admission was inserted in the Republican national platform only after a long fight and in response to the almost frantic appeals of New Mexico republicans who saw that as the only hope of defeating the Democratic ticket in the Territory. The party leaders were never committed to it and according to the thinking of New Mexico Democrats, never intended that the promise should be kept whatever the conditions here.

Last Sunday's mass meeting didn't do all that was proposed for it, but it did show that there is a public spirit and enterprise in our people.

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS.

Two cannons have been made of glass in England.

The president's salary will not be increased this year.

Bismarck has been frequent on both sides of the Atlantic.

President Taft has found a horse big enough to carry him.

New fortifications are being built at some of the Hawaiian ports.

Charges of graft in the Panama Canal construction have been renewed.

The anti-futures bill before congress is being vigorously fought for.

Three women are held in Santa Fe on the charge of having murdered a child in cold blood.

The Beien Cutoff will receive the heavy transcontinental freight traffic about March 15.

The British mail authorities recently undertook to deliver a woman by mail. The effort was successful.

Acting Governor and Mrs. Nathan Jaffa gave a brilliant reception last week to the members of the legislature.

The trial of the Coopers for the killing of Senator Rummack at Nashville is the one item running regularly through the dailies now.

Some friends at Beaumont, Texas have sent the president a "big stick." He won't use that sort of weapon outside the presidency.

Hon. Gifford Pinchot, chief of the forestry service will visit Santa Fe in a few days and will address the legislature.

The battleship Michigan, to be the greatest fighting vessel in the American navy, will be ready for a trial trip about July first.

The inauguration of President Taft is said to have been attended with the most elaborate ceremonies ever held on such an occasion.

A white woman was assaulted by a Mexican at Farwell, Texas. She beat him away and ran him off with a revolver which she had at hand.

Senator Beveridge has introduced a resolution providing for

an investigation of the charges of corruption in official circles in New Mexico.

Atlanta Georgia has engaged somebody to sing two nights, thirty minutes per night, for ten thousand dollars. At that rate he ought to lay aside foolishness and do his level best.

The local option bill has some promise of a resurrection now at Santa Fe. Some legislators and others have probably decided that local option would be better than general prohibition.

The little town of Silverton, Texas has signed up for a bonus of seventy thousand dollars to the Altus, Roswell and El Paso railroad. They will build a town. So will any people who go at it like that.

The meeting of farmers called for tomorrow afternoon as announced in last week's paper should not be overlooked. An experiment station on a small scale conducted here where we can see it is worth more than one many times larger when we must be content to read about it.

The joint commission on immigration appointed last year reported in part this week declaring that thousands of the undesirable classes are being admitted, especially Chinese and Southern Europeans. Among these are many criminals. Uncle Sam will have to scratch his head.

President Gives Farewell Reception.

Washington, March 1.—President Roosevelt today gave a farewell luncheon at the White House to the members of the famous "tennis cabinet" and others who have been closely associated with him during the last seven years. Aside from the distinguished government officials who have served among the president's chief aides during his administration and also as his companions, there were present men with whom the president had made friends when he was roughing it in the west years ago and with whom he had gone on numerous hunting expeditions.

The occasion was memorable to those who surrounded the president today and the latter's farewell words were not entirely free from the notes of regret, if not sadness. The president in a brief speech, laid emphasis on the point that no administration had given its chief more loyal service and he stated that he believed that the country had never had a more devoted set of public servants than those men through whom, he said, most of the work of his administration had been accomplished. The president in his remarks following the luncheon said:

"Gentlemen: You are here nominally as members, or to meet the members of the famous 'tennis cabinet,' that is, as men with whom at tennis or hunting, or riding or walking, or boxing, I have played, with whom I have been on the round up or in the mountains or on the ranch. But really, as you know, you are not here for that reason at all. You are here because you are the men and because you represent the men with whom I have worked while I have been president. No administration has ever had a finer or more loyal service than you have given, and I do not believe this country has ever had an able or more devoted set of public servants. It is through you and the like of you that I have done the major part of what has been accomplished under the administration.

Moreover, in a vast number of cases, the doing of the work itself has been our only reward. The credit has come to me, to the chief of the administration. For exactly as men like to symbolize a battle by the name of the commander, so they like to symbolize an administration by the man at the head, forgetting that an immense majority of his acts can be done only through others and that a really successful administration, successful from the standpoint of advancing the honor and the interests of the country must be managed as ours has been, in a spirit of the most loyal association and partnership.

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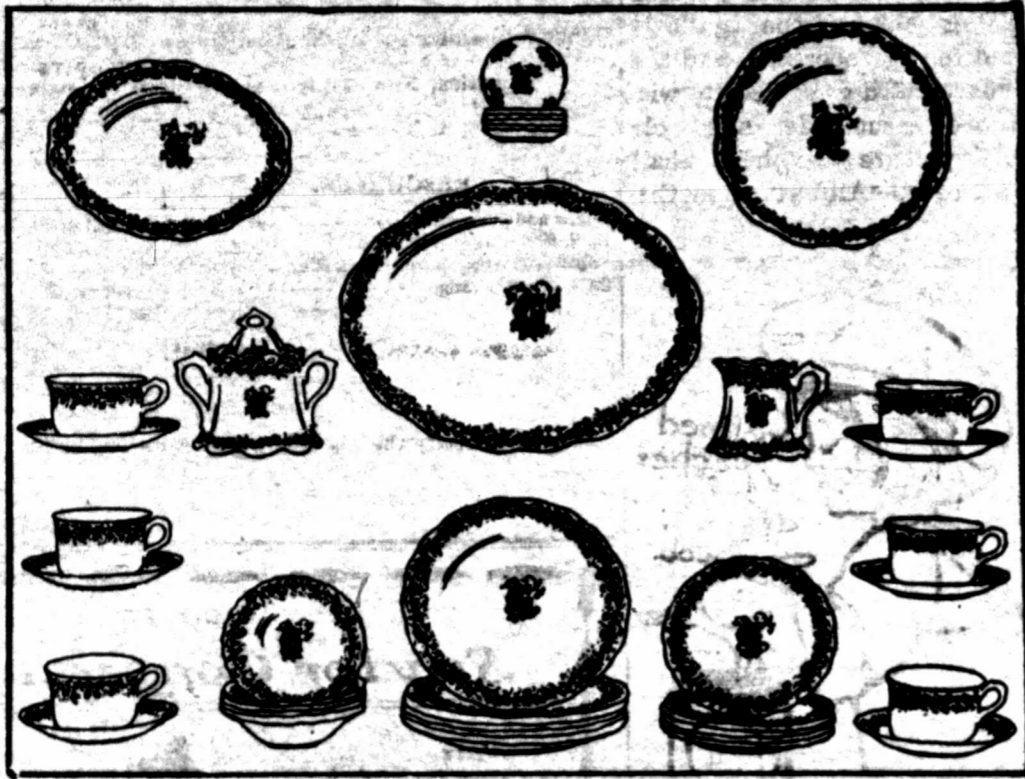

That any person who is a qualified entryman under the homestead laws of the United States may enter, by legal subdivisions, under the provisions of this act, in the states of Colorado, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming and the territories of Arizona and New Mexico, 820 acres, or less, or non-mineral, nor-irrigable, unreserved and unappropriated surveyed public lands which do not contain merchantable timber, located in a reasonable compact body, not over one and one-half miles in extreme length: Provided, That no lands shall be subject to entry under the provisions of this act until such lands shall have been designated by the secretary of the interior as not being, in his opinion, susceptible to irrigation at a reasonable cost from any known source of water supply.

Sec. 2.—That any person applying to enter land under the provisions of this act, shall make and subscribe before the proper officer an affidavit as required by section 2290 of the revised statutes, and in addition thereto shall make affidavit that the land sought to be entered is of the character described in section 1 of this act, and shall pay the fees now required to be paid under the homestead laws.

Sec. 3.—That any homestead entryman of lands of the character herein described, upon which final proof has not been made, shall have the right to enter public lands, subject to the provisions of this act, contiguous to his former entry which shall not exceed 320 acres, and residence upon and cultivation of the original entry shall be deemed as residence upon and cultivation of the additional entry.

Sec. 4.—That at the time of making final proofs, as provided in section 2291 of the revised statutes, the entryman under this act shall, in addition to the proofs and affidavits required under the said section, prove by two creditable witnesses that at least one-eighth of the area embraced in his entry was continuously cultivated to agricultural crops other than native grasses beginning with the second year of the entry, and that at least one-fourth of the area embraced in the entry was so continuously cultivated beginning with the third year of the entry.

Sec. 5.—That nothing herein contained shall be held to affect the right of a qualified entryman to make homestead entry in the states named in section 1 of this act, under the provisions of section 2289 of the revised statutes but no person who has made entry under the provisions of said section, and no entry under this act shall be commuted.

Sec. 6.—That whenever the secretary of the interior shall find that any tracts of land in the state of Utah, subject to entry under this act, do not have upon them such a sufficient supply of water suitable for domestic purposes as would make continuous residence upon the lands impossible, he may, in his discretion, designate such tracts of land, not to exceed in the aggregate 2,000,000 acres, and thereafter they shall be subject to entry under this act without the necessity of residence: Provided, That in such event the entryman or any such entry shall in good faith cultivate not less than one-eighth of the entire area the second year, one-fourth during the third year, and one-half during the fourth and fifth years after the date of such entry, and that after entry and until final proof the entryman shall reside within such distance of said land as will enable him successfully to farm the same, as required by this section.

New Hearing for the Brownville Negroes.

Washington, Feb. 27.—Under a special rule the house today passed the senate bill granting the discharged negro soldiers of the Twenty-fifth infantry, said to have been involved in the shooting up of Brownville, Texas, the right to prove their innocence and thus make them eligible for restoration to the army. 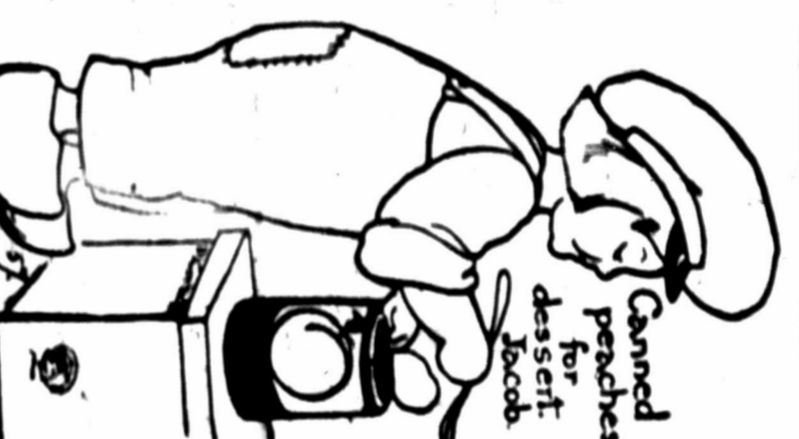
