### Our Grain and Feed Products.

Roosevelt County Not a Barren Waste—Tables Printed from the Records.

The editor is a new comer in New Mexico and on coming here is full of doubt as to the real productive capacity of our lands. As many others feel on first sight it, he thought little could be expected of a seemingly rain-soaked land. The season for marketing crops came on and with it a proof sufficient every way to convince the most skeptical that western New Mexico not only can produce but does produce abundant crops wherever the right sort of methods are pursued in their culture. The matter of growing corn is no longer an experiment but an undisputed success. The kafir corn and milo maize crops are still being sold. No dependable estimate can be made of these products. They can be grown in unlimited quantities and as soon as an adequate market is developed for them they will constitute an unusual source of wealth to the country. The soil here produces abundantly potatoes, both sweet and Irish, together with pumpkins, beans and almost all varieties of vegetables. Cucumbers grow in great abundance inviting the pickling industry with good promise of success. Poultry, eggs and butter are not the least among the marketable articles produced here. The farmers have filled the town with eggs this season, so much so that the merchants have been compelled to keep on the move to handle them with profit. Since January 1st one buyer of country produce has handled 800 turkeys, 600 chickens and 9,000 dozen eggs. Another, who commenced business since February 1st, has shipped 10 fowls and 6,210 dozen eggs. The grain crops cannot be estimated accurately for the reason that much of it is still unmarketed. Thirty or more cars are now in store here with much more to be bought up. The wonder is that any country could in so short a time grow more stuff than it can consume, especially when there is a stream of immigration all the time sufficient to consume a generous production. Several firms have been buying grain this season. Already one of them has bought 15,000 bushels and another one 10,000 bushels.

We do not print these things to show what a good country ought to do. It simply shows what an undeveloped country is doing with a limited amount in cultivation and much of that farmed by poorly adapted methods. Many who came here came to leave when they had "proved up" but in their stead are coming the men who mean to develop the country and evolve the methods that will get the best results from the cultivation of the soil. When this work is well under way we will see a large yield, not only of the things mentioned above, but also of a great number of other things. We expect to raise fruits on a large scale and at a profit. No great number have learned this way of doing

yet but the industry is gaining confidence and will grow from year to year. The canning and pickling factory proposed last week will certainly be built sooner or later and when it is it will pay well both the operators and those who produce what it utilizes. This plant ought to be installed at once so as to be ready to use this year's crop. If movements now in progress do not fail it will be built this season. A look around us at least convinces that this country is not a barren waste, but is wonderfully productive, yielding to every well-directed touch of the husbandman.

## Gov. Curry Resigns.

Rebuked and Stung By Order of Secretary of Interior Ballinger.

Assuming an attitude of outrage over the order issued by Secretary Ballinger of the Interior and approved by President Taft, growing out of the conduct of Curry and Bull Andrews in their recent abortive efforts for statehood, Gov. Curry wired his resignation to the President March 22nd.

As a matter of fact this order from the Secretary of the Interior, forbidding the Governor and other Territorial officials from coming to Washington in the future in the interest of statehood or any other measure and informing them that they must henceforth remain strictly at their respective posts in the territories, except in cases of actual emergency, was not only a rebuke to Curry and Bull Andrews for their conduct during the recent session of Congress, but was a request for the resignation of these two glaring offenders. And, be it said to Gov. Curry's credit and to the betterment of the entire Territory of New Mexico, he was not slow to take the hint and hand in his resignation. It shows that, after all, the latest ex-governor of New Mexico has some sense of self respect left. Ballinger of the Interior had refused him the right to come to Washington and adjust his official conduct with the authorities there; and, on the other hand, had issued positive orders that neither he nor any other territorial officials would be allowed henceforth to leave their official posts and there was nothing left for the Governor, but either to consider himself in honorable confinement in New Mexico or resign. The erst while "rough riding" spirit came over him, and he resented, thus bringing about the most benevolent, the most helpful and the most noteworthy act of his official career.

Nine rabs for Taft and Ballinger! But do they imagine they will bring Bull Andrews to the same point of self assertion and manly self-defense manifested in the resignation of Governor Curry?

Well, we are not pessimists; and the replacing of the negro office-holders in the south with high minded white men, and the pointed, unmistakable rebuke issued to Governor Curry and his crowd looks good to us; but the resignation of Bull Andrews? That would be too good. We simply can't believe it will happen. But here's our hand on the proposition: if Taft and Ballinger do oust Bull Andrews, no matter whom they choose to place in his stead, we are going to be believers in Taft forevermore.

**Curry Withdraws Resignation.**  
 Getting slapped in the face by the executive order from Secretary of the Interior, wiring his resignation to President Taft, assaulting a Democratic editor who had called at his request,

Governor Curry managed to quit Monday, 22nd and call it a day's work, declaring as he did so: "I have acted, and I will not remain in office under any circumstances." Tuesday he reconsiders and recalls his resignation, at the request of President Taft and his many friends, we are told, all of whom believe that he acted hastily, if not rashly, and comes to the close of another day rather fatigued! And now we have no doubt that it will take the Governor some time to re-adjust himself. Evidently he placed implicit confidence in the Republican pledge for statehood, which pledge was not only violated, but charges of the most serious character were brought against the Governor and his party who were at Washington working for statehood. But more, Governor Curry was not given opportunity to go back to Washington and refute the charges, but on the contrary, was handed an executive order forbidding him to leave his post, except when he was sent for. Now as the President has no notion of recalling this order, we'll thank some one to tell us "where the Governor is at."

General News Items.

President Taft is said to favor an income tax in favor of waterways.

Two unfortunates of the El Paso red light district attempted suicide last Saturday.

Efforts are being made to establish a Young Women's Christian Association in El Paso.

The street car service in Waco, Texas, is to be extended to the east side across Brazos river.

Mr. Roosevelt sailed Tuesday on his long hunting trip in Africa. He will be absent about two years.

Frank Shirley is suing W. T. Wells in Roswell for the murder of the former's brother, Ollie Shirley.

Chas. Nagel, Taft's Secretary of Commerce and Labor, is the first native Texan to hold a cabinet position.

Geo. T. Angell of Boston, editor of "Our Dumb Animals" and friend of all-people less creatures, died this week.

Upisings are reported to have occurred in Cuba among the rebels. Troops are being sent to avoid further trouble.

Great Britain is aroused over the prospect of being outstripped by Germany in the construction of great war vessels.

The Texas legislature has failed to enact any of the important platform measures and the governor is at odds with them.

Physicians advise E. H. Harriman to leave off active work. Mr. Harriman has been a blessing and a curse to the whole country.

An ore train was wrecked a few days ago on the Colorado Southern and the engineer was killed as the result of heroic effort to save his train.

The little son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. West of Bland, N. Mex. was found dead in a drift of snow twenty feet deep. His sister was with him and in a state of unconsciousness.

A corn trust is feared in Mexico and concern is felt for the poor. Public spirited citizens at Durango have bought up large quantities of corn to prevent the starvation of the helpless masses.

The 12-year old son of James T. Whitela was recently kidnapped by thugs who demanded \$10,000 as a condition for his return. The father is anxious to pay the ransom but is unable to find either the thugs or the boy.

Searching for Thieves.

Mr. Joseph Carter of Floyd was in town this week and reports that on last Saturday night a lap robe was stolen from his lack while he was in attendance on a public meeting at Terra Blanca school house. Such an occurrence has never been heard of before, and we gather from the report of Mr. Carter's remarks that if he catches the guilty persons they will wish it had happened one time less. Such contemptible work ought to be stopped at any cost, and all good citizens should help to do it.

Railroads Charged With Rebating.

Washington, D. C.—Reports have been made to the interstate commerce commission, and this week they have been carried to President Taft that the railways of the country are paying as much money to shippers in the form of rebates as at any previous time in the history of the country.

Mr. Taft was astounded when the report reached him, and said that he would give the matter his careful attention at once.

The rebates are not paid directly, of course, for the new law prevents that.

They are paid indirectly in the form of claims for damages and delays and for the announcement of incorrect rates.

Way of Transgressor is Harsh.

The following is clipped from the Daily Panhandle of last Saturday. It reveals a nice little scheme for violating the local option law and may help the officers to run somebody in. It is only what must be expected that any law will be violated, but it is also gratifying to know that violators of all laws can be caught in their schemes. The Panhandle has this to say:

"Load this trunk of booze and this man and take both to the county jail," ordered Chief of Police Snider to a transfer man yesterday, as he indicated the goods to be removed. This action was caused primarily through the fact that the baggage room was odorous with the fumes of wasted liquor. The officer was called and it was then disclosed to him that the trunk had been received by the railroad company at Texico, and further that the check for same had come enclosed in a letter to the baggage master at this place. Earlier in the day a man had called for the trunk. This led to the tip to the officer and the detention and removal to the jail.

Being opened the trunk was found to contain many bottles of liquor, some of which had suffered at the hands of the "baggage smashers," their contents oozing out at the openings in the case and trailing their "perfume" through cars and baggage rooms and finally scenting the reception rooms at the county jail.

The trunk remains in the jail, and will perhaps so remain for the lack of a claimant. It is contended that the package was shipped in violation of the law requiring all packages containing intoxicants to be so labeled. The case has been held up pending the arrival of County Attorney R. E. Underwood, who will file complaints for the holding of the owner of the package and the package itself.
