ASTROUS FIRE AT PORTALES

Blaze Saturday Morning Makes a Clean Sweep Destroying Nearly a Half Block

In the last few months Portales has been the victim of a series of destructive fires. The one occurred Saturday morning at five o'clock when a fire was discovered in the old commercial hotel building from the spread to the brick element row adjoining and destroyed the three-front building by Oldham and Lindsey. The hotel building was occupied by Saylor's confectionary stock of liquors owned by Herbert and the rooms above by Saylor's family. The cement block was occupied by Miller & Luikart, Portales Grocery Company and The Trading Company. So far we have been able to learn the following were insured: Oldham and Lindsey, \$6,600; W. H. Veach, building, \$2,000; Miller & Luikart, \$7,000; J. A. Saylor, \$10,000. The Portales Trading Company, Portales Grocery Company and the Herbert stock of liquors was not insured. The fire was first discovered by watchman Z. E. Carter, who with Ursi Keen, turned in alarm by firing pistols. Mr. Carter reports that the fire, when discovered by him, was on the outside of the hotel building at the top of the side wall and next to the Oldham and Lindsey building. The whole building was on fire in a few minutes and the flames were beyond control. Heroic efforts were made to stop the terrible destruction and it was hoped only the wooden structure would be sacrificed but the absence of adequate water supply the flames crossed the cement fire wall and seriously threatened the Warren-Fooshee building. The usual bucket brigade turned out but they were in no way equal to the task. The fact that the fire did not spread

Woman Suffrage Victory in Chicago.

Woman suffragists of Chicago are rejoicing because of the great victory which they won in the charter convention on Saturday, March 13th. The convention, after a short debate, by a vote of 20 to 12, adopted the plank which provides for municipal woman suffrage. The question now goes to the state legislature, and the suffragists will maintain a lobby at Springfield and go to the capital from Chicago and other parts of the state in full force when a hearing is granted on the measure. This municipal suffrage campaign has been admirably conducted, and has been of immense educational value. It has been supported by women representing the best thought of the city, prominent among whom are Jane Adams, Mrs. Charles Herrold, Mrs. Catharine Waugh McCulloch and Mrs. Ella S. Stewart. Mrs. Stewart is the president of the Illinois Equal Suffrage Association, an officer in the National American Woman Suffrage Association and the treasurer of the Woman's Municipal Campaign Committee. It is she who has raised the funds to carry on this work. Mrs. Stewart was also the most influential factor in the organization of the Men's League for Woman Suffrage, recently launched in Chicago and officered by some of the best known political reformers in the "Windy City."

The town board has taken a wise step in referring to the board to determine whether we shall issue bonds for a sewer system. The Herald is for it. We hope the people are for it. Let's vote we shall deal with the question in some length.

With two good snows in March and four more already well advanced, Roosevelt county will blossom as the rose this season and everybody will be happy and contented. This wonderful country only requires an intelligent man to prove it so.

Saloons and Prosperity.

Usually the opinion of men think necessary, but there always have been held among us some absolutely groundless opinions. One such is the opinion that many people have had that saloons are of common sense to a community. A saloon could be more properly called a bar and yet men and women in their common sense have accepted this without question. Let us see on what ground the proposition is based. There is no matter in it but that saloons in towns mean that more men are in business in that town and they also claim that a large number of men would be diverted from that leading point about the saloons is formed to quit business. This of course must be a contradiction that the liquor business does represent a considerable percentage of the business of a town and the first point is that it is conceded unless it can be shown that such volume of business does not add to the total business that would be done in the absence of saloons. But the argument breaks down at just that point, for not only do saloons in a community not increase the total capacity of that community for business, but they actually lessen that capacity and consequently lessen the total amount of business done in a town. This statement may require some explanation. Any business has a right to existence if it satisfies the natural wants of men without doing them or other members of the community hurt. The liquor business satisfies an unnatural want, that of an unnatural appetite, and in so doing renders the consumer less fit to be a producer and thus less able to buy. It hurts him and all other members of the community

loses the volume of business in any community. Every community desires for the wealth in its capacity to produce in the different lines. Chief among these is not the fertility of soil or the number of business establishments but the capacity of the human agent—the brain and heart of the community. The saloon destroys these and thus loses all claim to a place as a town builder.

Very few men proper conditions as in the other proposition only in reference to the experience of towns that have tried to exist without the liquor business. There are towns which have suffered business depression at the time saloons were voted out but that is not conclusive proof that the saloons were the life of the town in any case. The fact is that scores of towns can be cited in the prohibition states which have grown rapidly without saloons and which enjoy a more solid prosperity than they did when they had them. Among them are some of the larger towns and some cities of the state. They are all over Texas, Kansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Ohio and nearly every other state in the union. No town ever depended for its business results on the saloon, and the saloon is credited to none of the credit that is claimed, and the sooner the people come to understand this the sooner will we build strong commercial, intellectual and moral communities.

It has been passing around that since the saloons closed the number of vacant houses in Portales is a sign the prohibition experiment being the closing of the saloons is the direct cause. Such is not the case. Conditions since the closing are practically as they were before except for the removal of the families of some men who were in the liquor business. The vacant houses will be filled in due course of time and meantime, some women and children are being better clothed and some good men have more respect for themselves. Portales is all right. Don't be anybody's worry.

General News Items

The crown prince of Burma has given up the claim to the throne. The Bank guaranty law is gaining a favor as near the country. Laceywood is planning the establishment of a large tanning plant. The railroads in Missouri will reduce to three cent fare on the line. Denver has had a snow storm which did the city more than \$100,000 damage. Roy Terry of Dallas killed his brother and brother-in-law. \$100,000 will be invested in the works at Mexico by English and French capitalists. Chairman L. J. Storey of the Texas Railroad Commission led today afternoon in Austin. The canine, Florida, has just suffered from a fire which destroyed \$25,000 worth of property. The Payne land bill will be voted upon today. It is understood that sides are to remain on the floor. The New Mexico mountains are covered with snow and will furnish abundance of water for irrigating this season. Howell had 5,000 visitors at the Cattleman's Convention at that city, and the visitors had the time of their lives. Two Russian passengers arriving in New York harbor last week were detained to await development of small pox. That nothing herein contained shall be held to affect the right of a qualified entryman to make a homestead entry in the states named in section 1 of this act, under the provisions of section 2289 of the revised statutes but no person who has made entry under the provisions of said section, and no entry under this act shall be commuted.

SEC. 6. That whenever the secretary of the interior shall find that any tracts of land in the state of Utah, subject to entry under this act, do not have upon them such a sufficient supply of water suitable for domestic purposes as would make continuous residence upon the lands impossible, he may, in his discretion, designate such tracts of land, not to exceed in the aggregate 2,000,000 acres, and thereafter they shall be subject to entry under this act without the necessity of residence. Structive Fires in Dallas and Fort Worth.

North Texas Towns Swept by Worst Fires on Record.

One of the most disastrous in the history of Dallas, thirteen residence blocks in the East End of Oak Cliff, comprising Briggs Sanitarium and some sixty or sixty-five residences, were totally destroyed yesterday afternoon.

The damage is estimated at all ways from \$300,000 to \$450,000, and it is believed that \$400,000 is a conservative estimate, circumstances being such last night that it was not possible to get in communication with the owners of the property nor secure the names of those whose homes were burned.

The fire started in Briggs Sanitarium, corner of Jefferson and Tyler streets, shortly after 2 o'clock. This building was a mass of flames before the firemen reached the scene, and the high wind from the southwest was sweeping burning fagots to the houses northeast and north of Briggs Sanitarium.

The flames leaped across the street and burned four houses north of Tenth street, between Van Buren and Tyler. Jumping across the street, five houses were destroyed on the north side of the street and six on the south side. Two houses were left standing on Ninth, near the corner of Van Buren, and one between Vernon and Tyler. One house was also left standing on Tenth street, although every structure on every side of it was destroyed. North of Ninth street to the line of the north loop of the Tex-

as Traction Company every single residence was destroyed, except one small cottage at the turn of the railway on Arthur street. This includes two houses on Tyler street, thirteen houses on Eighth street, nineteen houses on Seventh street, ten houses north of Seventh street and between the territory which has not been built upon.

FORT WORTH, Tex., April 8.—Burning between 200 and 300 residences, the most disastrous fire in the history of North Texas this afternoon swept bare thirty-two block of Fort Worth, driving 5,000 persons from their ruined homes, causing the death of at least one person, while prostrations were so common in the streets as to require no attention, and involving property loss estimated conservatively at \$2,500,000.

Insurance men estimate that the total loss is about \$2,500,000, of which the Texas and Pacific Railroad is the heaviest individual loser. It losses are estimated by officials at \$160,000.

"Between 200 and 300 residences were totally burned, leaving absolutely nothing but ashes. These represented a thickly settled section of the South Side residence district and included many handsome homes on Broadway.

The total loss on dwellings and contents is figured roughly at \$2,000,000, with probably \$300,000 insurance carried by the individual owners.

Two handsome churches fell a prey to the flames, as did also the handsome Reimers Memorial Chapel attached to the Broadway Presbyterian Church, which with the Broadway Baptist Church

TOWN BOARD MEETING.
At a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico, held at the office of the Chairman, in said town, on the 6th day of April, A. D. 1909.

Present: W. E. Lindsey, Chairman of the Board; H. B. Ryther, Clerk; W. O. Oldham, J. B. Priddy, Buck Blankenship, J. A. Fairly, W. E. Lindsey, Trustees. Absent, none.

The following proceedings, among others, were had, to-wit: Buck Blankenship introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, The Town of Portales, New Mexico, is without a system of sewers for the disposition of its sewage, and is without any system of waterworks for the prevention and extinguishment of fires, and for sanitary and other purposes; and in the opinion of the board of trustees of said town it is essential and proper to construct a system of sanitary sewers and a system of waterworks in and for said town;

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the direction of the board of trustees of said town, plans, specifications, and maps for and estimates of the cost of the construction of said sanitary sewers and waterworks have been prepared and submitted by Burns & McDonnell, competent engineers, and approved by the board of trustees of said town, which plans, specifications, maps and estimates are now on file in the office of the town clerk of said town; and

WHEREAS, The estimated cost of said sanitary sewers is \$20,478.20, and the estimated cost of said waterworks is \$49,283.20, and in the opinion of said board of trustees the cost of constructing said system of sanitary sewers and said waterworks should be paid from the general revenues of said town; and for the purpose of providing the necessary funds therefor it is deemed necessary for said town to borrow money and issue its negotiable coupon bonds to the aggregate amount of \$25,000 for the construction of said sanitary sewers, and to the aggregate amount of \$50,000 for the construction of said waterworks; and

WHEREAS, Said Town of Portales is a lawfully chartered municipal corporation in said Territory of New Mexico, under the general laws thereof, and has a bona fide population of more than one thousand persons, as shown by the last regular school census taken on the 1st day of September, A. D. 1908, and said town has full authority to issue the bonds aforesaid under and upon compliance with the provisions of an act of Congress of the United States of America, approved on March 4, 1898, entitled "An Act to amend an act to prohibit the passage of local or special laws in the territories, to limit territorial indebtedness, and so forth," now in force;

BE IT RESOLVED BY the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales, in the County of Roosevelt and Territory of New Mexico, that a special election be and the same is hereby called to be held in said town on the 11th day of April, A. D. 1909, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the town, as defined by the Act of Congress mentioned in the preamble hereof, the proposition of issuing the negotiable coupon bonds of said town to the aggregate amount of \$25,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the construction of a sanitary sewer system, and to the aggregate amount of \$50,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the construction of a waterworks system in and for said town.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That notice of said election, substantially in the form following, be published in the Roosevelt County Herald, a weekly newspaper published and of general circulation in said town; said publication
