### WANTED---1000 FARMERS

#### With 160 Acres of Land Who will Pay \$125.00 Annually as Interest and Sinking Fund for Irrigating

The figures submitted from Burns & McDonnell in last week's issue of the Herald indicated that an irrigation plant to water 160,000 acres could be erected and put into operation for \$686,000. If 1,000 farmers in this shallow water area will go into the proposition, then a private stock company can be organized and bonds issued to the amount of \$686,000. We have in mind a company who make a business of buying the bonds of irrigation projects at 6 per cent interest on 30 years time. Now, if you figure the interest on \$686,000 at 6 per cent, you will see that it would amount to \$41,160 yearly. If, now, you suppose that we want to pay off one-tenth of the principal each year so that we could pay out the proposition in ten years, you can see that these 1,000 farmers would have to pay \$68,600 as sinking fund or yearly payment. If you will now add \$41,160 interest to the \$68,600 annual payment to the sinking fund, you will see that these 1,000 farmers would have to pay \$109,760 every year, or 109,760 each. Now suppose we allow \$15,250 annually for running expenses and incidentals, this plant will cost 1,000 farmers but \$125 apiece each year, and will water his entire 160 acres. But could we not find 1,000 farmers in this shallow water area who would be

**GOVERNMENT PETITIONED**

**United States Will Be Asked to Expend Five Billion Dollars for Irrigation, Drainage and Highway Building**

Spokane, Washington, June 20.—Arthur Hooker, secretary of the board of control of the National Irrigation Congress, will present a resolution for approval by that organization at its seventeenth session in Spokane, August 9 to 14, memorializing congress to issue 3 per cent gold bonds, running 100 years, to the amount of \$5,000,000,000, or as may be necessary, for the following specific purposes:

**WHERE THE MONEY WILL GO.**  
One billion dollars for drainage of overflowed and swamp lands, thus reclaiming an area equal to 100,000 square miles.

One billion dollars for the reclamation by irrigation of 40,000,000 acres of arid and semi-arid lands, now partly or wholly waste.

One billion dollars to construct and improve deep waterways, to develop thousands of miles of territory now without adequate transportation facilities.

One billion dollars for good roads and national highways, for the lack of which the loss to the farm area of the United States is approximately \$500,000,000 annually.

One billion dollars for forest protection, reforestation and conservation of the forest resources, thus assuring timber and lumber supplies for centuries to come.

**OVERFLOWED LANDS.**  
"Government figures bear out the statement that there is enough good land overflowed in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Kansas, Nebraska, Louisiana, Kentucky, Tennessee and Mississippi to make an area as large as the state of Missouri, or more than 44,000,000 acres, while in the eastern, central and western states there is more than as much more, or about 100,000,000 acres in all. At a conservative estimate of \$25 an acre, the sale of this reclaimed land would justify the expenditure of \$2,500,000,000, or 150 per cent more than is required to drain it. This land would support from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 population.

**ARID LANDS.**  
"Approximately 40,000,000 acres of lands in western and southwestern states are adapted to irrigation which, if reclaimed at an average cost of \$25 an acre, would be worth not less than \$200 an acre or a total of \$8,000,000,000 and provide homes for more than 8,000,000 persons. The economic value of irrigation cannot be measured in dollars and cents, but crops of from \$500 to \$1,000 an acre are not rare in the irrigated districts. There are already 14,000,000 acres under irrigation and the reclamation service estimates it will have reclaimed 2,000,000 acres, at a cost not exceeding \$70,000,000, before the close of 1911.

**VALUE OF GOOD ROADS.**  
"No question the statement that good roads have a high money value to the farmers of the nation, and it may be said that this alone is sufficient to justify the cost of their construction as rapidly as practicable under an efficient, economical and equitable system of highway improvement. The bill points in favor of this expenditure is the economy of time and force in transportation between farm and market, enabling the growers to take advantage of fluctuations in buying and selling, as well as enhancing the value of real estate.

"It is estimated that the average loss from poor roads is 75 per cent per acre, while the estimated average increase resulting from improving all the public roads is \$9. The losses in five years would aggregate \$2,482 for every section of land, or more

than enough to improve two miles of public highway. The necessity of good roads is obvious, as it would enhance the value of each section of land about \$5,760, or more than double the estimated cost of two miles of improved highway, which constitutes the quota for 640 acres of land.

**The New Patriotism**

Joshua Strong, in "The Challenge of the City"

There are many who in times of obvious crisis, when the bugle summons to battle, cheerfully make great sacrifices, even unto death; but who in the "weak, piping time of peace," are unwilling to give a little time and a little effort for the public good. They are too busy to attend to politics. They sacrifice the public good to private gain, which is precisely the indictment we bring against the demagogue. The men who wash their hands of public concerns are as truly responsible for municipal misrule as are the men who are in politics "for revenue only." The former neglect politics for their private interests; the latter manipulate politics for their private interests.

Evidently the so-called "good citizen" is the accomplice of the bad. We are afflicted with the bad citizenship of good men. We expect bad men to be bad citizens; but when good men are bad citizens, public interests "go to the bad" with a rush.

Probably there is not a citizen in the United States where those who would prefer good government are not in a large majority, and yet they allow themselves to be ruled and plundered by a corrupt minority. In Europe men of high rank and of great learning deem it an honor to administer the affairs of their city, while we intrust authority to ignorant and selfish men, who give us the worst municipal government in Christendom, at four or five times the cost of good government in England.

Years ago, when Kossuth visited America, he said: "If shipwreck should ever befall your country, the rock upon which it will split will be your devotion to your private interests at the expense of your duty to the State."

Local self-government is to-day hanging in what Edmund Burke called "a dancing and hesitating balance." As "New occasions teach new duties," this new peril demands a new patriotism—not new in spirit, but in manifestation: one which is civil rather than military; one which devotes itself to the principle actually endangered; not a patriotism which constructs fortifications and builds navies, but one which purifies politics and substitutes statesmen for demagogues; not one which "rallies around the flag," so much as one which rallies round the ballot-box; not one which charges into the deadly breach, but one which smashes the "machine;" not one which offers itself to the country, but one that is willing to live for it, which is as much more heroic as it is more difficult.

Such patriotism calls for courage no less than that which devotes itself to military service. It calls for men brave enough to face the hatred of pothouse politicians, who are as mean as they are unscrupulous; it calls for men who dare to be unpopular; who dare to be misunderstood and misrepresented, men who are to be ridiculed and lied about and abused; men who dare to suffer in their business, and if need be, in their bodies; men who can wait for vindication be-

cause they are working, not for applause, but for principle.

This new patriotism must be opened-eyed and tireless. To keep office when they are in, and to seek office when they are out, is the business of the men who are in politics for what they can make out of it, they have nothing else to do. The people with whom is the defense of our liberties have everything else to do. When, therefore, good citizens lose sight of the public welfare for only a little time, the rogues slip in again. The patriotism of the good citizen must be as sleepless as the selfishness of the boss and his henchmen. Eternal vigilance is still the price of liberty.

A New York brewer said: "The church people can drive us when they try, and we know it. Our hope is in working after they grow tired, and continuing to work three hundred and sixty five days in the year." Who does not exclaim, with Dr Parkhurst: "Oh, what a world this world would soon be if the perseverance of the saints were made of as enduring stuff as the perseverance of the sinners!"

To the partizan, party success is the supreme thing, and he is willing, if need be, to sacrifice principle to it. The true patriot cares supremely for principle, and, if need be, he is willing to sacrifice party to it. The politician cares for neither principle nor party, and is ready to sacrifice both to himself.

If the individual citizen is not made intelligent touching the government of the city; if he is incapable of forming an independent and intelligent judgment, or if he fails to appreciate his responsibility as a citizen; if he neglects the franchise, or sells it, or uses it for personal instead of public ends, there will not be lacking selfish and designing men to command an unthinking or unscrupulous following, and so control the city for private gain instead of public good. If the citizens generally exercised independent, intelligent and conscientious judgment concerning political affairs, the political boss would find himself without an occupation.

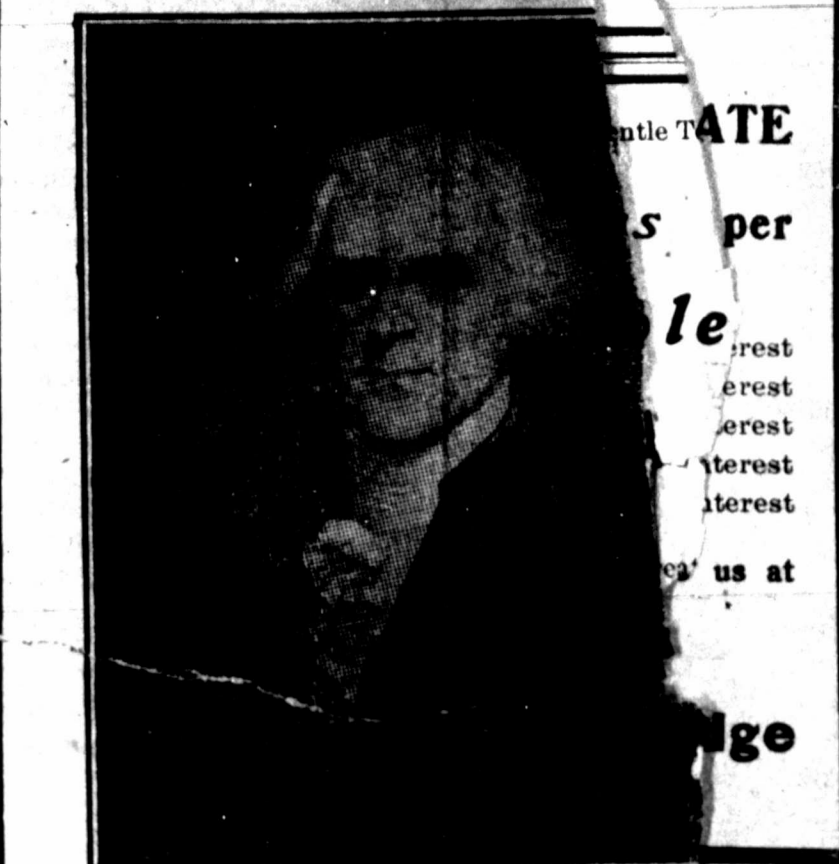

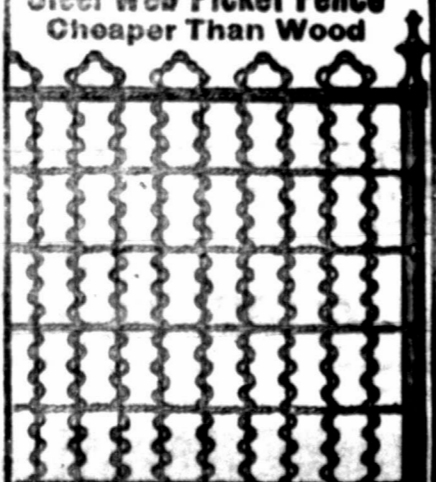

### Express Company Refuses Liquor Shipments

Guthrie, Oklahoma, June 17—(Special.)—Hereafter no person in Oklahoma can secure a shipment of intoxicating liquor delivered to him by express at any office of the American Express company in this state. S. W. Stone, state agency superintendent, today received a copy of an official order to all agents in the state, issued from St. Louis headquarters by F. D. Adams, general superintendent of the southern division of the American Express company, directing them to deliver no such shipments. The order reads: "Pursuant to order received from counsel to the governor of the state of Oklahoma, you will decline to accept any shipment of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors now in our possession, or that may come in our possession. Any such shipment on hand must be immediately returned to shippers if known. This order refers to interstate shipments as the laws of Oklahoma already prohibit the transportation of liquors between points in that state except when handled through the state agency."

The American Express company handles its business over the Missouri, Kansas & Texas road, which will make all points along this line dry as far as express shipments of intoxicants are concerned. It is rumored that the Katy railroad is also contemplating such an order, although no official confirmation of such action has been received here. The Pacific Express company has already informed State Enforcement Attorney Caldwell that it will refuse all interstate shipments of liquor to federal license holders in Oklahoma.—The Ft Worth Record.
