CONSTITUTION MAKERS MEET

W. E. Lindsey Contributes An Interesting Letter Giving Some Side Lights About Organization of Convention.

Santa Fe, N. M. Oct. 3.—Because of belated trains, we were late in arriving at Santa Fe Sunday evening, and were looking up the church meeting situation for the night service, when I learned, for the first time, that there was to be a caucus of the Republican delegates to be convened at 8 o'clock that night. We met and continued in active session until about 1:30 a. m. Monday morning. You will, no doubt, get an outline of the proceedings in the Albuquerque Journal, of that morning, but it will be no more than an outline, since the reporters promised to be "real good" if they were let into the caucus.

There was no time for the "insurgents," or progressive Republicans, to organize, while the standpatters had the thing all "cut and dried," as usual, just like the good temporizers that they are. There were sixty-eight of the seventy-one Republican delegates present and, probably, no opposition to the program would have been encountered, had not Delegate Wood, of Albuquerque, introduced a resolution requesting Charles A. Spiess, the agreed president of the convention, to release Solomon Luna from his Luna's, pledge to support Spiess, with the object in view of endeavoring to elect Luna over Spiess for president.

After the "war horses" had discussed this matter for some time, I got the floor and moved an amendment by substitution, "That the president of the convention be elected from the floor of the convention and that the Republican delegates, as to that matter, be not pledged," which motion was rather promptly ruled out of order, and I saw, after some back talk, that it would be of no use to appeal from that decision. After some further discussion, Mr. Luna simplified matters by stating that he would not stand as a candidate for election as president and that he would support Mr. Spiess, whereupon the original resolution was laid on the table "indefinitely," upon motion by Mr. Catron. The caucus then proceeded to nominate candidates for president of the convention, Mr. Spiess, of course, by the "stand patters," and Judge Parker by the "insurgents" and, after a deal of discussion, in which the writer, as the humble servant of the people of Roosevelt county, had some part speaking, of course, in behalf of the nomination of Judge Parker. The vote was taken, resulting in fifty votes for Spiess and eighteen votes for Parker.

The ultra "standpatters" had no apologies to make for the nomination of Spiess, contending that there was no foundation for the charge that he represented the "special interests." That he had always devoted a good quarter of his time as a lawyer,

gratuitously to the defense of the poor, etc. but, at the same time, agreed that they would take from him as president of the convention, his most important prerogative, to-wit, the power to appoint the committees of the convention. In this matter, it was agreed that a committee on committees, consisting of one Republican member from each county having Republican representation, to-wit, twenty-one, and one Democrat from each county having only Democratic representation, to-wit, five, to be appointed by and through the caucus. This committee on committees has plenary power to appoint all of the committees of the convention, thus preventing the same from being "packed" by one person, or any one entity, less than a representation from all of the counties of the territory.

These committees, some twenty-six in number, are now in course of construction and, of course, a great deal depends upon the personnel of these committees since, no doubt, the draft of the constitution will be worked out in these committees and passed on the floor of the convention without an iota of change, even though every Democrat and progressive Republican delegate was a Demosthenes, a William J. Bryan, or no matter what, or which.

We are very pleasantly situated here in a little four-roomed house. Mike and Helen are in school and I have hit up to an eighteen hour per day gait, and I wish you would tell my constituents in Roosevelt county that I am doing, and shall continue to do, the best that I can, and that should any of them visit Santa Fe during my stay here, we will be glad to introduce them around and to endeavor to make their visit a pleasure.

A Political Truth in Epigram.

We never can control the trusts by government until we take the government out of the control of the trusts. This is no pessimistic dream but is the crystallized truth. It is a fact as certain as death that the trusts control the government by using machine politics as its agency. Machine Rule must be abolished. The People's Rule must be restored. The only hope for transition from darkness to light is in the Democratic party and the insurgent wing of the Republican party. The Democratic party can get along without the latter if given a chance, but will use them if necessary.

H. H. Fris, traveling representative of the El Paso Herald was in the city the latter part of the week and paid the Herald force a pleasant call. The growth of the Pass City is only equaled by that of the Herald, in fact the two seem to go hand in hand in the matter of spreading out. It is a pleasure to the small country weekly to see one after the other of its number assume the metropolitan appointments of a great daily newspaper, for in most every instance the coveted place has been won by sheer superiority of service. As in most of the big dailies which come to our exchange table, there is one contributor alone in the El Paso Herald which makes the paper well worth the price of a year's subscription. Portales people would do well to read the Herald of their own town and that of the border city as well.

An Example of Unselfishness

City Alderman Ben Smith has certainly set an example of unselfishness in the administration of city affairs by lopping of his own salary as treasurer along with the motion which dispensed with the services of a marshal and night watchman. The only salary which remains to be met now will be that of the city clerk. While it is an old business axiom that an individual's or a city's expense should be kept within the bounds of its income, yet it goes without saying that it is a fault of the present form of municipal government that a business man of the town is expected to give about one-third of his time to the administration of the people's business without any remuneration whatever, and this in view of the fact that the task of filling a place on an aldermanic board is always a thankless one. A commission form of city government in which experts are employed and are paid to administer the affairs of an incorporated town is far preferable and the Herald hails the day when it will be inaugurated in Portales.

A Great Newspaper.

The Dallas News was out Saturday the 1st with a 72-page edition, the occasion being the passing of the 25th milestone—their Silver Anniversary, as some term it. There is scarcely an enterprise in Texas which is dearer to a Texan's heart, as the News has always had for its chief mission the publication of news, having given that term such a broad interpretation as to cover all those matters which tend to advantage and advance the mass materially, intellectually, politically and morally. Notable among its works have been its championship of the people's demand for the restoration of popular government in the days of reconstruction; its battle for the protection of actual settlers of the public domain and of the school lands of the State; its fight in the seventies and eighties for the abolition of the leases of the penitentiary system; its effort in behalf of the creation of a deep-water port on the Texas coast; its highly successful campaign for the diversification of crops and intensive farming; its campaign for the protection of overflow lands, now beginning to bear fruit; its persistent and constant advocacy of municipal reform, especially for the commission form of government. In these and in other matters which have eventuated in success, the News has borne a prominent part, often the part of leadership. Not only is the News dear to the Texan's heart, but it is being read with pleasure and profit by thousands outside of the Lone Star State, a host of such being in New Mexico. Long live the News!

"The Best Old Town Ever."

Looming up before us on the commercial horizon is a condition that presages good times ahead for the people of Portales and the surrounding country. No town in Eastern New Mexico has forged to the front with the rapidity and backed by solidity that makes things substantial and permanent that Portales has. No town in this section of the country has started from the "ground up" and done things that have caused the people to look on in amazement and wonder at the strides that have been made as our town and no town in New Mexico today presents better opportunities for investment with absolute surety. Portales has always made good and it has the chance now with the coming of irrigation to expand in a commercial way as it never has before.

No matter where we go, whether to the Alleghenies, where smoke and fog blend with the mountain tops; to Missouri, where the beauty of the corn field fades by the monotony of the view; across Kansas, where the fields of golden grain wave in the undisturbed breeze; to California, perfumed with orange blossoms and wreathed in flowers; nowhere will the portals to the door of opportunity be found opened wider than right here in Portales Valley. All around us are evidences of this truth. There are the young alfalfa fields spreading a sea of green over the landscape, the watermelon and cantaloupe fields, and the young orchards side by side.

In the future there will be no farmer wistfully gazing at the

sky while his crops wither in the sun. It is such a picture that makes a sojourn in this picturesque and beautiful valley so pleasant to the visitor and the attachment so strong to the citizen. The people in the valley realize, too, that the progress in the next ten years will be greater than the last decade. Come to Portales Valley.

The Constitution Makers.

The low muffled rumblings from Santa Fe indicate that the expected has happened in the organization of the constitutional convention, that is that the bosses who have been in the political limelight in New Mexico for these many years would get in the saddle. As early as Sunday last the great upheaval began to manifest itself among the arriving delegates, as the leaders saw the necessity of getting in their work before the boys strayed off into forbidden paths. At a caucus of the Republicans, who represent the element of strength in the convention, held on Sunday, the real spasm took place and with very little contest Charles A. Spiess of Las Vegas, was selected to preside over the convention, the only opposition to this gentleman in the Republican ranks being one Mr. Parker who was placed in the running by Judge W. E. Lindsey of Roosevelt county. The action of the caucus was ratified on the convention floor Monday when Hon. H. B. Ferguson was led to the altar by the Democrats, the ballot standing 69 to 29 in favor of Mr. Spiess. The other trimmings of the organization indicate that the battle-scarred bosses of the Republican party are easily in the majority.

It is significant that both the big Democratic and the Republican papers throughout the territory are construing the line-up in the organization of the convention as a signal victory for the so-called "interests," as it is alleged that it is a fact beyond dispute that those who have the residue of power are well known representatives of the corporate influences which are said to be abroad in the land.

However this may be, there is little cause for genuine alarm in this, as the people have an opportunity to judge of these men by their works, and the Herald is one of the number who will "hands off" and let the statesmen do the best they may under the circumstances, and then after their work is finished there will be plenty of time to determine whether indeed they are the true representatives of the people or are, as is represented by some, the chosen vessels of the corporations who have put them in this high position to filch the people of their vested rights. As "Pat" replied to the question of a judge after he had been arraigned on some petty charge before the case had been tried: "Are you guilty or not guilty?" said the judge. "Arrah, now, your honor, how the devil can I tell till I hear the evidence?"

It should be remembered, too, that the convention is not to legislate but to merely propose and that upon the people, not the convention, will rest the odium of sending up a bad instrument to Washington or the credit of a good one. There are two chances for the people to get what they want from the convention. There is but one chance for them to get what they want from the president and congress, that is to say the approval of the president and congress. If the constitution first drawn at Santa Fe is rejected by the people, it is mandatory upon the governor to reassemble the convention to draw up another one. If a constitution be once rejected by the president or congress that will be the end of the matter at this time.

An American constitutional convention, under normal conditions, being for the sole purpose of drafting a constitution, and having nothing to do with the ordinary administration of government, no power to raise or appropriate revenue, no influence or patronage, no opportunity of doing jobs for individuals or corporations, is not necessarily under obligations to political parties, and the fact that the constitution when drafted, has to be submitted to the people, by whose authority it will (if accepted) be enacted, should give to the convention a somewhat larger freedom for proposing what they think best than a legislature, courting or fearing its constituents, commonly allows itself.

So with these facts in mind, it would be well to let the statesmen alone until they have finished their work, which will be plenty of time in which to ascertain if these leaders are the true representatives of the people as they would have us think, for by their works we shall know them.

OUR HOME.

On Thursday night, the 29th inst., Wm. A. Moss died at the home of his brother-in-law, G. W. Carr, near Portales. This event, though not unexpected, was sad news to many both here and in his former home in Ft. Worth.

He was a victim of tuberculosis, from which dread disease he had been suffering for the past five years. During the past four years he has been an inmate of the home of his sister, Mrs. G. W. Carr, where he has been the object of unusual devotion. Everything that loving hands could do to arrest the progress of his malady and alleviate his suffering has been done; but now the anxious watching and heart-rending suspense is over and Willie is at rest.

He was born near Dallas, Texas on May 12th, 1880, was married in early manhood and is survived by a seven year old daughter, his father, J. F. Moss of Ft. Worth and two sisters, Mrs. Jno.
