### A BIG EXHIBIT FOR CONGRESS.

Portales Valley to be Represented at Chicago Irrigation Exposition Where 500,000 People will be in Attendance

It is perhaps well known to most of our readers that Portales Valley is to have an exhibit and two representatives at the coming Land & Irrigation Exhibit to be held at Chicago, Nov. 19th to Dec. 5th, inclusive. At a citizens meeting in the Sanders building last week, Messrs. Ben Smith and E. P. Aldredge were elected to attend the Exposition, to represent and boost Portales Valley, Mr. Smith agreeing to pay his own expenses. At this same meeting it was ordered that the committees on finance, exhibit and advertising be continued and that the work in all these several departments be pushed to a speedy conclusion, so that all things would be in readiness by the coming of the exposition car through Portales the 10th of November.

#### THE EXHIBIT.

The exhibit which is to represent Portales Valley is growing nicely, though there are some few items very much needed which have not as yet been gathered up. The committee has secured the following items, viz:—maize, kaffir, Indian corn, broom corn, sugar beets, onions, both kinds of potatoes, celery, alfalfa and millet. Some of these articles, however, are not of the best produced by the community, and the committee will certainly be obliged to the farmers if they will take note and bring them in at once other samples of their best maize, Indian corn, and broom corn, also sweet potatoes, etc. Then we have no adequate display of the following articles, viz:—pumpkins, watermelons, apples, canteloupes, sorghum hay, home made sorghum, oats, California wheat, peanuts, frijole beans, peas, etc. The committee wants to finish their work by next Monday, if possible, as this exhibit must be selected and arranged and packed for shipment.

#### THE ADVERTISING.

The committee on advertising will have printed 30,000 six-page folders, neat, artistic, attractive, illustrated, and bristling with pointed information. These the representatives will use as their ammunition with which to shoot 30,000 home-seekers and investors at the big exposition. The representatives are both fairly good wing shots and will do their best to bring down some little game on the way, as well as to fire a broadside pot-shot into that great mob of 500,000 land-hungry people at the exposition at Chicago. Ye editor proposes to get their attention by proclaiming to them the "Gospel of Irrigation," while Mr. Smith will be doing hand-to-hand personal work with the literature, showing them the way of prosperity more perfectly. Then, as some of our religious brethren are wont to do, we will change and Mr. Smith will "come forward and exhort the wayward" to come to Portales Valley while life and opportunity is. Both Mr. Smith and Ye editor have spoken for Mr.

Molinari's unlimited supply of "stories" and "after-dinner hits." If either of us ever live over the trip we here and now agree to tell you all about it.

#### A NEW MEXICO DAY.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 29, '10. H. B. Hening, Secretary New Mexico Bureau of Immigration, Albuquerque, N. M. Directors of Chicago land and irrigation exposition at a meeting yesterday set aside Sunday, Nov. 27 as New Mexico Day. There will be special exercises for New Mexico. Get all the boosters you can. Ask state officials to take part and notify all your friends in Chicago. Start a big movement to boost New Mexico Day at the show. Chicago Land and Irrigation Exposition.

Incidentally, we understand that Gov. Mills and a few of the territorial officials have been invited to give some added taste and dignity to the occasion. ### SKORKOWSKY'S DRY FARMING.

Some Facts and Figures Relative to the Methods Employed and the Crops Garnered From a Dry Farm.

Four years ago next March, O. W. Skorkowsky, his wife and two sons settled on the bald, barren prairie, six miles due west of Portales, and began one of the most remarkable demonstrations of the possibilities of dry farming this section of the country has ever produced. Some people, and indeed, the most of our people, have been trying to persuade themselves that dry-farming is a pretty good thing for good seasonable years, but that it is little short of a calamity to undertake this method of making a living, not to speak of building a home, when the dry, hard years come upon the country. Now here stands the Skorkowsky home and grouped around it, you can see nine huge train-like shocks of feedstuffs of grain and hay, to say nothing about the wilderness of shocked feedstuff yet in the field, all raised on this farm by three men, this harvest of all years that has come to this country.

The campus, or large grounds surrounding the home for example, are covered with a remarkable growth of shade trees, flagging the driveway to the house. While the house itself will do credit to Illinois or Indiana farm homes, having two large rooms, built of solid concrete, as basement; then four immense rooms on the first floor and three unfurnished upper rooms above all. And the remarkable thing is to know that every bit of material for the building of this home was dug out of the basement, except only the carload of Portland cement and the hardware used in the roof, etc.—the dirt being used to make cement bricks which constitute handsomestone-like walls. Not only so, but every bit of the construction work of this most splendid home was done by Mr. Skorkowsky and his two sons. And right here we desire to say

that here is one Socialist, dyed in the wool, who will not only work but apparently he can do anything that is to be done about his farm; and his two sons are not a whit behind their father.

But the home is not all of the Skorkowsky place; he has a huge barn; he has hogs and chickens! My, but the preacher's heart did grow large and warm when he was shown some 400 frying chickens which Mrs. Skorkowsky has raised this year! Think of it, man! And we have the hen house located too. Then, Mr. Skorkowsky has eleven head of large young mules, big enough and strong enough to pull anything that is loose at both ends. And do you imagine that this man and his two sons have sat out there and held their hands and grown grouchy because it didn't rain every time they wanted it to? Not a bit of it; they haven't had time; they have cultivated 320 acres of land—these three men have—and they have done their work so well that a conservative estimate gives them 320 tons of feedstuff, not to speak of what they raised in the garden and the potato patches, etc. Any hard times in sight at the Skorkowsky home? As we see it, only a fire or an earthquake can bring hard times at that home any way soon. They have this world's goods in abundance and, best of all, they raised this abundance with the intelligent efforts of their own brawn and brains. And what they have done this year they have been doing every year and will continue to do.

How do we account for the results of the efforts of this man and his sons? The answer is not at all difficult.—First, they know HOW to work, how to make their efforts count; second, they are not afraid to get down to the job and stay with it, in season and out of season; third, they do not make the same mistakes continually. When they find that a certain line of work doesn't pay, they profit by their mistakes and use the lesson of their failures in future efforts; fourth, they have a genuine love and pride in their work and in what they can do and raise on the farm and put their best efforts into all they undertake.

All in all, here is a man worth studying. We warned him about that Socialist mule he rode about here while the political pot was boiling this summer. We told him it would hurt him and it did; but in spite of that, Mr. Skorkowsky is a successful farmer, a good neighbor, and has made a record in his life and work that is an honor to his community.

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## PROPOSED ORDINANCE No. 32. **Plumbing, Rules and Penalties.**

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales, Roosevelt county, New Mexico.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Sec. 1. Any person desiring to engage in or work in the business of plumbing in the town of Portales either as a master plumber or employing plumber or as journeyman plumber shall obtain a certificate from the board of examiners as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. There is hereby created a board of examiners of plumbers. It shall consist of three members, one of whom shall be the superintendent of public works and who shall be ex-officio chairman of said board of examiners, the other members to be appointed by the Board, one of whom shall have a practical or theoretical knowledge of plumbing.

Sec. 3. Two members of said board of examiners shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business.

Sec. 4. Said board of examiners shall, as soon as the passage and taking effect of this ordinance, meet and shall then designate the time and places for the examination of applicants desiring to engage in or work at the business of plumbing in said town. It shall examine such applicants as to their practical knowledge of plumbing, house drainage and house ventilation; and if satisfied with the competency of such applicants, shall thereupon issue a certificate to such applicant authorizing him to engage in or work at the business of plumbing, whether as master plumber, employing plumber or journeyman plumber. Provided, said board of examiners may issue a certificate to applicants making the proper showing that they have worked successfully at the plumbing trade or have taken a course in some polytechnic or correspondence school, without examination.

Sec. 5. Said examination shall be in whole or in part in writing and shall be of a practical elementary character, but sufficiently strict to test the qualifications of the applicant.

Sec. 6. The fee for a certificate for a master plumber or employing plumber shall be \$5; for a journeyman plumber one dollar.

Sec. 7. All fees for examination shall be collected by the board of examiners, and shall be accounted for once a month and paid in to the town treasurer.

### LICENSE.

Sec. 8. Application for a license to engage in the business of plumbing in the town of Portales shall be made in writing to the town clerk, accompanied with a certificate of examination from the board of examiners and a bond in the sum of five hundred dollars. Bond shall be signed by two good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Town Board, and shall be conditioned that they will faithfully observe all ordinances of the town pertaining to plumbing, that they will indemnify and save harmless the town of Portales from all accidents and damages caused by any negligence in their work or by any unfaithful or inadequate work done by themselves or their employees.

Sec. 9. The fee for such license shall be fifty dollars for one year payable in advance.

Sec. 10. A license shall be issued in the firm name, stating the name of each member of the firm. No license shall be transferable.

Sec. 11. Licensees shall be responsible for the acts of their agents or employees done by virtue of said license.

### INSPECTOR AND PERMITS.

Sec. 12. There is hereby created the office of plumbing inspector, who shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees, which appointee shall hold office until his successor is appointed and qualified, and the term of office shall be for two years unless sooner removed by the Board.

Sec. 13. He shall be removed for cause at any time by the Board of Trustees.

Sec. 14. He shall be charged with the enforcement of this chapter, and shall have charge of all papers, the issuing of permits, the approval of drainage plans, and the inspection of house drainage in new or old buildings. He shall keep a daily record of his work and make written report each year, and, at the close of the term of his office to the Board, and make recommendations for the improvement of sanitary drainage in plumbing.

Sec. 15. He shall perform such other duties under order of the Board. His books and records shall at all times be open to the inspection of the mayor or other proper city officials.

Sec. 16. He shall have access during all hours of the day to all buildings of the town of Portales for the inspection of existing systems of drainage and shall be given every opportunity for a careful examination. If the same is unsanitary it shall be condemned and the building made sanitary as directed within six days after the notice is given in writing. The authority to condemn is vested in the Board of Trustees upon recommendation, in writing from the inspector stating reasons. Failure on the part of the owner to improve the system of drainage shall impel the Board of Trustees to do so charging the cost to the owner of the premises. Said cost to be collected by the town by an action of debt in the name of the town.

Sec. 17. When inspecting the drainage of any existing building the inspector shall make a plat of the same to be filed in his office with the date and location marked. Such plat shall show the run of soil and waste pipes, the size and material, the location of fixtures and traps, and the system of venting traps.

Sec. 18. He shall inspect the system of drainage in any building in the town upon request of the owner. The fee for such inspection shall be one dollar. He shall inspect any building whatsoever if called upon by a tenant or adjoining owner in writing. If the drainage is in a sanitary condition no fee shall be charged; if unsanitary the same shall be remedied as ordered in Section 16, and a fee charged to the owner of the premises for inspection. All fees shall be paid at the office of the plumbing inspector.

Sec. 19. He shall inspect all plumbing work in the process of construction; and when called upon, inspect and test for leaks, and

give a certificate of inspection when satisfactory.

Sec. 20. Permits for the drainage of any building, public or private, or for alteration, shall be obtained from the inspector before entering upon any work.

Sec. 21. The fees for a drainage permit shall be one dollar, for work costing one hundred dollars or less; and one dollar additional for each additional one hundred dollars or part thereof.

Sec. 22. Application for permit shall be made separately for each building and shall be accompanied by descriptive drawings giving the entire plan of the house sewer and showing connection with street main, and one or more sections showing each separate fixture. Such drawing and descriptions shall be made with ink on white paper or tracing cloth, and in accordance with rules laid down by the inspector. They shall show the size and kind of pipes, traps, fixtures and connections.

Sec. 23. Applications for changing permit must be made in writing and the original permit returned for correction or issuing of a new permit. No material deviation from permit and approval plan shall be allowed.

Sec. 24. A permit shall be good for one year from date of issue, if the work is not completed within that time the permit shall be returned and a new one issued.

Sec. 25. Permits for making taps to sewer shall be obtained in writing from the inspector and inspection called for when first connection is made to sewer.

Sec. 26. Permits shall be granted within 24 hours when practicable and in no case shall there be a delay of more than 30 days.

Sec. 27. All permits shall be returned within 24 hours of completion of work.

Sec. 28. All permits shall be issued in duplicate and numbered consecutively, and dated. One copy shall be kept on file in the office of the inspector.

Sec. 29. All property owners in the town of Portales shall have the right at his own expense to construct a lateral sewer abutting his own property under the direction and supervision of the Inspector and at such times as the Inspector may prescribe.

Sec. 30. That whenever any property owner desires to build any such lateral sewer as provided for in Section 29, he shall file in the office of the inspector a request or notice in writing stating where he desires to build such sewer, the point where he desires to connect with the main or lateral sewer, and shall also deposit with such notice a sum sufficient to cover the estimated cost to the town of Portales of building such sewer.

Sec. 31. When such notice has been filed in accordance with the provisions of Section 30, the Inspector shall prepare profiles, plans and specifications and deliver a copy to such property owner and such sewer shall be built in accordance with such profiles, plans and specifications.

Sec. 32. All private sewers hereafter constructed in the town shall be constructed at the expense of the owner or owners of the property of which the sewer is required and said owner or owners shall be liable for the costs of laying, repairing or cleaning the same. All private sewers shall be constructed in accordance with this article.

Sec. 33. All property along any lateral or main sewer may be compelled to be connected with such sewer by the service of a thirty day notice to be given by the sewer inspector to the property owner to connect his premises with said sewer. Upon the expiration of such notice and the failure of the property owner to connect with said sewer, the town may enter upon the premises and make such connections and such property shall be liable for the costs of making such connections and the same shall be assessed against the property and collected as other special taxes are assessed and collected in such case made and provided.

Sec. 34. All property connecting with a lateral or main sewer shall pay the Public Service Co. the sum of \$2.50 for such connections so made.

Sec. 35. Each building shall be separately and independently connected with the street sewer, where one is provided. If there is no sewer in street or alley, a private sewer may be constructed when plans for same are approved by the plumbing inspector and committee on sewer of the town Board.

Sec. 36. The main sewer drain, when two (2) feet or more from the building, shall be of cylindrical vitrified tile, of the best quality, free from splits and other imperfections. Spigot and hub ends to be concentric. It shall not be less than four (4) inches inside bore and 1/2 inch thick. It shall slope uniformly one-fourth (1/4) of an inch or more to each foot of run, from the building to the street sewer. It shall rest on a smooth and solid bottom with the ground hollowed out for hubs and the soil rammed on each side of pipe.

Sec. 37. The joints shall be made tight with equal parts of Portland cement and sand mixed dry and enough water added to give consistency. The cement shall be mixed in small quantities and used immediately. No retempered cement shall be used. Clean all joints on the inside with a swab.

Sec. 38. All changes in direction shall be made with proper bends. No "T" connection shall be allowed.

Sec. 39. The trench shall be left uncovered until accepted by the plumbing inspector.

Sec. 40. When a slope of one-fourth inch to each foot of run cannot be obtained or when the ground is newly 'made ground' or of a yielding nature, and also for that part of the house sewer which is under the building and extending two (2) feet beyond the wall line, the sewer shall be constructed of material similar to that required for the solid pipes. No iron sewers shall be permitted with less slope than one-eighth inch to the foot.

Sec. 41. When the sewer passes through a new wall, the wall above shall be left two (2) inches clear, by arching or flagging over, to avoid danger of settling.

Sec. 42. The sewer under the house may be in a trench and covered over, or it may be supported on piers or from joists above the floor to the satisfaction of the inspector. No test shall be made until secured.

Sec. 43. Soil pipes shall be made of cast iron four (4) inches inside diameter, coated while hot, both inside and outside, with asphaltum or tar. They shall extend through the roof for ventilation not less than (2) feet. If receiving the discharges from more than five water closets and five other fixtures, or the equivalent thereof, it shall be increased in size as required by the plumbing inspector.

Sec. 44. Standing waste pipes shall be two (2) inches in diameter unless receiving the discharge of more than five fixtures. It shall then be increased 1 inch in diameter for each 2 or less additional fixtures. In other respects the waste pipes shall be similar to the soil pipes.

Sec. 45. No cap or cowl shall be allowed on vent or waste

pipes. On flat roofs, the outlets shall be covered with a strong mesh galvanized wire basket.

Sec. 46. A grease trap or catch basin of approved pattern shall be used in connection with slop sinks, kitchen or pantry sinks in all restaurants, hotels, eating houses and boarding houses.

Sec. 47. All traps shall be protected from siphonage by reventing the crown of each trap.

Sec. 48. Revent pipes shall not be less than inside bore of trap. If more than five fixtures are revented from one pipe, the main revent shall be increased as required by the plumbing inspector. The revent pipe shall extend through the roof.

If less than five fixtures discharge into the vertical pipe, the revent pipe may branch into the vertical pipe two feet or more above the waste or overflow of the highest fixture. No revent pipes shall be more than ten feet from the vertical pipe. No revent pipes shall be allowed to run as to form a trap.

Durham fittings may be used in all revent work.

Sec. 49. The overflow and waste water from cisterns, safing under fixtures, sediment pipes from kitchen boilers, steam exhaust and blow off pipes and waste pipes of all descriptions shall be discharged into an open water supplied sink or condenser, and not directly into the sewer. All drip pipes shall be as short as possible and shall admit of frequent flushing and be protected at the outlet with a metal flap. Overflow and waste pipes shall have a weight of not less than:

One-inch pipe, two pounds per foot; one and one-quarter inch pipe, two and one-half pounds per foot; one and one-half inch pipe, three and one-half pounds per foot; two inch pipe, five pounds per foot; three inch pipe, six pounds per foot; four inch pipe, eight pounds per foot.

Waste pipe from refrigerators or receptacles in which provisions are stored or chilled shall waste into open trays in plain sight below such refrigerator or receptacles. The waste pipes from these trays may discharge into open sinks properly trapped or in the ground outside of the building in plain sight.

Sec. 50. A special permit shall be required for placing water closets in cellar or basements. Water closets within the house shall be supplied from special tank of five gallon capacity or more and used for no other purpose. Two or more closets when on the same floor may be supplied from the same tank. The flush pipe shall not be less than one quarter inches inside diameter. The tray shall be in the bowl and above the floor with a large body of water exposed to view and sufficient immediately to cover, and thus temporarily disinfect and de-odorize the excreta. Such closets shall not require a revent. The water closet bowl shall be set in putty and firmly bolted to the floor, or provided with a rubber gasket, in either case the stool must be secured firmly to the floor. No closet requiring mechanical devices, such as plungers or Pan closets shall be allowed. When such closets are removed for repairs, they shall not be replaced. Shall have separate cut-off cocks to facilitate repairs.

Sec. 51. Urinals shall hold a body of water in a bowl or trap, and shall be flushed by a tank or with direct supply pipes. If floor wastes are used, these shall be trapped and the traps supplied with water as above, all materials about these urinals shall be non-absorbative and non-corrosive.

Sec. 52. When the drainage system is completed ready for the connection of fixtures, the plumbing inspector shall be notified and he shall inspect the same, the inspection to include any test he shall see fit to apply, and, if satisfactory, give the plumber a certificate of inspection.

Sec. 53. The inspection of such work shall in no case be delayed over 24 hours after notice of completion is rendered. No notice to inspect shall be given until all is complete.

Sec. 54. No privy vaults or cess pools shall hereafter be constructed in the town of Portales when connection can be made with the sewer.

Sec. 55. If tanks are used for drinking water, they shall not be lined with zinc or galvanized iron. They shall be constructed of wood or iron, and may be lined with tin copper.

Sec. 56. If drainage pipes are put in for future use, they shall have all openings closed by soldering or calking up perfectly water tight and tested by the water test.

Sec. 57. Steam boilers for power purposes shall not be supplied directly from the service pipe, but from a tank of sufficient capacity to hold 12 hours supply in case of shutting off the district for repairs.

Sec. 58. It shall be unlawful to throw or deposit, or cause to be thrown or deposited, in any vessel or receptacle connected with a public sewer, any garbage, hair, ashes, fruit or vegetables, peeling or kitchen refuse of any kind, rags, cotton clinders, or any other matter or thing whatsoever, except faeces, urine, the necessary closet paper, and liquid house slops.

### SERVICE PIPES.

Sec. 59. All connections with service pipes placed in any street or alley and connected with the town water main and one and one-half inches and under in diameter, shall be of lead or galvanized iron and shall be of standard and approved weight.

Sec. 60. Each premise shall have curb stop cocks, with an adjustable cut off iron box conveniently placed. The same to have cast an iron hinged cover with the letters 'water' on the top.

Stop cocks shall be made of good brass, and shall have a full sized roundway and a strong adjustable head. When curb stop cocks are over one inch in diameter they shall be 'gate valves.' And all service pipes running into any building shall have a stop and waste cock placed in a convenient place in the building so that the water can be turned off and the pipes drained; said service pipes shall be so constructed that they will drain to said cock.

No more than one house or premises shall be supplied from one line or service pipe, or hydrant, without a special permit in writing from the plumbing inspector.

Sec. 61. The openings of all connections to the water main shall be one inch or less in diameter.

Sec. 62. No taps shall be inserted in the same water main nearer than three feet apart, nor nearer than one foot to the joint. All taps shall be made at or near the top of the main.

Sec. 63. All hydrant or street washers shall be set at least two feet in the ground and have a good and sufficient drain well secured with rubble, broken stone or brick so as to allow free discharge of water from the bottom of the hydrant. And all service pipes shall be set at least 18" in the ground.

Sec. 64. In making excavations in streets or alleys or highways for any purpose whatever, the paving material and earth removed must be kept separate and deposited so as to occasion the

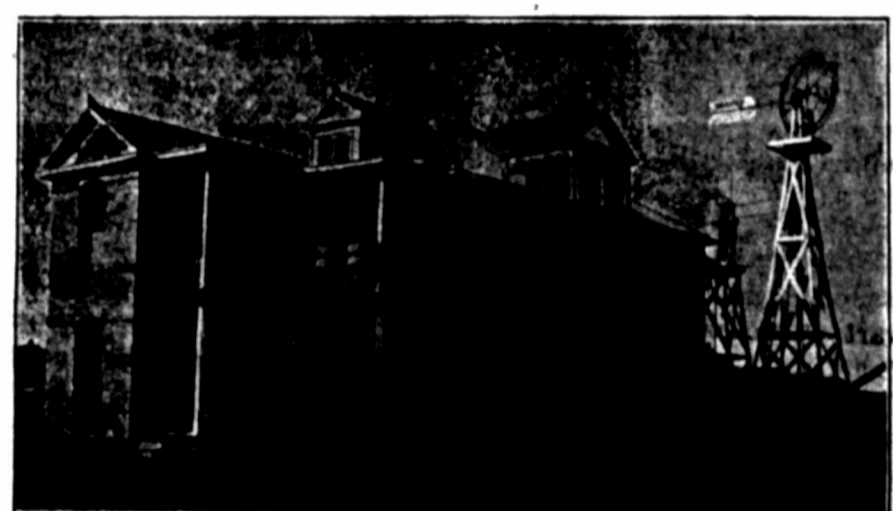

**PROPOSED ORDINANCE No. 32.**  
**Plumbing, Rules and Penalties.**

(Concluded from page 3)

least inconvenience to the public, with provisions for the passage of water along the gutter and a safe passage way for foot travel. Red lights shall be placed in sufficient numbers and kept in good trim at night when any danger exists. All excavated material shall be refilled, puddled and tramped as fast as practicable, firmly in a manner to prevent settling. The paving and planking or macadamizing shall be replaced to the satisfaction of the street commissioner.

Sec. 65. The service pipe within the premises and the house shall be of lead or galvanized wrought iron, and if lead shall weigh not less than pipes required for street service, or if any be butt-welded, wrought, galvanized iron pipe and fitting, proved in the factory to three hundred (300) pounds hydraulic pressure. All joints on lead line shall be wiped joints.

Sec. 66. All tapping of the water mains shall be done by an agent of the Public Service Co. and a charge of \$10 shall be made for performing such service.

Sec. 67. There shall be a separate stop cock placed on supply pipe to every closet.

Sec. 68. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars for each and every violation. Any certificate may be revoked for cause by the Board of Trustees.

Sec. 69. All ordinances and parts of ordinances conflicting with the above ordinance are hereby repealed.
