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## DEMOCRATS TO RE ORGANIZE

Roosevelt County Democrats Will Come Together And Perfect Organization of Executive Committee Means Settlement of Differences.

In last week's issue of the Herald appeared a call made by the Territorial Democratic Central Committee for the Democratic County convention of Roosevelt county, for the purpose of selecting eleven delegates to represent said county at the Democratic territorial convention to be held at Santa Fe on December 17th, 1910 and for the purpose of effecting a re-organization of the Democratic County Central committee of said county.

It will be observed from this proceeding on the part of the Territorial Central Committee that an adjustment of the factional differences which so sorely beset the party in the campaign for delegates to the constitutional convention has been made, and the Herald takes pleasure in saying in this connection that the arrangement meets with the entire approval of all who have the interests of the party at heart in Roosevelt county. In fact it has long ago occurred to those who were a party to the split in the ranks of the Democracy of Roosevelt county that a Moses was needed to lead us out of the wilderness of internecine strife incident to the selection of delegates from Roosevelt county to the constitutional convention, and three men conspired to bring this about. These three men were none other than James A. Hall of Elida, Judge Wm. R. McGill of La Lande, and Judge C. M. Compton of Portales. These three men put our differences before the Territorial Central Committee and requested it to make a call for a re-organization of the county executive committee as stated above. The Central committee complied with the appeal, hence the call, which places the welfare of the party in an entirely new attitude for service.

Harmony is now the keynote of the Democracy of Roosevelt county and well may it be the watchword of all true democrats for indeed there must be some giving as well as some taking if we are to accomplish anything as the vessels of a great and victorious party. As far as the Herald has been able to ascertain, practically all the old war-horses of the county democracy will be on hand at the re-organization of the forces, not mounted however on the high horse of "I rule or I ruin" and all of the trimmings of paint and feathers, but "the white-winged dove of peace will find a resting place in the council of the great.

In line with this peace program, an extract of a letter from Mr. James A. Hall of Elida, is illustrative of the get-together spirit which is already working as the leaven in the dough. Mr. Hall says:

"With reference to the present status of our party in Roosevelt county, it would seem that under the present arrangement, we have an opportunity to exhibit to the Democracy of the Territory our manhood. Now is the time when we should rise above factional and personal strife. The present arrangement was arrived at and agreed to after

much and mature deliberation, and it has met with universal commendation in this part of our county. I can see no reason why the coming County Convention should not be harmonious in every respect, and I assure you that my labors shall be so directed."

The verbal protestations of this same spirit are just as free from other leaders in the county as for example the amen of Judge H. F. Jones, Judge Sam J. Nixon, Judge A. B. Seay, Judge G. L. Reese, Judge T. E. Mears, B. J. Reagan, R. A. Bain, E. P. Williams, J. B. Priddy, W. W. Van Winkle, J. B. Crawford, and a host of others who are shining lights of the true faith. And well may the individuality of these leaders be exerted to bring this result about, for there are many things which are apt to engage the attention of the people of this county politically, in the very near future, and matters even now before us which require the concerted action of all the hosts. In the first place, the democrats of this county must set their seal of approval or disapproval upon the new proposed constitution, a matter requiring the earnest consideration of every one of us, if we are to prove the savor of life in the affairs of our new state. In the second place, the near approach of statehood makes it imperative that the democrats present a solid front in this county if we are to place the high encomium of responsible office upon the shoulders of men who are normally entitled and pre-eminently gifted for the new places of trust in the formation of the state government. There is not a shadow of doubt but that this can be accomplished and will be if the present portent of conditions count for anything.

## ALLDREDGE COMPOSES SONG

New Mexico Day Arrives With No Song It Deserves Its Advent - Alldredge Risks to Embody and Sets Crowd Agoing With Music

James S. Kirby, secretary of the Roswell Chamber of Commerce, in writing to the Roswell Daily Record of the doings at the big land show in Chicago, has some very complimentary things to say about Portales boosters who are in attendance there: His report also included a sonnet composed by E. P. Alldredge, editor of the Herald, which the force takes pleasure in reproducing, as we know the native modesty of the scribe would forbid his sending the composition to this paper direct. Mr. Kirby says: "Those who represent the different sections of the new state are the most obliging and congenial set of men it has ever been my good pleasure to meet. ## BIG LAND SHOW HAS CLOSED

The Greatest of All Agricultural Exhibits in America  
Came to a Close Last Sunday—A Success  
From Every Viewpoint.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 30.—It is difficult in brief space, to give any sort of clear conception to the readers of the Herald, of this third and greatest of the land and irrigation expositions which have gathered here in the Windy City these three seasons, and which have grown from year to year until the Tribune, under whose fostering care the great enterprise has thus come to its splendid fruition, has been forced to ask a committee of Chicago business men to succeed to its future management.

The Coliseum building, located at 15th and Wabash, is the only house in the city large enough to hold this national agricultural exposition. Practically every state in the Union is represented and, in addition, several of the states have as many as three or more exhibits, representing distinct sections and enterprises.

The exhibits are, of course, of several kinds, to-wit:—1st, there is the exhibit made of the products of the soil only which are arranged in every conceivable way to catch and interest and hold the attention of the passers-by. These are very remarkable, and, though Portales leads on some lines, it amounts to a liberal education in agriculture to make a study of this phase of the exposition alone.

But, secondly, and even more engaging and interesting, are exhibits of a given valley or entire section of country, in plaster paris cast or in the actual soil from the land being exploited; and in most instances of this kind a miniature farm, or pumping proposition as the case may be, will also be shown, which tells the eye at a glance what is being done—an idea advocated by ye editor for Portales Valley before coming here.

Again, there are various exhibits of all kinds of farming implements, and also of all kinds of pumps, gas engines, etc.

Finally, nearly every booth has some freak proposition to catch the eye and draw the crowd. As example, we have a big live horned owl sitting in a cage right on top of the Portales exhibit, and every fellow stops and gaps at him, upon which some of us fellows say: "Get Wise to New Mexico." The Santa Fe Railway almost outdid us all, in this line however, by building their booth a pure Spanish style and filling it with real live Indians of various tribes who make pottery, weave blankets and dance their vago dances before the astonished natives of Chicago and the whole United States who gather round them and stare in wonder at the redskins.

In this connection I must mention also, the part played by the moving picture shows. We have an automatic machine in the New Mexico booth that handles some slides at a time and handles beautifully, without the aid of human hands. It has been the greatest feature of the Mexico exhibit and has attracted more attention than any one feature of the big show.

In addition, however, are two great assemblies in the south end of the building and stereopticon lectures going on there every day, there being a New Mexico hour in each day and some one of the New Mexico fellows speak great crowds there some time a day. Ye editor has had in on this job several Great crowds attend because many of tired of walking all over building and want to and because they are hungry to know what is and looks like. Must not leave out the

fact that the Government has used the entire balcony on all sides of the building in a wonderful exhibit of the army and navy life and work, good roads and various phases of the reclamation service work.

Along with these features of the great exposition have gone certain other "side shows" or special features. Not the least of these is the music rendered by a splendid brass band and a wonderful soloist, all furnished by the Tribune. Then we have enough guessing contests to satisfy the gambling instincts of everyone. Each day, for example, some state gives a farm of ten or twenty acres or a New Mexico relinquishment to the person guessing nearest to the correct number of beans in a jar hung up in sight of all. Along this line the New Mexico fellows are giving away one of the many splendid Navajo blankets every day. Then we have Washington eating apples for sale and the Michiganders are selling enough "home made cider" to clear a profit over all expense of their exhibit, in true Yankee style. There is a cafe downstairs where they serve small lunches for large prices and give you a little to eat and lots to drink—about as many women "drink" as men.

### NEW MEXICO DAY.

Well, it was a "hummer," it rained practically all day, but in spite of this and the fact that it was Sunday, the crowd absolutely "swamped" us and but for the help of Miss Ewell, a former resident of the Portales community, I don't see how we would have gotten along. More than 18,000 people crowded into the building that day. We were given the large assembly hall all day, and used it to good advantage, each one of the New Mexico men speaking in turn. Another special feature was the New Mexico song. At 10 o'clock in the morning we waked to the realization that it was our day and yet we had no song. After some frantic efforts by several of the men to produce a song on the spur of the moment, the task was handed over to ye editor who wrote a song to the tune of "My Maryland." The famous soloist of the band sang it and the people went wild and encircled him again and again. Then ye editor waked up to find himself famous (???) and the city editors and the editor of the Earth came after the song, a sketch of his life, his picture etc. We have promised to indulge the Earth, but cannot yet believe that so short a poem written on the spur of the moment can justify the enthusiasm.

### OTHERS HELPING US.

What are we doing? Well, we are working about 15 hours a day trying to present the claims of Portales Valley to every man and woman of the thousands who through these halls from day to day—and there seems to be no end to the tide of hungry land-hunters which pours itself through this great building every hour of the day and up to eleven o'clock every night. We had out our advertising matter, which is as good as anything I have seen, and gave it out. Everyone who is interested at all, one of us tells the proposition to him until we know he understands it, then we enroll him and try to get him to set a time when he will come to New Mexico. But we have been greatly assisted, and in some instances in ways we least expected it. For example, we found the American Well Works people distributing right and left a handsome booklet which gives a fine write-up of our irrigation plant. To the many people here who have sought more detailed information than our little folders gave, this booklet has come in good place. In this connection we must mention the valuable personal service and courtesies rendered us by Messrs. Arnold and Chappell of the Westing-

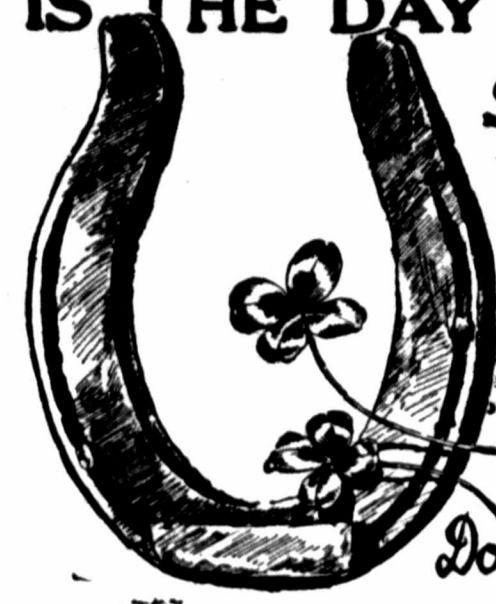

house Co., Messrs. Moore of the American Bonding Co., Miss Ewell of Chicago but formerly of Portales, already referred to, and Mr. Livingstone (the Democrat) who came in late but made a full hand after getting here. Another great help to us came Sunday (New Mexico day) when the Deming people who are strongly represented here, got the American Well Works to install a pump and "show the folks how we make it rain in New Mexico." This pump, like the moving picture slides, goes right on telling the story of the development of New Mexico while we work, hand to hand, with the people from morning 'till night.

### SOME THINGS DEMONSTRATED.

Meantime, while this land exposition has been going on, several things relative to Portales Valley have become quite clear.

(1) There is no proposition like ours represented on the floor of this building, we have better water and more of it, as good or better soil at much cheaper prices, with a climate equal to any and better than most, and our co-operation plan of pumping by irrigation is simply better beyond comparison than any other system. The future of Portales Valley has grown more certain and more wonderfully great to my mind every hour we have spent in this exposition hall. Indeed, we can see no way that our section can be kept back behind any other, 3 to 5 years from now, no matter what comes to us of delays and hardships for the time being.

Again, it is certain that we hit upon the proper method of advertising in having two representatives because no matter what is the nature of our exhibit of products or our literature, nothing carries the weight of a personal hand to hand, face to face, talk with the people. The only mistakes we made, as I see it were (1) that we did not have an exhibit of our own, separate from the New Mexico exhibit, which this year was impossible and impracticable, and (2) that we did not have four representatives instead of two, for no man can stand the strain of grappling with this great mob of people from morning 'till ten or eleven o'clock at night, day in and day out. Then when a man is especially interested, he needs to go aside and have a man go into the matter in detail and not stop and block the work of handing out the cards and folders and finding others. Each man should have his work and have some time for rest. We haven't gone to bed but one night in a week before 12 o'clock—and

haven't been hunting up Chicago either. Next year, we should have a separate exhibit, have a miniature Portales Valley and a pumping plant, with a large and varied exhibit and four or five "live wire" representatives.

Let us say in conclusion that when this exposition closes Sunday night we believe that a new day will have dawned for Portales Valley. So many people have received, read and kept our literature; so many people have been given a careful explanation of our proposition and so many have declared their intentions of coming to see for themselves what we have, that we cannot help believing that by the first of March, enough new people will have come into our community to put our proposition on a splendid basis.

## COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION

Commissioners' Court in Call Session Issues Election Proclamation and Appoints Judges For Constitution Poll January 21.

Proceedings of the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, at a call session, thereof, held in the court house in Portales, New Mexico, on the 5th day of December, A. D. 1910.

Present:—C. V. Harris, chairman; W. H. Montgomery, commissioner; C. P. Mitchell, clerk.

The board met for the purpose of issuing Election Proclamation, and to appoint judges for same.

**ELECTION PROCLAMATION.**

To the people of Roosevelt county, New Mexico:

Whereas, the Constitutional Convention which convened in the city of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, the third day of October, A. D. 1910, in accordance with the Act of Congress entitled, "An act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitutional and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states," and

Whereas, the Constitutional Convention requested the Governor of the Territory of New Mexico to issue a Proclamation ordering an election to be held on the twenty-first day of January, A. D. 1911 to determine whether or not the constitution so framed should be ratified and adopted as the fundamental law of the proposed state of New Mexico,

Now, therefore, we the board of county commissioners of Roosevelt county, New Mexico, do hereby order an election to be held on the twenty-first day of January, A. D. 1911 in the different precincts of and including the whole of said Roosevelt county, New Mexico, to either ratify or reject the said proposed constitution, and at said election, all citizens who are legal qualified voters of the Territory of New Mexico, shall be entitled to vote. Those voting in favor of the ratification of the said constitution shall vote in either English or Spanish "For the Constitution," and those opposed to the ratification of the said constitution shall vote in either English or Spanish "Against the Constitution."

Done in Portales at the court house this 5th day of December, A. D. 1910.
