**Soldiers Buying U. S. War Bonds**

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 26 —Soldiers at Duncan field here have gone all-out for the war bond drive. Last week one captain bought a \$5,000 bond and men of his squadron purchased \$14,135 more in bonds and stamps during the day. Another soldier inherited \$1,300 from his uncle and immediately bought a \$1,000 bond.

Technical Sergeant Morris E. Cargal of San Antonio has them all beaten, however. He's selling all his furniture and converting the cash into bonds.

"Furniture's too hard to carry and besides it wears out. These bonds will be plenty good after we've licked Hitler," he says.

AUSTIN, Aug. 26 —Camp Swift near Bastrop claims the record for war bond purchases by an individual soldier.

A private who enjoined that his name not be made public wrote the camp war bond officer and ordered a \$10,000 bond. He enclosed a check for it.

What's more, he informed the officer his purchases total \$40,000 and he expects to buy \$20,000 more by the end of the year.

The private explained that he had liquidated all of his assets and was buying bonds with the proceeds.

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or

Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

### Room Requests Breaks Records At WTS College

CANYON, Aug. 26—The importance placed upon college training by business and governmental agencies at this time is believed to have a relation to the present keen demand for fall term living accommodations at West Texas State College. Room requests have broken all records for this time of year. Choice rooms are still available in dormitories and private homes, but it is evident that these will be taken before the fall term opens on September 22. Refinishing of dormitories and cottages is under way. Most college activities will be continued in the coming term, although travel will be restricted and war work will be stressed. Instruct-

tion in band will be raised to major status, according to Wallace R. Clark, head of the Department of Music. The Buffalo football squad, including a dozen veterans, will assemble September 5 to start fall training under Coaches Gus Miller and W. W. (Windy) Nicklaus. The team will play eight hard games, opening with Texas Tech at Lubbock on September 26, continuing through six other Border Conference contests, and closing against Sheppard Field at Wichita Falls on November 21. Last year the Buffs finished third in football and first in basketball in the strong Border circuit. Much war training will be offered by West Texas State, including work for future officers, mechanics, and professional men. Business training, especially in intensive short courses, will be stressed. Pilot training classes will graduate each eight weeks from preliminary training.

### LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. No. 24—  
A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction, or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election therefor; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 22-a and reading as follows: "Section 22-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by local or general law (without the necessity of advertising any such local law), in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants according to the then last Federal Census, to create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Those voters opposed to such Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"Against the Amendment to the

Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the vote cast is in favor of the Amendment, the same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

### LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. No. 1—  
A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller, with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the State of Texas, on or after September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as 49-a, to read as follows:

"Section 49-a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening, a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal year and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal

to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) per cent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas as hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

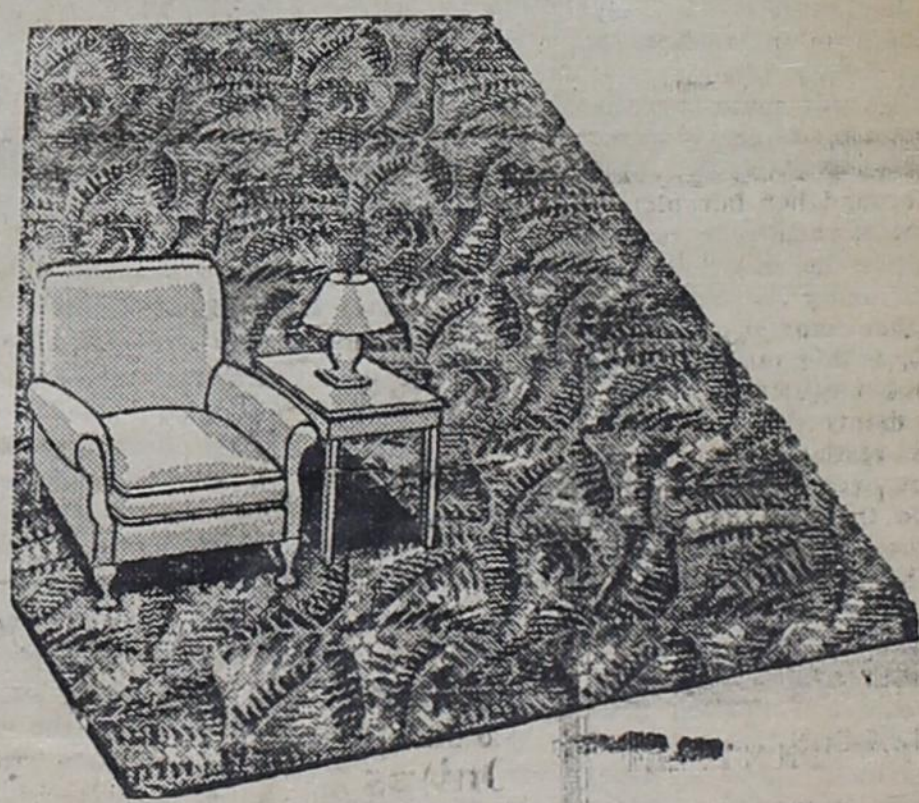

Sugar For Wartime Canning

Prepared by Ava A. Grindstaff, County Home Agent

Syrup for Wartime Canning. No. 2 Corn Syrup for Canning. Corn syrup is quite good for canning because it doesn't mask the flavor of fruit. To make a light syrup use 1/2 cup corn syrup to 1/2 cup water.

Honey for Canning: When honey is diluted sufficiently it is good for canning. About 3/4 cup of water and 1/4 cup of honey make a good syrup for canning most fruits.

For preserves and sweet pickles: Honey is much better in preserves and jams than in jelly. If possible, use at least 1/3 sugar and 2/3 honey for preserves.

For jelly: Honey makes a good texture of jelly. Substitute it for sugar cup for cup. The color of the jelly is darker, however, and it takes a minute longer to cook.

How to make invert sugar: Mix 1 cup of sugar and 14 tablespoons water. Add 1/4 teaspoon tartaric acid. Cover this sugar, water and tartaric acid mixture and boil gently for 30 minutes.

Use of Invert Sugar: This syrup is excellent to use in canning, and it may be diluted 1/2 syrup and 1/2 water. It is also good in sweetening fruits, cereals, ice cream and beverages.

Recipes: Here are some recipes suggested for using corn syrup and honey. Honey Apple Butter: 1 qt. honey, 1 gal. good cooking apples, 1 qt. vinegar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Growers Favor Holding Cotton For 21.17 Cents

At the 1942 cotton price conference, growers favor holding cotton for 21.17 cents. The conference was held in Dallas, Texas, and was attended by representatives from all major cotton-producing states.

J. E. McDonald, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, said the proposal would put from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000 more into the pockets of farmers of his state. Joe C. Scott, Oklahoma Agricultural Commissioner, said growers in his state would realize an additional \$20,000,000.

Bankhead said that although President Roosevelt found the beginning had opposed 110 per cent parity prices, Secretary of Agriculture Wickard had favored it. "But only a few days ago, Bankhead added, Secretary Wickard jumped the lines. He says now that the price should not be above 100 percent."

Senator W. Lee O'Daniel of Texas praised Thomas and Bankhead, saying they were deeply interested in agriculture. He himself, he added, was interested not only in cotton, but in agriculture generally.



LEGAL NOTICE

U. J. R. No. 23. A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article 3 to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building or buildings.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas to the Permanent School Fund for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings, and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in such bonds."

Section 2. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-c, which shall read as follows: "Section 49-c. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in such bonds."

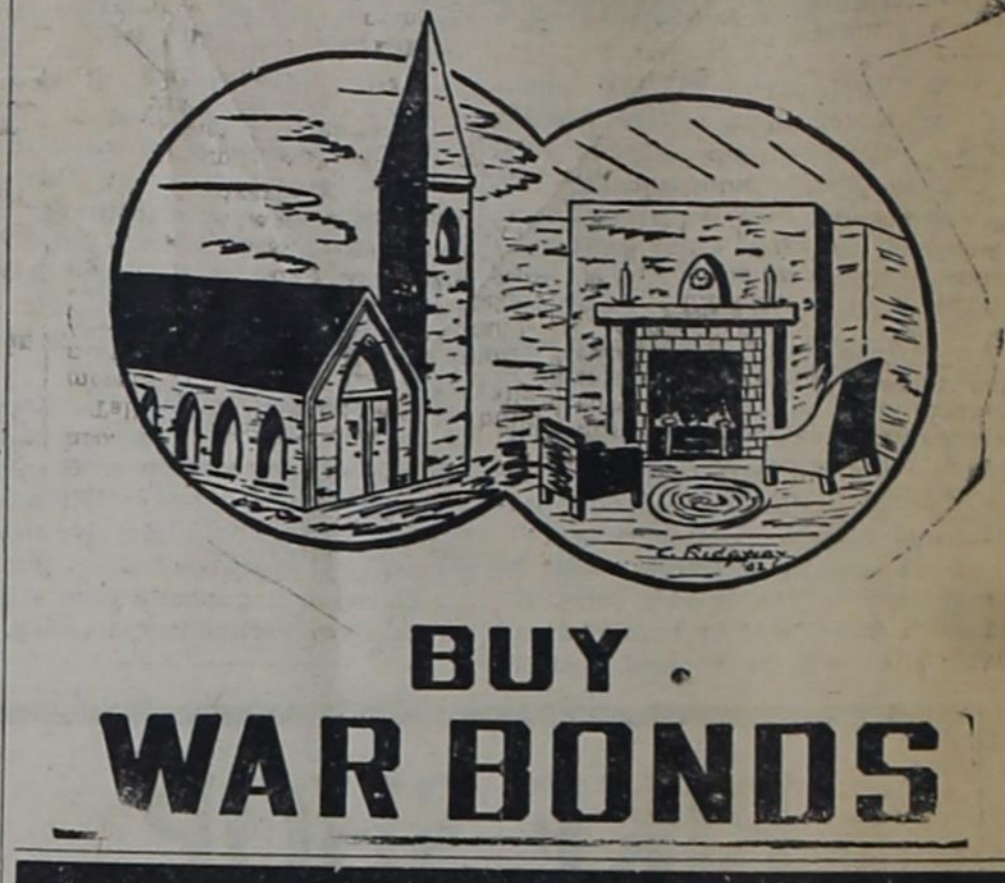
Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.
