Armed Port Arthur.

Chefoo, Sept. 12, 11 p. m.—The story of the happenings before Port Arthur for the last ten days, according to the Novokral, is one of bombardments, outpost clashes and reconnoitering exploits.

The bombardments of the Pailichuang fort, which is only 300 yards from Tighunshan, are frequent. The Russians are trying desperately to retard the further strengthening of the position.

On Sept. 1 a fire partially destroyed the village of Pailichuang. Later the Russian artillery leveled a stone house and walls which the Japanese had been using for cover.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 12.—The Emperor has called to arms the reserve troops in twenty-two circuits of the governments of Kherasan, Besarabia, Ekartolav and Taurid, belonging to the military district of Odessa, and also one category of reserve officers throughout the empire.

London, Sept. 12.—A dispatch to Reuter's Telegram Company from St. Petersburg says it is understood that Vicerey Alexieff, in view of the military contingencies in the Far East, has placed his resignation in the hands of the Emperor, but that no decision with regard to it has been made.
