FORD RETAIL SALES GO OVER MILLION

Show Increase of 105,000 Cars and Trucks Over Previous Year.

Retail sales of Ford cars, trucks and Fordson tractors have again exceeded the million mark for the year 1921, according to a statement given out today by the Ford Motor Company.

The Ford factory and assembly plant production figures reached a total of 1,050,740 cars, trucks and tractors for the year, with retail sales by dealers approximating 1,093,000, which in the United States alone surpassed the 1920 retail sales record by 104,213 Ford cars and trucks.

The Ford Company says the outlook for 1922 is decidedly optimistic. In fact, concrete evidences already exist in that car and truck retail sales for December 1921, exceeded December 1920 sales by almost twenty-five per cent and Fordson retail sales for the same periods show an increase of over 100 per cent for December 1921, as well as an increase over the total tractor sales for the month of November.

These facts seem to indicate that not only are the farmers buying more freely, but that the general public is becoming more responsive and receptive.

Another point brought out by a comparison of production figures for the past two years shows that Ford enclosed cars are gaining in popularity, as 23 per cent of the 1921 production were Sedans and Coupes as against a total of 18 per cent for the year previous.

Recent reductions in Ford car and truck prices brought them to a new low level. The touring car now sells for \$348, the runabout for \$319, the Coupe for \$580, the Sedan for \$645, the Chassis for \$285 and the truck for \$430, all F. O. B. Detroit.

This is the fourth price cut in the past sixteen months. During that time the price of the touring car alone has been cut from \$575 to \$348, a reduction of 40 per cent. Reductions on some of the other types have been even greater.

The Ford Company believes that this reduction, while not a large one, is especially important at this time as it should go a long way toward stabilizing market conditions.

Ford is giving employment at present to approximately 40,000 men in his main plant at Detroit, the importance of which is emphasized when consideration is given to the fact that nearly 20 per cent of the city's population is directly dependent upon the Ford Motor Company.

CHRISTIAN UNITY.

It is not the use of a variety of names for the church or its members that is condemned in the Word, but the use of names for PARTY designations. The church is called by a variety of names. Jesus said, "I will build MY church." It is referred to as the "Body of Christ," the "Bride of Christ," the "Household of Faith," the "Household of God," the "Church of God," "Church of the First-born," "Churches of Christ" (plural), and otherwise designated, but more often than any other, probably more often than all others together, it is simply, "the church." The point to note in particular is that none of the various names used were used to designate divisions or sects of the church, but were used interchangeably. In Ro. 8:6 Paul tells us that the mind of the flesh, the carnal mind, is DEATH. Now ETUDY carefully 1 Cor. 1:10-13 in connection with 1 Cor. 3:3-5 and you will see very clearly that it is sinful for us to use any names in a factional sense. The individual members of the church in the New Testament likewise were known by a variety of names. Jesus called His disciples "Friends." The name was never used in the church instituted after His resurrection, but it shows he relation He sustained to His followers. He also said, "One is your teacher (Master), and all ye are brethren." As this relation was even closer than that of friendship, the members of the New Testament church used the term "Brethren" freely. It shows their relation to one another. "Disciples"

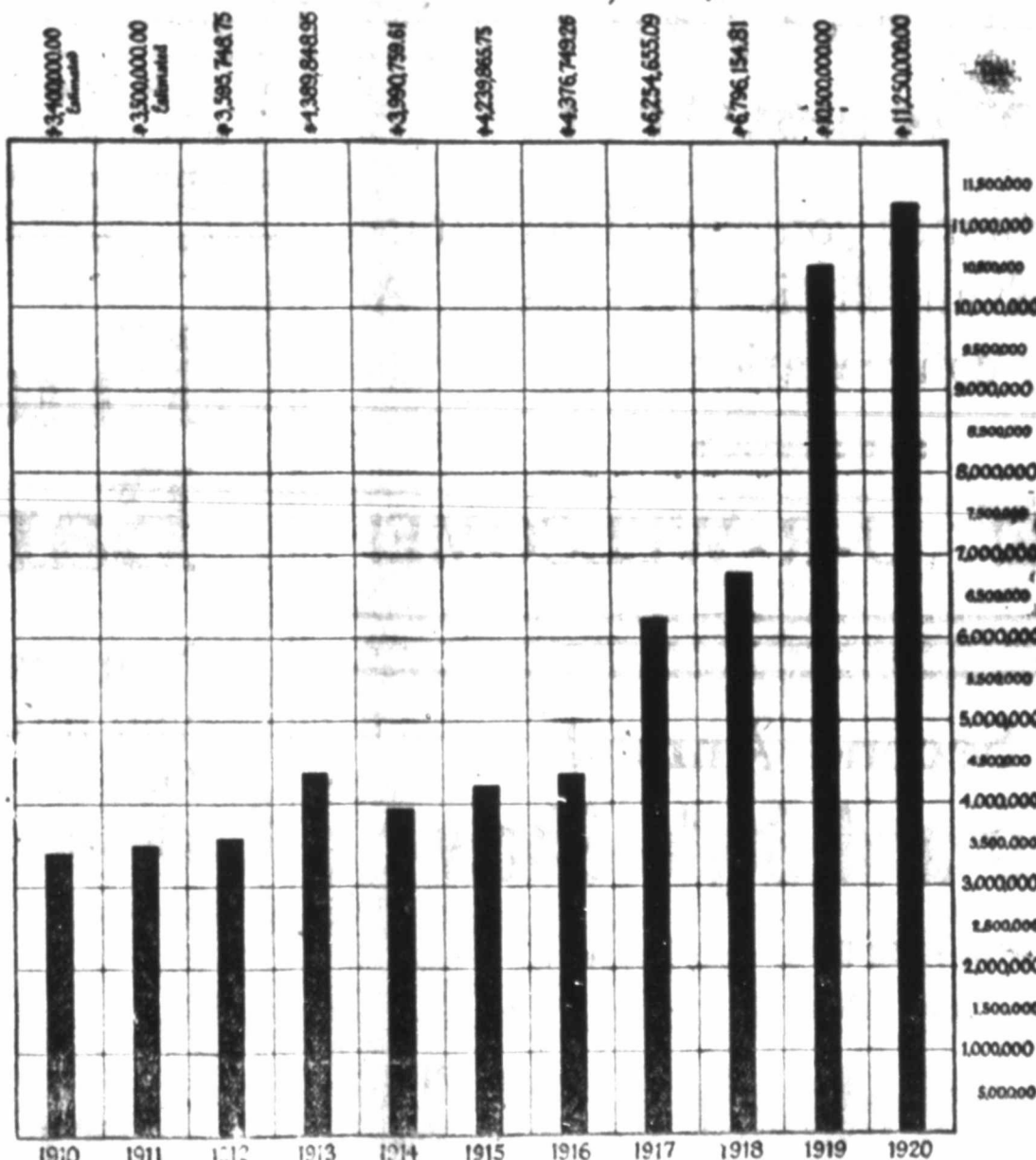

Total levies for all purposes 1910-1920



In this chart we have shown the increase in total levies for all purposes for the ten year period. As shown in Chart No. 1, the increase was 231 per cent. The increase was very gradual from 1910 to 1916, the increase being less than 30 per cent. Beginning with 1917, the levy grew by leaps and bounds until the total reaches eleven and a quarter million dollars which the taxpayers have to put up. If this increase in levies is to continue despite diminishing taxable values, the result will be a constantly rising tax rate, and a heavier tax burden for the property owner.

Where Your Taxes Go

How Uncle Sam Spends Your Money in Conducting Your Business

By EDWARD G. LOWRY

WARS EAT UP THE TAXES

"When I set out to discover for you where the money you pay as federal taxes goes I did not have far to look. It goes for wars, past, present and prospective. Last year a little over 90 per cent of the national income went that way. In the report of the secretary of the treasury submitted to congress in December, 1920, he remarks:

An analysis of government expenditures for the fiscal year 1920, on the basis of daily treasury statements, develops the striking fact that of the net ordinary disbursements of \$4,042,000,000 about 90 per cent consisted of expenditures under the following heads:

Purchase of obligations of foreign governments	\$41,000,000
War department	1,611,000,000
Navy department	730,000,000
Shipping board	681,000,000
Federal control of transportation systems and payments to the railroads under the transportation act, 1917	1,007,000,000
Interest on the public debt	1,500,000,000
Pensions	313,000,000
War-risk insurance	117,000,000
Purchase of federal farm-loan bonds	\$1,000,000
Total	\$5,716,000,000

Substantially all the expenditures entering into this total, and a large share of the expenditures on various minor accounts, represent burdens directly traceable to the war, to past wars or to preparedness for future wars. These figures serve to indicate the direction which sincere efforts to reduce the cost of the government must take.

Then I found Mr. Gilbert, the under-secretary of the treasury, saying:

There has been much idle talk to the effect that the excessive cost of government is due to inefficiency and extravagance in the executive departments. Without doubt there has been waste and inefficiency in the various government departments and establishments, and much can be accomplished, and has already been accomplished, by the introduction of efficient and economic methods of administration and the elimination of duplication and unnecessary work. It might well be possible to save as much as \$2,000,000,000 or \$300,000,000 by careful and scientific reorganization of the government's business.

The figures show that, over 90 per cent of the total annual expenditures of the government are related to war. Out of total expenditures during 1920 of about \$5,716,000,000, about 91% billions represented expenditures directly traceable to the war, to past wars, or to preparedness for future wars. Of this, about \$2,000,000,000 went for the army and navy, over \$500,000,000 for the shipping board, over \$1,000,000,000 for the railroads, another \$1,000,000,000 for interest on the public debt, almost \$500,000,000 for purchase of obligations of foreign governments on account of their war expenditures, and the remainder for pensions, war risk allotments and miscellaneous items related to war. An analysis of the expenditures of the first six months of the fiscal year 1921 gives similar results. The figures also show that the total cost of running what may be termed the civil establishment proper, that is to say, the various government departments, boards and commissions and the legislative establishment, have not much exceeded \$500,000,000 even in the abnormal war years.

I sought details. If more than 90 per cent of the entire disbursements of 1920 went for past and prospective wars, how much had we been spending to keep the world safe for democracy? We are all familiar with the argument that the best way to prevent war is to be prepared for war. I thought I might find out whether that was true. I went back into the records and found that year by year, from 1834 to 1919 inclusive, the treasury department had kept an account of the actual disbursements—not appropriations, mind you, but actual money expended—of the War department, the Navy department and for pensions. When I got all the figures before me I couldn't add them up. In the bureau of internal revenue they loaned me a machine and an operator, and so I know and can tell you that from 1834 to and through 1919 the War Department actually disbursed \$28,002,890,008.66. In the same period, the Navy Department spent \$6,907,369,082.84; and pensioners of past wars got \$5,634,079,864.23.

That is a thundering total of \$39,909,759,041.49 for the army and navy alone, leaving out of account the \$5,634,079,864.23 for pensions. I will let you decide whether any part of the twenty-nine billion dollars spent for preparedness and for war prevented our going to war or found us prepared when we went to war. The three items I have enumerated are only ribs of the skeleton of the cost of war preparation and activity. I have not been able to excavate any other detail figures. But it is known that the war of 1812 cost about \$188,708,880.

The cost of the Mexican war is estimated to have been \$68,605,621. The total cost of the Civil war, taking the period from June 30, 1861, to June 30, 1866, may be figured closely at \$3,500,000,000.

The treasury in the winter of 1920-21 estimated in a report sent to congress through the secretary that the cost of the World war to us to that date had been \$24,100,000,000, exclusive of our loans to the allies and other foreign nations.

So you see the cost of wars is going up, no matter how much money we spend by way of preparation.

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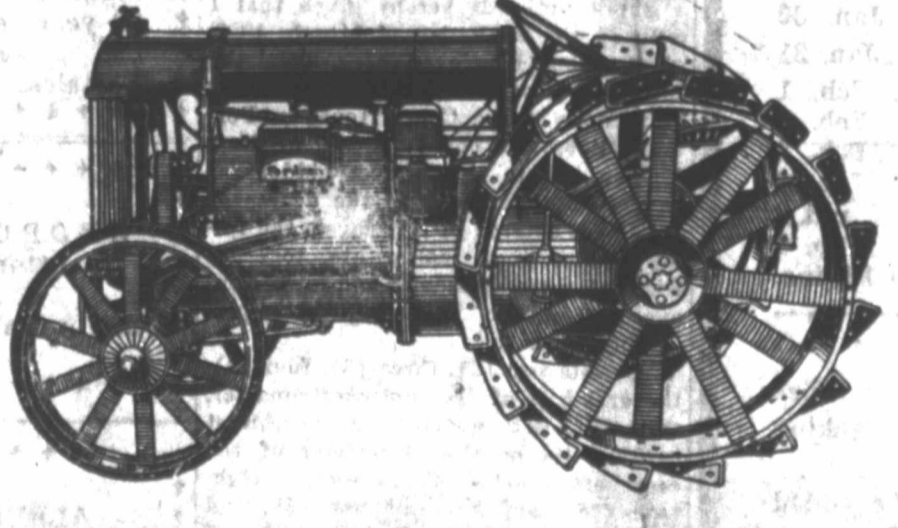
