WAITING

The public is waiting. Long ago the state treasurer was found to have \$350,000 of the state's money in a defunct bank, while he had surety bonds making \$90,000 the legal limit he could place there. The treasurer violated the law. Under the hammering of criticism the treasurer resigned months ago. The resignation was accepted. No successor was appointed. No receiver has been appointed up to this good hour and this man still handles three million dollars of state money. The public is waiting.

In order to reopen this bank it is understood that certificates of time deposit were accepted by the treasurer, with the approval of the governor, for this \$350,000. Nobody knows how long these certificates are to run. The public has not been informed about its business. This administration never does inform the public about anything. "Mum" is the word. Under the law, as we understand it, time deposits of state funds cannot be made. Did the treasurer and the governor consent to a violation of the law in order to make possible the reopening of a private institution? The public is waiting.

If a new treasurer is appointed he must "check out" the present treasurer and take over the cash. These time deposits are not cash. If they must be taken over as cash or the present treasurer cannot be checked out. Is the governor unable to find a man willing under the bond which he must make, to take over these certificates as cash? The public is waiting.

If such a treasurer is found and he does take over these certificates of deposit as cash, what is he to do next January when a treasurer elected by the people and asks for the public's money and refuses to accept these pieces of paper as cash? The public is waiting.

When a state official goes wrong and a whole administration attempts to come to his defense and in doing so does further illegal acts, what is to be the outcome? The public is waiting.

A state auditor admits that he received for his private account, interest on public money illegally withheld him from the treasury. Nothing has been done about it. The public is waiting.

A hundred and twenty-five militiamen are kept away from their employments week after week, to act as guards for the pet

mining interests at Gallup. This is costing the state some five hundred dollars a day. How long is this to continue? The public is waiting.

A man who evaded the law by a technicality in order to sell goods to the asylum board at Las Vegas and who sold the institution a tractor for \$1,400 which cost, when new, \$1,200, is still president of the asylum board. Is there still whiskey which he needs to measure and put into jugs for the state? The public is waiting.

A commissioner of the land office, under the pressure of publicity, turned \$1,000,000 over to the state treasurer which he had held for a long period without interest being paid to the state. How long had he held it? Who received interest on it while he held it? These questions remain unanswered. The public is waiting.

A governor with paralysis of the will sits weakly in his executive chair while these and dozens of other irregularities go on. The governor is marking time until his term expires. He is waiting. The public is waiting.

The public is waiting. It is waiting to hold to accountability the party which brought such a

situation upon a great state. This party seems to have lost all capacity to run a state government in New Mexico. The public sees it. The public is waiting.

November is not far away and the public is waiting.—Albuquerque Journal.

PROGRESS OF RADIO THROUGH THE YEARS

Wireless Research Began Long Ago, But Development Has Been Swift Lately.

Wireless research started many years ago, as far back as 1827. Even the radio telephone is not a recent perfection; rather it is that introduction to the layman of the human voice and music has suddenly popularized something that wireless men had thought a pastime or amusement. Here is the chronological record of wireless:

1827—It was found that the magnetic discharge from a leyden jar would magnetize a steel needle.

1831—Electro-magnetic induction was discovered between two entirely separate circuits by Michael Faraday.

1837—Cooke and Wheatstone of London, England, and Morse of the United States take out first patent for electric telegraph.

1838—K. A. Steinheil of Munich suggested that a system of wireless telegraphy could be established after his discovery of the use of the earth return.

1840—Joseph Henry (U. S. A.) produced the first high-frequency electric oscillations, and stated that the condenser discharge is oscillatory.

1842—Wireless experiments were made by S. F. B. Morse by electric conduction through water across Washington canal and across wide rivers.

1843—A wireless system for transatlantic communication was suggested.

1845—Water was used as a conducting medium in wireless experiments across a wide river.

1849—Intelligible signals were actually sent across a river 4,500 feet wide in India, but the cost was found prohibitive for commercial use.

1867—The electric waves that are now utilized in wireless telegraphy and telephony were predicted in an address before the Royal Society in London, England.

1880—The sending of an electric current through earth was systematically studied by John Trowbridge of Harvard. It was found that signaling might be carried on over large distances between places not connected by wires.

1855—It was found that telephonic speech could be conveyed by induction over a space of quarter mile. This experiment took place in England.

1859—Electric waves were suggested as being particularly suitable for the sending of signals through fogs.

1862—An instrument for the detection of electro-magnetic waves was discovered which was given the name of a "coherer."

1864—A scientist of Berlin signaled through three miles of water.

1866—High frequency waves excite curiosity of Senatore Marconi.

1866—First patent for practical wireless transmitting system is taken out in London by Marconi. Afterward, successful signaling was carried out over distances as great as one and one-quarter miles. Sir William Preece of the British postoffice system interested his cohorts in Marconi's wireless experiments.

1867—Marconi establishes communication between points four miles distant. Balloons were used to suspend antennae.

Marconi demonstrates his wireless system before the king of Italy, communicating with two Italian warships nine miles distant.

The first Marconi station is erected on the Isle of Wight and experiments conducted over a distance of 14 miles.

Near the end of the year the first floating wireless station was successfully operated.

1869—The first field marconigram was sent from the Isle of Wight station.

1890—Reports made on lighthouse accident by radio. First French gunboat is fitted with radio apparatus. In Vienna communication between two balloons is established. New York Herald receives radio report of international yacht races. The British war office introduces Marconi apparatus into the South African battlefields.

1900—German vessel communicates a distance of 80 miles by radio signals.

1901—Radio communication started with five islands in the Hawaiian group. The first British ship is fitted with the wireless telegraph.

1902—Radiograph signals received aboard vessels at sea at 1,500 statute miles. Signals received from a distance of 2,000 miles.

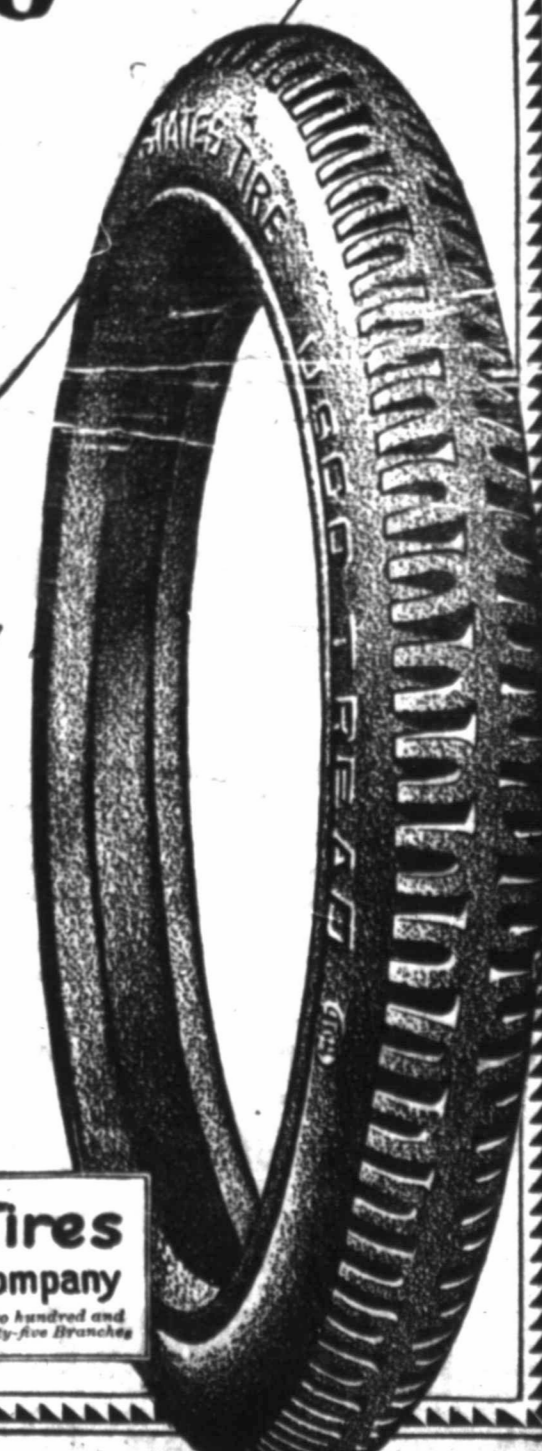

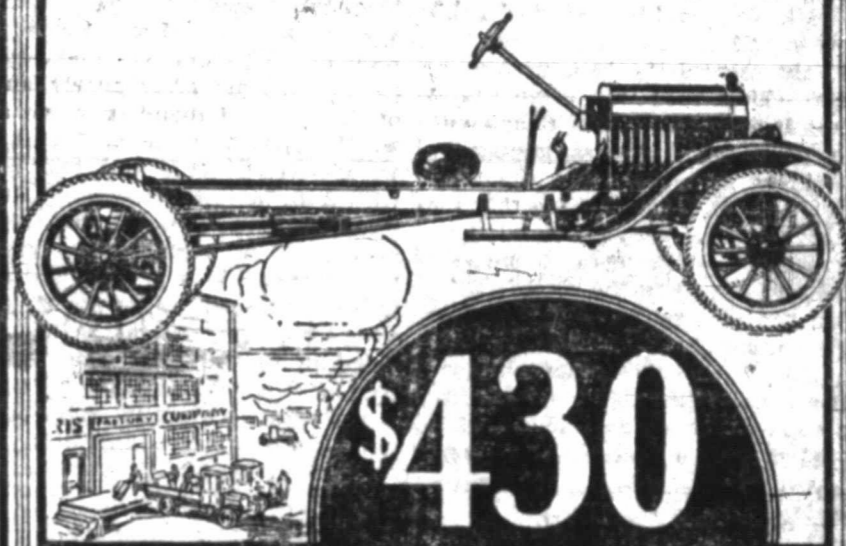
