Everybody was very dignified and polite when the bus started out but by the time it reached Vernon, our first night stop, we were all like one big family.

On down the road we went over dry, dusty roads. Suddenly a surprised cryout from someone—"Look 32 Red sold at that place, Rock Creek station about 10 miles east of Tulia.

As we rode on and on a cloud began to gather in ahead of us and very suddenly we ran into mud, real mud too. The bus began to weave across to one side of the road then suddenly back to the other. We were about 7 miles west of Silverton, Mr. Webb said, "All who are in a hurry can get out and walk." But everyone remained seated.

About 3:30 everybody began to chatter and the bus windows were raised as we were all chilled. We drove into Silverton on dry land but soon after leaving Silverton we ran into mud and funny little drops of water falling from the sky. Someone called them rain but it had to be proven before we would believe it.

Soon we were at the edge of the cypress and went down at 4:25 p. m. It was a muddy let down but at the bottom we were all safe and still traveling.

Just before reaching Turkey everybody gave a sigh of relief. We were on the pavement. Now let it rain, and it really did. The creeks were up, the bar ditches were full and water, water was everywhere and more was falling.

All was quiet and peaceful and Miss Clark said, "Grace Marie, those little bushes out there are nequite tree."

A peculiarly dressed lady was walking down the street in Turkey and Mrs. Eubanks said: "Don't the people down here dress odd? Surely she could put a belt on that dress." Mere remarks and wise cracks and on we went down the highway thru rain and chilling winds. At six o'clock we drove through Estelline with streets covered from curb to curb and about six inches deep with water, rain-water too.

Everybody was happy because that was the first rain we had seen in ages.

Soon we all began to settle and get quiet, why? Well it was getting late and was time for all chickens to be on the roost. We drove into Vernon at 8:40 p. m. That night we stayed at Restwell Cottage and how we did sleep.

Everybody up early Saturday morning ate a bite of breakfast and on our way again at 7 a. m.

Miss Clark did not go on with us but caught the train.

The bunch was not in such good spirits as everybody wanted to do something different and no two agreed. Again we needed Miss Clark to shut us up.

Texas is again on the eve of another primary election, which for all practical purposes will determine who is to hold many State and county offices for the next two years.

Of chief interest of course will be the spirited contest for governor between Tom Hunter and James Alford, both of Wichita Falls.

Hunter, an independent oil man ran third two year ago against Ross Sterling and Mrs. Ferguson and according to his own statement "has never stopped running". He is opposed by the present Attorney General, dynamic and personable Jimmie Alford, who paced the field in the first primary.

Political prognosticators seem to think that at the present time the advantage lies with Alford, though they say that had the election been held a few days after the first primary Hunter would probably have won. Alford has gained tremendously in the last two weeks, it is claimed.

Bill McCraw of Dallas and Walter Woodward of Coleman have waged a bitter run-off contest for the office of Attorney General. Most depoters are picking McCraw to win.

In the race for Railroad Commissioner Lon A. Smith is opposed by John Pundt of Dallas. Leaders in the Panhandle are supporting Smith on the basis of his record, but predict that he will have a hard fight to win renomination.

The voters will have two able jurists to select from in choosing a Supreme Court Justice. The contestants are: Judge John Sharp, now a member of the Supreme Court Commission and Judge Hal Lattimore of Fort Worth now serving on the court of Civil Appeals.

Locally the chief interest is centered in the race for Sheriff with Bill Burnam and Garland Brown squared off against each other for the place.

Frank Cone is seeking renomination as Clerk and is pushed by Glenn Hickman.

Not very many people will venture an opinion as to the outcome of either of these two county races.

In Precinct 4 a hot contest has been waged by L. O. Norman and Andrew Acker for the place as commissioner. They aspire to the place now held by E. C. Burks who was not a candidate this year.

In the first primary Texas voted over a million votes—for the first time in her history. This, despite the fact that the customary hates were absent from the State arena.

In Castro county in the first election 1451 votes were cast. Some think that that total will not be reached Saturday.

The State vote as a whole is expected to be lighter than in July.

### Scattered Showers Fall Over County

Scattered showers, local in nature fell at most points in Castro county Wednesday night and Thursday afternoon of this week.

The total amount of rainfall in Dimmitt amounted to about two-fifths of an inch. At points in the county it was heavier and at other points not so much as a sprinkle was reported.

The weather man was hopeful in predicting further showers over the week-end and it was thought that the drouth would begin to break.

Feed crops will be helped considerably by the showers and further precipitation would relieve parching crops and ranges.

Tarwater has been campaigning vigorously in the district for the three weeks since the first primary and will do so until election day. With more than 16,000 votes cast July 28, Tarwater lacked approximately 75 of gaining a majority over both Johnston and W. W. Hick Halcomb, Dimmitt editor.

## Two Precincts Vote On Beer September 1st

Elections to determine whether the sale of 3.2 beer shall be legal in Precincts Nos. 1 and 4, will be held Saturday, September 1, it has been announced.

### LON SMITH'S CANDIDACY ENDORSED

The Pampa Daily News unhesitatingly endorses the candidacy of Lon A. Smith for re-election to the Texas Railroad Commission. Mr. Smith's integrity and experience have certainly qualified him for the office he holds. If there is any good reason for retiring him in one of the most crucial periods in the history of the industries regulated by the commission, it has not appeared in the current campaign. Indeed, the many phases of the Commission's jurisdiction are so important right now that some extraordinary circumstance would be necessary to justify removal of Mr. Smith.

The oil business, however important is only one phase of the commission's activities. Mr. Smith's opponent is seeking to make the oil industry the only campaign issue. While calling attention to the name of the Railroad Commission and citing its duties to transportation and utility regulation, Commissioner Smith seems willing enough to talk about oil.

It is charged—and Smith's opponent has not yet successfully denied—that Smith is being bitterly opposed by the "hot oil" interests of East Texas, which if given their way would wreck the industry and steal the birthright of Texas people. The connections of John Pundt are not such as to arouse confidence in his ability and his platform.

A vote for Lon Smith is a safe vote at a time when safety is the keynote of Texas oil regulation. A vote for his opponent is a shot in the dark and a possible surrender to the forces which have fought regulations with every resource.—Pampa Daily News.
