Commercial Club Meeting

In Session Wednesday Club Discusses Finances, Dallas Fair Exnibit, Etc.

The Commercial Club met last last Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock the Monday meeting having been postponed to that date, to discuss the financial condition of the club and to get ready for a creditable showing at the Dallas Fair with an exhibit.

The financial support of any commercial Club anywhere is the one most important problem and such is the problem at Lockney. When all collections are made and debts paid Lockney Commercial Club will be just a little ahead of the world, not counting the expense soon to be incurred by sending a man to the Fair with an exhibit. This means more money immediately and two members, W. C. Nichols and J. R. Vandergeiff, were appointed to raise the necessary amount by Thursday afternoon.

J. T. Livesay and Homer Steen were appointed a committee to secure new members to and October. aid in the work.

The iffiportant matter of what man should be sent to Dallas with the exhibit was taken up but postponed till Thursday (this) afternoon, when a meeting is called to settle this question.
