

Pep School propels grad to new beginning, career

Graduation ceremonies were held Wednesday morning at Pep High School for one student, Ada Bundick, age 21.

Students at the alternative high school are not classified as freshmen, sophomores, juniors or seniors. They simply work to acquire the required 21 credits to graduate.

Director Fredda Schooler told the summer school students gathered for the graduation ceremony, "We don't care how you're classified. We just want to know how many credits you lack graduating."

Also witnessing the graduation of Ada Bundick was her daughter, Kaitlyn; her father, Martin Bundick; her grandmother, Leota Bundick; a former teacher, Mrs. Hodge,

who spoke at the graduation; and Superintendent of Sundown Independent Schools Mike Motherall.

Ada had completed a required program for a nursing preparatory student the night before at precisely 7 p.m., and she will begin nursing school at Killgore Junior College on Monday.

Pep School is a revitalized educational center created three years ago from a rural school which had been closed many years.

"For 18 years, it sat empty. The roof leaked, the floors had buckled," said Muleshoe Superintendent Bill Moore, who was there for the graduation. Now, it is equipped with

Muleshoe Church of Christ will host blood drive July 13

United Blood Service will conduct a blood drive in Muleshoe from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., Thursday, July 13, at the Church of Christ at 2201 W. American Blvd.

Many of you might by won-

dering, who needs blood or blood donors? "People do!" says Pat Kenamer of United Blood Services, Lubbock, TX.

"As many as 90 percent of all people who live to age 72 will need blood or blood prod-

ucts during their lives," Kenamer said.

Blood is needed for many major surgeries, for patients being treated for leukemia or other cancers, or for a mother experiencing a difficult deliv-

ery. While most of us will receive blood, only a few donate it. Approximately three percent of this area's population donates blood. According to Kenamer, more people would

donate if only they knew the importance of blood.

Doctors use blood only for one reason: to sustain life. Without blood, the life of the patient would be endangered.

H.E.A.T. program installed to eliminate vehicle thefts

The Muleshoe Police Department is currently working with the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) on a program known as H.E.A.T. (The initials stand for Help End Auto Theft.)

Police Chief Julian Dominguez said the H.E.A.T. program should help local law enforcement agencies reduce the number of vehicles that are stolen and not recovered each year.

For vehicle owners, the program consists of putting a decal, or sticker, on the vehicle.

According to the DPS, most vehicles that are stolen are taken between the hours of 1 and 5 a.m.

The H.E.A.T. program is designed to let local law en-

forcement agencies stop a vehicle between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m. to make sure the person in the vehicle has not stolen it.

H.E.A.T. also allows the agency to determine if the person driving the vehicle has the owner's permission to drive it.

"With this program, we hope to eliminate the number of vehicles that are stolen each year," Dominguez said.

Dominguez listed what a person will need to sign up for the program:

- The title of the car or a copy of the title.
- A driver's license or some type of photo identification.
- Proof of insurance or vehicle registration.

There will be a two dollar

fee for the decal. The two dollars will go into a fund to order more decals.

"After all the regulation and paper work is out of the way, the officer who is helping you will then put the stickers on your window for you," Dominguez said.

Meals on Wheels seeks help of local volunteers

Muleshoe's Meals on Wheels is a program designed to help the elderly maintain maximum independence, dignity and good health in their own homes by assisting them with good nutrition.

When the program was first implemented, there was immense interest in both funding and volunteer work. Unfortunately, while the needs for the program have only grown, public interest has declined.

Meals are prepared and purchased from Muleshoe Area Medical Center at \$4 a meal. The meals are delivered entirely by volunteers. At present three routes are being operated, implementing three drivers per day. An average of 640 meals were served monthly during the last year. Last month alone

775 home deliveries were made.

Ann Oyler, along with Doris Wedel, coordinates all volunteer effort. Volunteers that are considered full time are asked to only give one hour a week, from 11:30 to 12:30. Two full time drivers are desperately needed who could work that hour a week.

Several substitutes are also needed who could work when a regular volunteer plans to be out of town or has an emergency to arise. Man and wife teams seem to work out very well, and it is a rewarding experience.

Oyler also recommends grandparents taking their young grandchildren along to

With record sales of well over 60 million internationally, Hank's career has impacted on six decades (40's to the 90's). New generations of his fans are eagerly snapping up recently released anthologies of Hank's music packaged by Capitol and Curb records.

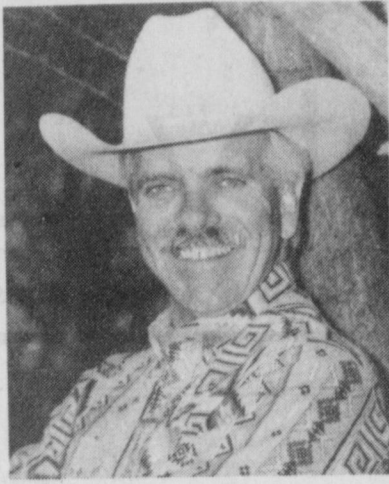
Among the hits are: "The Wild Side of Life," "Humpty Dumpty Heart," "Oklahoma Hills," and "Six Pack to Go."

Bob Wills' Texas Playboys are mixture of the performers who helped Wills create the sound that set the world on fire, as well as some talented musicians dedicated to keeping the tradition of western swing music alive.

Among the members is Leon Rausch, who was hired by Wills as lead vocalist in the heyday of the Texas Playboy Band. Rausch made his own way after Wills became ill in the late 60's and early 70's and continues to warm crowds with his own special style. The Jose Brothers are a duo comprised of cowboy comic and actor Clay Lindley and accomplished musician, singer and songwriter Gil Prather. The Jose Brothers have

brought their special blend of humor, cowboy poetry and music to numerous western states.

Both Lindley and Prather are respected as top professionals in folklore, comedy and music and perform at most of the cowboy poetry gatherings and western song fests. Their art is clean, good-humored entertainment suitable and enjoyable for the entire family.

Bubba Cox and Lariat will rope the hearts of the dance crowd with a mix of old standards, western swing and progressive country. Tie in some rock and roll with country soul and the entertainment meter goes through the roof.

They are also highly-re-

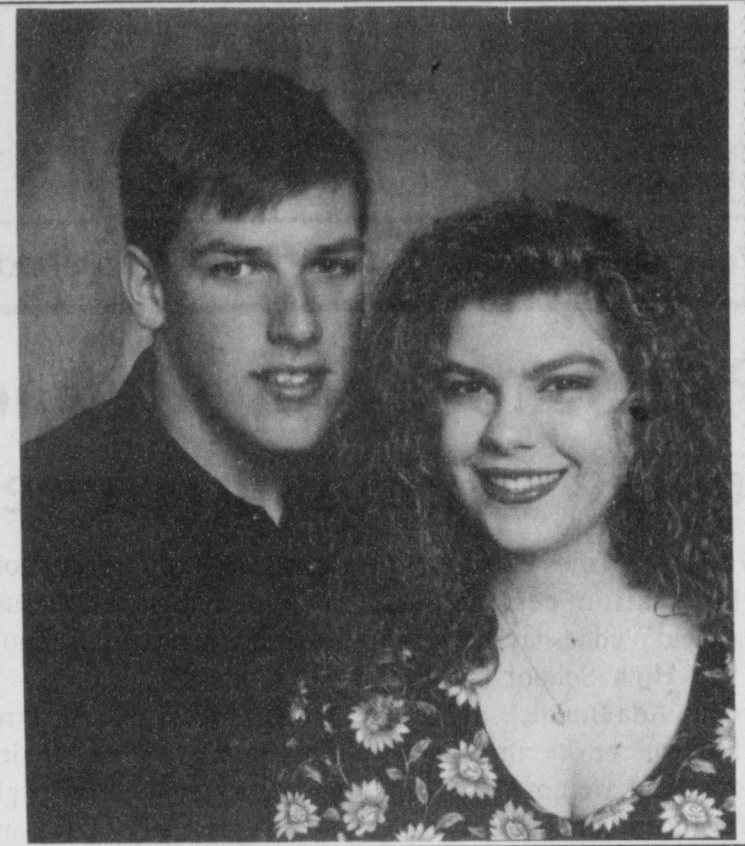

Internet and a child care center for the infants and toddlers of at-risk students in the area.

Pep has a building trades class which does actual repairs and construction at the site, as well as a home economics class that prepares meals for the students and their children.

Also offered are courses in auto mechanics, health occupations, business education, English, speech, advanced reading, creative writing, science, math and social studies.

At least until the gym has been restored, the school has received a waiver for physical education classes.

There are plans to connect the two buildings with administrative offices and a passageway for use in bad weather.

Presently, there are about 100 summer school students on a half-day schedule. Normally, there are about 125 students at the school, on individual education programs to complete the requirements at their own speed.

Students arrive at Pep by bus from their original schools and return to catch buses home.

Moore said the men of the Pep community have pitched in to help with the repairs and construction and some of the women have volunteered to rock the babies.

The idea began as a paper Schooler was writing on how to start an alternative high school, Moore said. She dis-

 According to the ads, American consumers can use a credit card to order medications by a toll-free phone call, often at greatly reduced prices and apparently without a doctor's prescription.

cussed the possibilities with area schools and the dream become a reality.

Ada's father said he appreciates the opportunity the school districts have given students who have become disadvantaged to complete their educations.

Schools participating in the alternative school are Morton, Muleshoe, Sundown, Whiteface, Sudan, Halfway, Amherst, Anton and Three Way.

The districts couldn't pro-

vide alternative schools on an individual basis, but they can do it by cooperating. The districts meet periodically to determine "what's going to be best for the program, and equitable," Moore said.

Thirty students who had previously dropped out have finished their educations at Pep.

"It is not a discipline center or a boot camp," Moore said. "Students are not expelled from somewhere else. No one has to take an expelled student."

But a student who is a grade level or two behind may decide to apply at Pep, Moore said. "Going to school at Pep is a privilege — which may be revoked for behavior."

Students who graduate from Pep may also participate in the graduation ceremonies of their home town schools.

During the past three years, 94 students have completed the program, earning either high school diplomas or G.E.D. certificates.

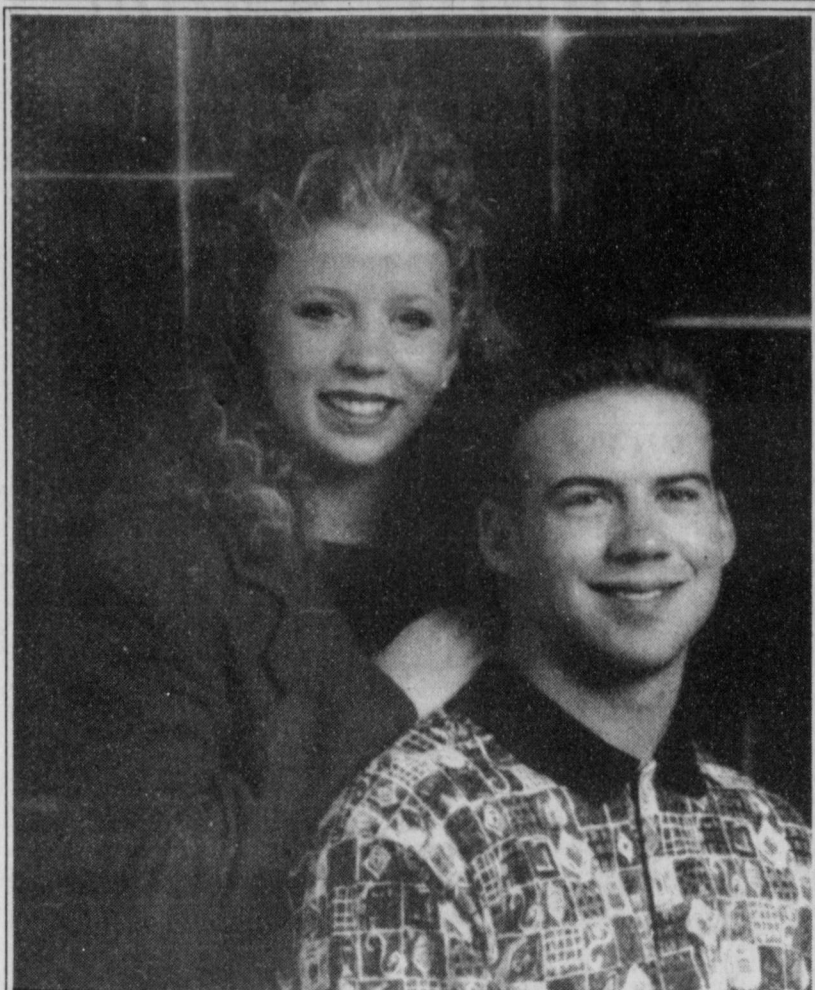

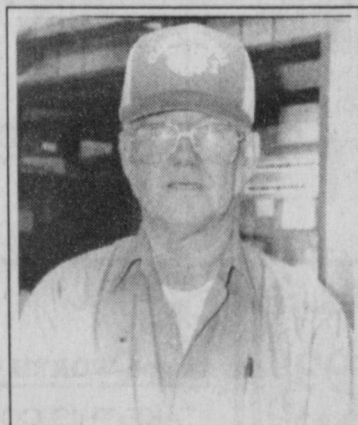

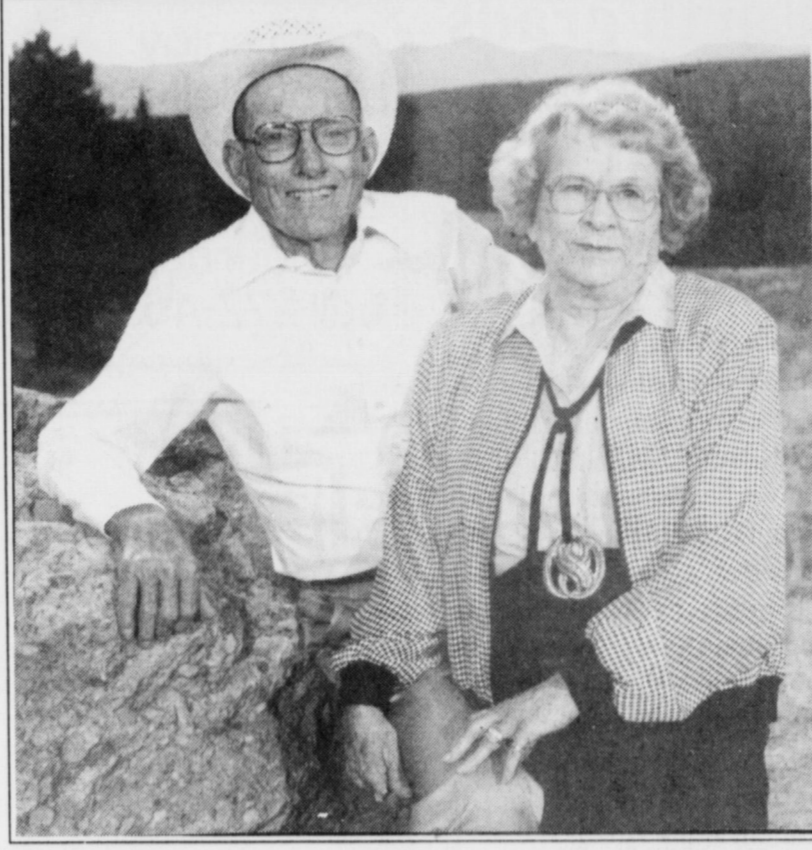

time. General Patton liberated the camp and Raleigh returned to his parents home in Snyder, TX.

During the war, Lauranette worked at Goodfellow Air Base in San Angelo, TX and then at Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis, NM. She learned her sweetheart was missing in action during this time but, always the optimist, Lauranette bought her wedding dress before knowing Raleigh was safe.

After being reunited in Snyder, at the Mason home, they were married on June 24, 1945, in Nolan, at the home of

Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Porter. They moved to the ranching community of Fluvanna, TX, where they lived until 1952, when they moved to Muleshoe.

They have two daughters, Beckye Conklin of Muleshoe and Sheryl Westmoreland of Glen Heights, TX, and four grandchildren.

The Masons were the initial owners and operators of the Merle Norman Cosmetic business for 20 years. They now reside in the West Camp community where they are engaged in farming.

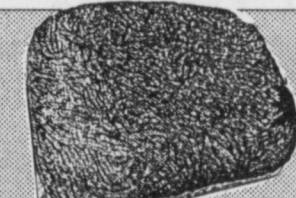

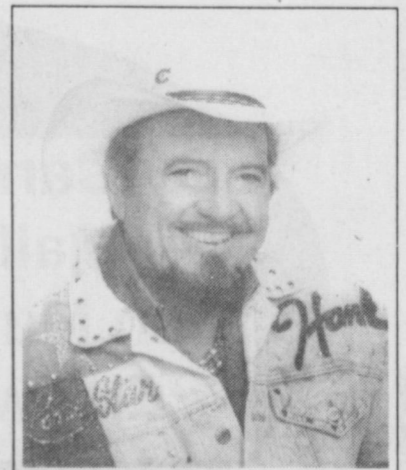

can be accessed by any law enforcement agency in the state of Texas.

This way, if the car is stolen and not stopped here but is stopped anywhere in Texas, the law enforcement officer who stops the vehicle can access the information and make sure the person(s) in the vehicle have permission to drive it.

What about if the person driving the vehicle tries to cross the border?

A second decal states that if a law enforcement agency sees your vehicle and it has this decal, he can stop the vehicle before it crosses the border, Dominguez explained.

This decal lets law enforcement agencies stop the vehicle at the border 24 hours a day.

"So, help end auto theft and get with the program,"

Dominguez says. "If you need more information, contact your local law enforcement agency and ask them about the H.E.A.T. program. It will be worth it."

Officer Benny Parker, who will be the officer in charge of the program in Mulshoe, said that vehicle owners could begin purchasing the decals Monday.

Parker said he thinks the H.E.A.T. program will be a great asset to the community in cutting down on car thefts.

Dominguez added, "Police officers work off of probable cause."

"If you are asleep at one o'clock in the morning when you car is stolen, you can't report it. So we would have no probable cause to stop the vehicle unless it had a H.E.A.T. sticker on it," he said.

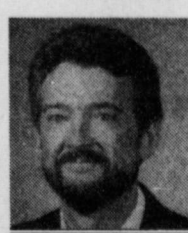

Minding Your Business

The price of a good newspaper is usually around a dollar. The value of a good idea may be thousands or even millions of dollars.

Part of our job as newspaper columnists is to increase the value of your newspaper. We do this by struggling to come up with useful information and good ideas packaged in such a manner to make them interesting reading.

Therefore, I offer you a very special value in today's column: 10 good ideas. Their exact value will depend on how you use them, but any of them could easily pay for a lifetime supply of newspapers.

You can measure the quality of your customer service by how often you have to say you're sorry. This assumes that you do apologize when you make mistakes or fail to meet your customer's expectations. Good service means never having to apologize. Anytime you have to say, "I'm sorry," note the reason. You should try to eliminate the cause of apologies.

Become a problem solver. There are three kinds of people in business: Those who cause problems and know it, those who cause problems and don't know it and those who are more concerned with solving problems than determining who caused them. You will increase your value to others by becoming a problem solver. Focus your energy and efforts on finding answers and solutions, not an assigning blame.

Assume that you have no job security. Even if you're self-employed, your customers can fire you by taking their business elsewhere. Life is not a probationary period where you can mess up continually. Long-term security is a series of short-term successes.

Be thankful for your success and happiness. Despite

what you may see on television or at the movies, most of life's problems cannot be solved in 30 minutes. All stories do not have happy endings.

In real life people lose jobs, get sick, lose loved ones and have big problems. If life is going well for you, rejoice and be grateful. Being thankful can lower your stress level and help you live a healthier, happier life.

Work toward simplicity. Divide complex projects into smaller, less difficult tasks. Write short sentences and paragraphs. Avoid using voluminous, polysyllabic, metaphorical discourse when small, common words will convey the same meaning.

Be courteous. I often observe rude, ungrateful people as I travel. And yet, I've never met a successful manager or business owner who had the respect of both employees and customers who wasn't courteous. Courtesy is a mark of class, and an important factor in building a profitable business

or career.

Read junk mail only when you're looking for direct marketing ideas. Once in a while you may find a good idea you can use or adapt to your marketing efforts. Remember that most junk mail is junk, so filter ideas carefully.

Learn to do more with less. Many people use the lack of resources as an excuse for not accomplishing anything. Find ways when there are no ways. You increase your value to others when you develop a reputation of getting the job done anyway. If you work for yourself, doing more with less will help you make more money and can keep you profitable when others are failing.

Wherever you go, whatever you do, try to look your best. Your appearance is important. Sloppiness may cost you dearly in both credibility and money. It is always better to overdress than to appear disheveled.
