Resolution by Wortham Williams Causes Great Sensation.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 27.-Somewhat of a stir was created in the House this afternoon when a resolution was introduced by Representatives Wortham and Williams, requesting the land commissioner to make an investigation of the charge that the Capitol Syndicate, which built the State House received 1,000 000 acres more of land than its contract with the state called for. The contract was for 1,000,000 acres and the resolution declares that the Capitol Syndicate has already sold 3,000,-000 acres and still has 1,000,000 acres left. The resolution was adopted.






