Mrs. Stevenson Wins First.

Mrs. J. B. Stevenson, of Lockney, has been announced as first prize winner in the contest held by Farm and Ranch for papers embodying ideas for the successful raising of chickens.

Mrs. Stevenson says she began raising chickens on a 40c investment. Her mother gave herself and sisters thirteen Buff Cochin hens, and Mrs. Stevenson payed 40c for an old "bumble-footed" Buff Cochin rooster. From these fourteen chickens sixty-fine pullets were grown, besides what chickens the family ate and sold.

"From these sixty hens," Mrs. Stevenson says, "we raised 320 pullets, besides selling eggs and young chickens as friers at the stores to pay grocery bills.

"Then we had a drouth: I had no feed. We sold our entire flock of chickens at 50 cents each and bought seven fullblooded Rhode Island Red chickens, six pullets and one rooster, for seven dollars. From these seven chickens I raised 90 pullets by hand, besides what friers we used, and sold \$20 worth at the store.

"With these 60 pullets and nine roosters and the aid of an incubator I raised 500 fine chickens. My incubator and brooder cost me \$10. It is supposed to hold 140 eggs, though I often place 160 eggs in it, and hatch every fertile egg.

"Last year I sold all my pullets but 130 and the young roosters that I did not use at 50 cents each. This year the rats ate 400 chickens for me, but I sold \$100 worth of eggs and raised 100 chickens, besides what I gave away, and I gave away as many as I used and sold.

"The coming year I will run egg incubators.

The Overland was a complete wreck, but its occupants of three or four men escaped uninjured.

This was the worst auto wreck that has happened in this section for a long time, and was a miracle that those in the cars were not seriously injured.

The Man Who Farms Hogs

There is more than one way to market milo maize and kaffir successfully, and one of the best of these ways is to feed them to

J. F. Connor, who lives northeast of Floydada, is one farmer who has found this out to the material benefit of his pocket book. He recently sold thirtysome-odd head of 7-month old hogs that weighed out 215 lbs., he having let them run in the lots and feed on the waste until the last sixty-five days, making them weigh out as above and bring a price of about \$15 apiece. He figures his cost at \$6 per head, a profit of \$9 net in seven months, or a total of \$300. He says that while the price of maize and kaffir remains at 60 to 70 cents a man can clear more money on hogs than on the feed on the market, and he is iminently correct.

This instance is also another proof of the value of maize and kaffir corn as feeders. In all probability very few corn raisers ever made such a remarkable showing with hogs in a seven months' period of time. - Floyd County Hesperian.

CITIZENS APPROVE ASSESSMENT PLAN

Monster Mass Meeting Votes to Raise Bonus for Q., A. & P. by Subscription Based on Wealth.

More than 500 citizens met at the Schick Opera House Monday afternoon to take action for the CO raising of a bonus of \$150,000 for the Q. A. & P. Railway. Judge J. E. Lancaster, at the request of the railroad committee called the meeting to order. B. O. Brown was secretary.

O. M. Unger stated the situation and told what the business men's meeting Thursday night proposed. He read two letters from Judge Decker, Gen. Attorney for the Q. A. & P. Railway, in which Judge Decker stated that the road would have to bear some twenty miles north in order to reach Plainview. Judge Decker's second letter was written January 15, and suggested that Plainview offer \$100,000, terminal facilities and right-of-way through the county.

Dr. J. C. Anderson reported for the special committee appointed to arrive at an equal division of the proposed assessment as between real estate, merchandise and personal property. This committee recommended that real estate be assessed 10 per cent and all other propertymerchandise, bonds and cashbe assessed 2 1-2 per cent both based on the 1912 rendition for taxes-Hale County Herald.

That Railroad Talk.

The air is full of railroad talk. -the Quanah, Acme & Pacific is the road in the public eye at present. Attorney D. E. Decker has paid the Plainview people a visit and as a result those citizens are attempting to raise a \$100,000 bonus, besides rightof-way across their county and city. 

SILO SAVES

THE FEED

J. O. Gillian, of Quanah, Gives His Experience to a Kansas City Newspaper.

"When the silo is brought into use in our country, then we will be in a position where we can tide over storms in winter, and feed shortage, and at the same time by keeping one or two of these silos full all summer, a drouth will not disturb us."

J. O. Gilliam of Quanah, Texas, made the above statement in discussing the cattle situation in that part of the state. Mr. Gillian owns a ranch of 10,000 acres from which he brought a few days ago to these yards a shipment of six carloads of bulls. He is an old rancher, who has been taking note of the change of recent years.

Already several silos have been put up in my neighborhood," Mr. Gilliam continued. "This winter a great many cattle are being fed on kaffir corn, stalk and all, which in most cases is cut up just as it would be put up in the silo. It makes a very good feed but nothing compared Cith kaffir corn cut that way and erted into silage. We can fter ac these forage crops, and shmewith the silo, we can handle cartle at a very small expense. A section of land at present will not carry more than forty or fifty cattle at the most. Sometimes that number would be too many. But by using about 150 acres for raising feed, and putting it into silos, three times as many cattle can be cared for on every section. By figuring on that basis one can at once see what a vast increase there would be in cattle. Thousands where there are hundreds now. And this is practical and can be done.
