Agriculture Teacher Elected By Board Last Week

Announcement is made by the School Board that R. K. McCoy of Meadow, Texas, has been elected to teach vocational agriculture in the Lockney schools for the coming year. This will be the first year since 1930 that vocational agriculture has been included in the high school curriculum. Only first year classes will be available this term.

The School Board has set September 5, as the date for the opening of the 1938-39 school year. About thirty high school students have been transferred to Lockney from South Plain, and a large number from other communities.

On Saturday morning, August 13, at 9:30 in the county court room, there will be a meeting of officers and program committees from all community organizations. Mrs. Carrick Snodgrass of the Harmony Community will give "Recreation for Community Meetings."

The county home demonstration council is meeting Saturday in order that they may hear Miss Swift's discussion of preliminary procedure for home demonstration clubs. The council meeting is scheduled for 2 o'clock in the county court room. Visitors are invited to attend.

All of those who are interested in community organization are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to secure some good material for programs and attend one of these meetings.

Tree Borers Destroying Our Black Locust Trees

The locust borer has been found in practically all black locust trees in Lockney. Unless preventative measures are taken immediately the trees will be so weakened that they will be destroyed and of no value for shade or ornamental purposes.

Indications are that healthy vigorous trees are not likely to be infected as the borers prefer dead wood and can best develop through to the adult stage in deadwood.

Preventative measure, include: In spring when leaves begin to develop, spray trees with solution made up as follows: make stock solution by dissolving 1 pound added one gallon of orthochlor laundry soap in one gallon of boiling water (soft) to which is lysobuzive. For spray use 1 part to 6 parts of soft water (1 teaspoon washing soda to 1 gallon to soften hard water).

It may also be advantageous to spray infested areas with a mixture obtained by adding 2 quarts of cottonseed oil to 1 quart of parodichlorobenzene.

In summer when borers are present use oil can to squirt 2 tea spoons of carbon disulphid into the holes and plug the hole with grafting wax or putty.

Always keep dead wood cleared out and burned.

FINAL DATE FOR CROP INSURANCE IS SET

The final date for accepting crop insurance applications in Floyd County is August 31. Wheat producers who are interested in this form of insurance should take steps in securing their rates on individual farms from the county Agricultural Agent's office, as each farm figures its own rate it is necessary that producers call in person so that the premium rate and amount of insurance can be figured accurately for their 1939 wheat coverage. A large number of producers have taken advantage of this form of insurance and so, rush on the last date it is hoped that producers will come in and make applications as soon as possible.

12 CENT COTTON LOAN IS SOUGHT BY SOUTH TEX

South Texas residents, and cotton growers, at a meeting last Saturday at San Antonio framed a demand for a full 75 per cent federal commodity loan on cotton, amounting to about 12 cents a pound.

They urged the loan as a necessary step to prevent curtailment of farmer's buying power by a government-limited crop. Ray Leeman, executive vice president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, said his organization would present the matter to federal officials, state and regional chambers of commerce in an effort to secure favorable reaction.

All producer, who have certain knowledge that they have over-planted their cotton allotment are requested to check their measurements at once to avoid being penalized by the cotton marketing quotas, the acreage in excess of the allotment would be destroyed immediately.

Although supervisors are now in the field checking all acreage in the county, it is a definite fact that these maps will not be in the county office for compliance until after it may be too late to destroy cotton. Producers are reminded that when they have over-planted, they will be subject to a tax and will not be eligible to receive the cotton price adjustment payment.

It is going to be an impossibility for the county office to check compliance in time and notify producers of their cotton acreage until after cotton harvest time, so that no injustice can be done to producers who are unable to measure their cotton acreage up all over the allotment in time to receive the cotton price adjustment payment for 1937 to be taxed.

DOMESTIC ALLOTMENT

The Agricultural Administration is sending its top ranking officials to Washington to make against the domestic farm plan, advocate substitute for the control law.

They are, I. V. Duggan, assistant.

Duggan will speak at Rock, Ark., and Raleigh, Albany, Ala., Friday. Both intend to make other speeches also, including talks in Texas and Oklahoma before returning to Washington.

Officials said Secretary Wallace, who has expressed opposition to the domestic allotment plan, also was considering making a speech against it.

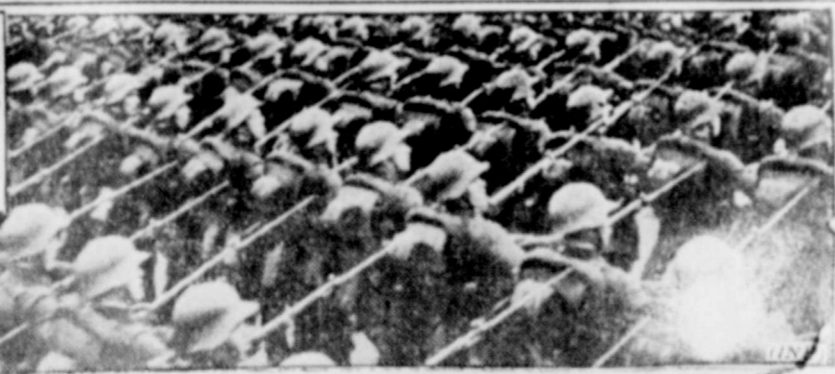
Officials said the AAA strategy was designed to counteract campaign being waged in the cotton and wheat belts for the domestic allotment scheme.

The domestic allotment proposal would permit unlimited crop production, guaranteeing growers the cost of production, plus a margin of profit, on that part of the crop consumed in this country. The remainder would be sold at world prices.

The plan either would require buyers to pay government fixed prices on each grower's share of the domestically-used part of the crop, or authorize the Agriculture department to pay growers subsidies sufficiently large to give them cost of production and a profit.

The present law is designed to regulate production, by means of acreage allotments, rewards for complying growers and penalties for non-compliers, so as to keep supplies in line with domestic needs and exports. It authorizes marketing quotas to keep excess supplies off markets.

Remember about a year ago when we returned from a trip to Washington that we told you President Roosevelt would more than make a try for a third term. This program was not carried out. It still holds good, as we see in the papers quite a bit of talk about a third term. This perhaps is used more or less to whip congress, in line than any thing else. However, they are afraid he might take another lease on the White House, and from all indications he could do it. So he really has the boys sweating blood. REPORTS FROM U. OF TEXAS

Shipment of livestock to Fort Worth and interstate points, for June totaled 7,473 cars, compared with 8,184 cars during the like month last year, a decline of 9 per cent, according to the Texas Bureau of Business Research. Cattle shipments, 4,609 cars, declined 20 per cent; calves, 811 cars, increased 17 per cent; hogs, 490 cars, increased 28 per cent. During the first six months of the year shipments aggregated 40,645 cars, a decrease of 13 per cent from the corresponding period

POULTRY

Shipments of poultry from Texas to out of State points during June totaled 51 cars, compared with 63 cars during the corresponding month last year, a decline of 19 per cent, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported. Egg shipments totaled 44 cars, compared with 43 cars during June last year. Five cars of eggs were shipped into Texas during June all of which came from Kansas last year in June. 11 cars were brought in, 9 from Kansas and 2 from Nebraska.

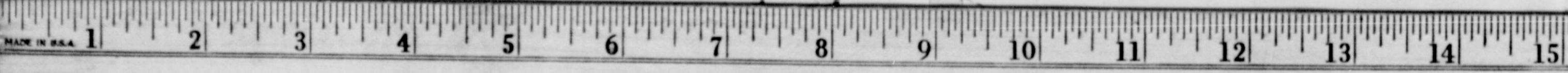

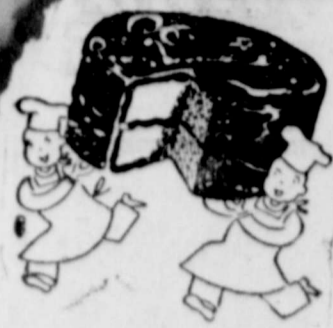

Good Things To Eat



"LEARN AS YOU MUNCH" IS SLOGAN FOR NEW GAME IN THE KITCHEN

Finding out little known facts and revealing them via the cartoon-column is common practice. "Believe it or not," "strange as it seems," there are many "things you never knew 'til now" "oddities" and "curiosities" also about food!

The recipes in today's column will help your meal taste better. Not guaranteed to do that are the little-known facts. But you learn as you munch, painlessly, and 'hat's to the good. Ladies, your lesson for today:

Why is it "Brown Betty"? Named for a Miss Betty Brown of English extraction, some claim good pudding. Not so, say

others. But make it of "musa sapientum" (bananas, "fruit of the wise man") and rha. barbaros (the Volga river, and barbaric!) (that's rhubarb, named for Rha, and make it into a "putog" (original old Irish, whence we get "puttying") and it will please you. This way: 6 --

Banana Rhubarb Betty 2 medium-sized all yellow bananas 3 tbsps. melted butter 1-2 lb. young rhubarb (1 1-2 cups cut) 1-4 teasp. salt 1 1-2 tbsps. grated orange rind (1 medium orange) 1-2 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1 1-2 cups soft bread crumbs 2 tbsps. of hot water Peel bananas, cut into 1-2 inch slices and combine with 1 table spoon of the melted butter. Leave red skin on rhubarb and cut in 1 inch pieces. Add with salt to banana mixture. Mix together orange rind and brown sugar. Brown bread crumbs in 1 table spoon of melted butter. Place a layer of the crumbs in well-but-tered 1 1-2 quart casserole, then some of the sugar mixture. Repeat. Finish with bread crumbs and top with sugar mixture. Pour water and the remaining table spoon of melted butter over top. Cover and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 15 minutes, then remove cover and bake 15 minutes longer or until rhubarb is tender. Top each serving with Frozen Cream, hard sauce or ice cream. Six servings.

FROZEN CREAM: Whip 1 cup whipping cream. Add 1-2 cup powdered sugar and 1 teas

Orange-Honey Cup Drain juice from one No. 2 can Florida orange-grapefruit sections Put into dessert glasses and drizzle 1 tablespoon honey over each -ving. Chill thoroughly.

Castanhas To You! Those rich and meaty nuts, called Brazil actually do come from Brazil. But down there they call them "Castanha da Para" for the port from which they sail to this country. Date, are so-named from "dactyl" meaning finger.

Brazilian Fruit Candy 1 pkg. pasteurized dates 1-4 lb. Brazil nuts 1-4 lb figs Crushed Brazil nuts 1-4 lb. apricots 1 tbsps. orange juice 1 teasp. orange rind Run dates, Brazil nuts, figs and apricots through meat grinder. Knead orange juice and rind into mixture. Roll with a rolling pin into a square sheet a quarter inch thick. Cut into squares and dip into grated Brazil nuts.

TEXAS WHEAT ALLOTMENT.

The Texas wheat allotment for 1939 is 3,684,863 acres according to word received from Washington by the state AAA office at Texas A. & M. College. The 1939 wheat acreage allotments are made at this time to give winter wheat farmers the information well before planting time E. N. Holmgreen, administrative office, said.

The national allotment of 55 million acre, made under the terms of the new farm act, compares with an acreage seeded for 1938 of nearly 80 million acres and a 1928-32 average of more than 67 million acres.

The state allotment of 3,684,863 acres for 1939 compares with a 1938 planted acreage of 5,315,000. The allotment for 1939 is based on a figure of 74.36 per cent, uniform for all states, of the 1928-37 average, with allowances made for trends. What grower, who comply

with their 1939 allotments will be qualified for advantage, which other phases of the farm program offer. Holmgreen pointed out such as price adjustment payments, this year 1939 conservation payments, 1939 wheat loans if a loan program is in effect next year and a renewal of crop insurance program policies next year.

If marketing quotas are in effect in 1939, such quotas will be a uniform percentage of these acreage allotments multiplied by the normal yield for the farm. Such quotas will be in effect if supplies exceed normal domestic consumption and exports of wheat growers.

Allotments were made to 39 states, with Texas the fourth largest wheat state on the basis of the

wheat state on the basis of the allotments Kansas received the largest allotment, 11,067,349 acres, North Dakota 8,300,488 acres and Oklahoma 3,783,954 acres.
