London admitted today that British and Greek defenders of Crete are gradually being crushed by weight of numbers and the constant pounding of Nazi level and dive bombers.

Germans have landed an estimated 30,000 sea-borne troops on Crete, and the Greco-British defenders today had been forced back to positions 10 to 12 miles each of Suda Bay, British naval base, and No. 1 Nazi objective.

The paralyzing thought to Englistmen was that the British had occupied the island for six months, and still are unable to choke off a completely air-borne attack during which the invaders used only light artillery, also air-borne, and few if any tanks.

London also admitted that the English naval units around Crete have been badly smashed by the Nazi air force and cannot forever smother German attempts to land sea-borne troops. They have prevented such landings so far.
