## Let © Get Together On The Weather:

"By George, all this rain would sure be fine if a fellow could divide it up and have it when he wanted it." This statement coming from a farm friend served to remind us that the weather has always been difficult to control.

Right now, strange as it may seem, there is a demand for dry weather. We can't remember this happening in the Panhandle before. There have been times when we would have liked to see so much mud in the fields and on the highways that it would have been impossible to get a Farmall more than ten feet away from its stall. And we've never seen a Farmall bogged down in Texas Panhandle mud.

The suggestion we would like to make about the weather is that if you can't control the clouds it might be wise to try a little control over the wind. We always have wind and when we harness it up we realize just how important it is.
