JAKEHAMON, Sept. 22 .-Pioneers of Jakehamon who waited for dawn of the day set for the opening of the new townsite on the Hamon & Kell railroad found the sale six hours old and the townsite map looking like a smallpox patient in the second week.

By 8 a. m. \$148,000 worth of lots had been sold. When day broke the rush had shoved the total past the \$200,000 mark.

# WALK OUT IN BIG CITIES; EXPECTED BE NATION WIDE

PITTSBURG, Sept. 22.—The struggle between organized labor and employers of the steel industry is in full swing oday. In Pittsburg and the nearby districts many thousands of men obeyed the strike order and failed to report for work when the whistle blew.

No estimate is yet available as to the number of men out here. Reports from Cleveland state that union leaders claim 15,000 workers are idle there and some of the independent plants are closed. At Youngstown and Steubenville, Ohio, it is indicated that practically all plants are either badly crippled or forced to suspend en-

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—The Illinois-Steel company's plants in Chicago are closed today with only a few foremen remaining. It is estimated by union officials that 95 per cent of the 4,000 men of the day shifts failed to report for work today. No official figures, however, have been given out.
