GREAT DIMENSIONS. The oropesed new structure will have dimensions of 120x82 feet, according to the present plans. It will be constructed on the institu-tional plan, having ladies' parlor, kitchens, rest rooms, vreading rooms and other institutional features. It is believed the church will fill a long felt need in Ranger, especially since no plans have been formulated for the entertainment of the masses. The entertainment afforded by the new institutional church will be for the uplift of every man, woman and child.

The pastor, Rev. Mr. Edgar M. Wisdem, is much clated over the cutlook and looks forward with great anticipation to the hour when actual work will take place, which should be within five to six weeks after the contract has been awarded.
