BAPTIST CHURCH EXCAVATION IS NOW FINISHED

Excavation on the new \$85,000 Baptist church being erected just west of the intersection of Marston and Wagon streets has been practically completed, and the foundation will soon be laid for the big pillars to support the superstructure. The excavation of this plot was one of the most difficult which has been encountered in this section due to the almost continuous solid rock from the surface down to a depth of approximately ten feet.

Material for the walls of the church is arriving daily and being loaded at the site. A number of these frames have also been removed. Excavation is continuing in certain parts of the base. Crushed rock has been assembled for the columns.

The great accumulation of earth and stone taken from the spot has been used in filling in low spots nearby. The small creek to the west has been filled, allowing only a small channel for flood waters to pass by. Much property has been improved by reason of the filling-in process.

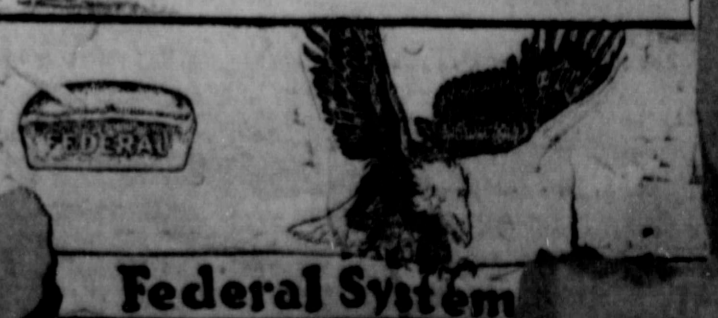

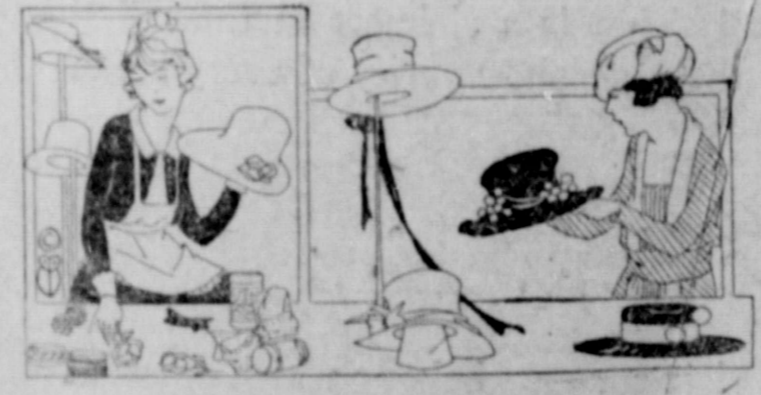

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BACK THE RAILROAD. Despite delays in straightening up questions of right of way and cost, and inducements which would have made it a financial gain to transfer the headquarters of the Hamon & Kell railroad to another town in this section, the railroad will go through Ranger. Grading is being done now for the crossing of the Texas & Pacific tracks, three-quarters of a mile north of the Main street Texas & Pacific crossing.

A few citizens, keen enough to realize the value to the city of the north and south road, which one man has characterized "the most valuable acquisition Ranger has made since the discovery well was drilled," have underwritten the cost of right of way.

If they are held to pay the amounts they guaranteed, they will pay dearly for their civic patriotism. 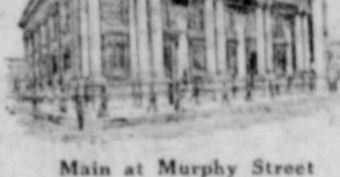

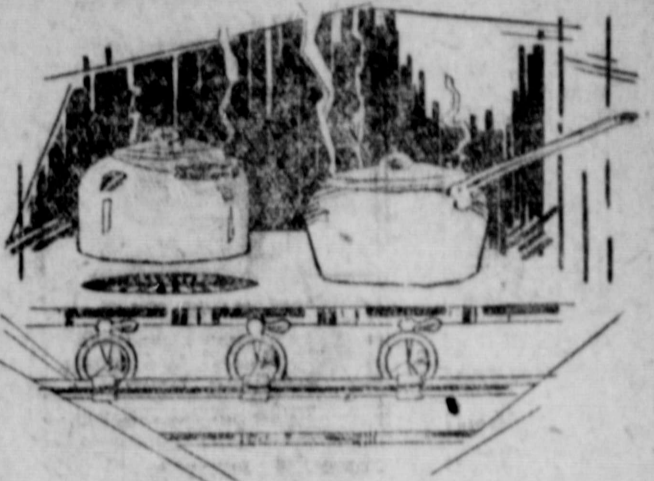

TRIED TO UP THE BRITISH FLEET

LONDON, Oct. 1.—German U-boats tried to bottle up the British Grand Fleet in the Firth of Forth during the latter part of the war, says a London paper which describes this as the most ambitious tactical operation undertaken by the enemy sea craft.

The scheme aimed at the blocking off of the entrance to the Forth by the sowing of big minefields. Three months of hard work were devoted to the task by a considerable number of submarines, the mines being laid in the shape of a half-moon. But mine-sweepers had discovered the plan and, as fast as the mines were planted, they were cleared away.

It is recalled that other similar attempts to trap the fleet were made in 1915 in the Moray Firth, when over 300 mines were laid, and in 1914 at the Orkneys. In round numbers, on these three occasions, the Germans laid 1,100 mines at a cost of \$1,000 each. The King Edward was the only fighting ship that fell victim in these mine operations.

HAMILTON WELL HAS FAVORABLE CHANCE TO WIN

News from Abilene that the Hamilton well of the Beaver Valley Oil company had penetrated and passed through a stratum of sand more than fifty feet in thickness, producing oil, leads a number of local oil men to predict that a good well is to be brought in there within a short time.

Hamilton well was spudded in Rad luck at the outset is a well omen, oil men say. With a well of \$5,000 in a bank guarantee that the well would be produced within a short time, everything was ready for the initiation at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

A gasket blew out water and steam in the well. It was necessary to wait a distance of two or three miles and the spudding-in process was not accomplished until late in the evening.

According to geologists, who examined and reported on this territory, the Ranger sands and the Barkly-nott-Elctra sands cross in the valley, being separated by the Hamilton well. Gas is escaping from the earth in a number of places in this territory, as was demonstrated by geologists and oil men familiar with the simple methods employed to demonstrate it. The Hamilton well is in a small valley in the Texas mountains, which here are depressed only twice. Buffalo Gap, one of the historic spots of West Texas, a small village, occupied one of the gaps in the mountains.

THIRTEEN LAMPASAS TESTS HAVE SHOWING OIL AND GAS

LAMPASAS, Oct. 1.—Thirteen deep-test wells drilling in this county are down about 1,000 feet. The St. Mary's, the Groves and the Howell have struck gas and oil in small quantities.

The Howell well is reaming with forty feet of oil in the hole and is said by drillers to produce from 50 to 100 barrels of oil as it stands.

The St. Mary's, closed for repairs, has struck the second strata of oil sand and considerable gas and oil resulted.

The Groves well has passed through forty feet of oil sand.

The Nelms-Marvin is drilling between 1,000 and 1,100 feet. This well has passed through oil sand, but now is in hard rock.

The Western Lampasas Oil company, on the John Boyd ranch, has derrick and will spud in this week.

The Wax-Tex well on the White ranch has derrick up and will spud in within a few days. It is owned by W. V. Abilene people.

The Key is still closed down at 550 feet.

The Smith, on Smith ranch, is preparing to resume drilling within a few days.

The Allison Taylor in East Lampasas has derrick up.

The two wells of the New York Syndicate on the county line, are down 1,100 and 1,600 feet, have lost tools, but will be drilling again within a few days.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Public demand for luxuries continues unabated according to the September report from the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago on business conditions in the Seventh District. In the language of the statement luxuries "are being grabbed up faster than they can be produced."

"The people will have jewelry and they will have the costliest," the report continues. The watch factories cannot keep up with orders, particularly because it is impossible to obtain materials and efficient labor. Prices would go higher but for the policy of one dominant factor, stated thus: "We do not want to see this vicious circle of advanced prices and costs go on any longer."

The demand for silks the report says "is characterized as 'extravagant.'"

Evidence is seen in the Middle-West of "a rather marked disposition to dilutions, notwithstanding the fact that they are due primarily to the war." This is indicated, it says, by owners of land, seeking to raise the present prices of farm products, are exacting higher rentals, and leading for higher acreage prices, and by the appeal of the Illinois Agricultural Association and the Indiana Federation of Farmers to hold their live stock and grain until "the same market has re-established itself." If the latter movement becomes widespread, it is declared, it would be a measure defeat efforts to readjust living prices to a lower level.

But business in the district is said to be "very good" and "retailers are selling all the goods they can get, at high prices, making enough money to cover the increased cost of doing business."
