



Duke of Devonshire Sells Town House for Hotel Site

LONDON, Oct. 28 .- Te sale of the Duke of Devonshire's town house to a real estate syndicate for \$5,000,000 is the latest of the scats of the old pobility to pass into the hands of outsiders. The parchaser of this London home of the governor general of Canada is an American syndicate and it is reported that a hotel will be

creeted upon this site. Devonshire House was crected nearly two centuries ago, in 1738, at a cost of about \$1,000,000. It is one of the most important and historic of the old London mansions, with gloomy exteriors and splendid interior, which Thackeray and the other Victorian novelists made the stage settings of their most impressive passages of London life. It stands with characteristic British disregard for display, its back to London's chief thoroughfare, Piccadilly, its porches facing a spacious garden worth some dellars a square inch. Lansdowne House, the town place of the Marquis of Lansdowne, which commands an even larger garden, is the nearest neighbor and that is re-ported to be in the market, also.

The Governor General of Canada od the Marquis of Lansdowne both own three or four country estates as well. The yare at the front of the great landed proprietors of the king-dom, and the duke's palace named Chatsworth in Berbyshire, is one of the most magnificent private estab-lishments in the world, surpassed by nothing in Britain except Windsor

Germany Building Tanks to Use in Plowing the Fields

(International News Service)

BERLIN, Nov. 29.—Art cle 171 of the peace treaty stipulates that Germany shall not build tanks for war purposes, but their construction for peaceful use is not prohibited.

A number of German factories have been building tanks for agricultural purposes—plowing, mowing, haulage, etc. Some inquisit ve workmen of other factories became suspicious of certain frameworks and armored plates which were being constructed at their own workthops, and careful investigation revealed the surpr sing fact that there frameworks and plates fitted exactly with the agricultural tanks, which in a few hours' time could be converted into fighting tanks.

This is not the only way in which the militarists are trying to violate the treaty, but it is probably one of the most striking, and emphasizes the danger of the Pan-Germans and Monarchists attempting to

Even the socialistic members of the government admit that the danger is growing rapidly. It is already too late to avert the danger expected from the eastern divisions, which the government apparently
