

NATION-WIDE FREIGHT EMBARGO MAY BE DECLARED, TYING UP NATION

METHODISTS TO HAVE TWO NEW PASTORS HERE

Rev. E. M. Wisdom, who has been pastor of the Ranger Methodist church for the last two years, will become pastor of the Moody Methodist church as a result of the conference assignments at Waco last Sunday. He is preparing to leave Ranger at once to take charge of his new work.

The new pastors here will be L. A. Webb, who has been pastor at Brownwood for the past year and prior to that presiding elder for three years of the Weatherford district, with headquarters at the Parker county seat. In addition to the regular church here the conference saw fit to establish at Ranger a mission with Rev. C. E. Wilkins in charge. He will probably institute a small mission church in the city limits and will do missionary work in the oil camps in the vicinity of Ranger. He is reputed to be a splendid worker.

Methodists will take a solemn leave on life in Ranger with the strengthening of the work by the addition of another pastor.

Stephens Co. Wells Making Small Flows

Stephens county wells, in the Ranger district, have not been making any large dent in the total production recently. A sextet of completions totals between 100 and 200 barrels. Stanton Oil company's Suddeth No. 1 is reported a completion with sand 3,412 to 3,418, total depth 3,418 and making fifty barrels, with some water. Phillips Petroleum company has completed three on the Isles, none of which were a producer. No. 1 was shot from 3,415 to 3,450 feet, with 100 quarts and is showing water and gas. No. 2 was shot with 270 quarts from 3,402 to 3,500 feet, total depth 3,700 and is swabbing water. No. 2, was shot from 3,429 to 3,490 with 270 quarts and is swabbing water.

Monitor Oil company has a good pumper on its Ingram No. 2, after a 100 quart shot from 3,462 to 3,502 feet. The well is making fifty barrels and will be tubed and pumped. Ingram No. 3 was shot from 3,436 to 3,490 feet with 150 quarts and made several flows. The well is inactive now.

Harris Oil syndicate's Coffman No. 1, is drilling at 3,450 feet with a showing.

COAL MINERS ARE STILL OUT AT THURBER

PORT WORTH, Nov. 18.—Half of the striking miners at Bridgeport returned to work today, according to a telephone message from Ed Cunningham, former president of the miners of this district.

Others in the coal fields of Texas will return when the cotton season closes.

The miners at Thurber have not yet returned, according to reports reaching here.

General Company Hitting the Ball in Paving Streets

With fair weather as a co-worker, the strike trouble at the brick plant smoothed over and no further difficulty in getting cars. The General Construction company is pushing ahead with the paving contract in most shapes. Delayed for a month a half by bad weather on the two blocks on Main street, the last few days of bright weather have permitted the company to complete the paving between Rusk and Marston streets.

A full gang is now at work on Austin street, between Main and Walnut, and according to Secretary-Treasurer H. J. Naylor, concrete will be poured early next week. The next block to be paved will be Austin between Main and Pine.

Though the company has been subjected to many criticisms, it should be credited with starting Ranger on the right path toward good paving, as it was through the company's objection to the first contract that the revised state statutes were submitted to the voters and made available to the city. It is under those statutes that all future paving work will be done.

Supt. A. M. Campbell, in charge of the General Construction company's paving Ranger, is working to prove to Ranger that some of the criticisms which have been made were not justified and that under fair working conditions, his company and his men can do things done.

RANGER LACKS MEMBERSHIPS IN RED CROSS

Co-operation of the Queen, Liberty and Lone Star theaters with the Red Cross Sunday added \$353 to the total which Miss Mary Ann Cross and Sub-Chairman R. H. Hansford have been collecting in the added days of the drive.

At the Queen theater, Miss Cross had entire charge of the show. Major H. S. Cole, manager of the Lone Star theater, made a four-minute talk at the Liberty theater and Miss Cross and her helpers made personal appeals to the audience. Sergeant J. M. Hicks of the 89th Division told what the Red Cross had done for him when he was wounded in France, to sympathetic listeners at the Lone Star theater.

School children whose classes showed 100 per cent enrollment in the Red Cross were given free admission to shows at the Opera House last week through the courtesy of the management, who have received the thanks of Miss Cross and Mr. Hansford. The workers also want to express their gratitude to the Queen, the Lone Star and the Liberty theaters and to Major Cole and Sergeant Hicks for their help in the drive Sunday.

Texas Rys. Can Haul Liquor Soon

AUSTIN, Nov. 18.—A blanket permit to all Texas railroads under federal control to transport and deliver intoxicating liquor will be issued as soon as the form is approved by the attorney general, the state comptroller announced today.

TRAFFIC RECORD TO THE OIL FIELDS

PORT WORTH, Nov. 18.—A record was established during the last ten days for the number of less than carload shipments to the North and West Texas oil fields, according to local freight officials.

During that length of time twenty-six cars were forwarded to Ranger while twenty-six were shipped to Wichita Falls.

FASTEST GROWING PAPER IN TEXAS

That The Daily Times is popular in Ranger was shown on the "washday" of newspapers—Monday—when L. S. (Babe) Arrington, street circulator, with his army of "newsies" disposed of 3,002 copies of The Times on Ranger streets. This does not take into consideration the large circulation which goes to Eckland, Cisco, Abilene and other points in the nation, also local deliveries. Arrington is known over the nation as the "ripple" newsboy, having sold newspapers in every town of any size in the union. He is a permanent "fixture" on The Times' force.

Vulcan's No. 4 C. P. Hamor is Shallow Well

Vulcan Oil company's C. P. Hamor No. 4, which ran on a shallow sand at 1,980 feet last week, will be developed as a producer at that depth. The hole is standing full of oil and making a small flow every twenty-four hours. The boiler is being moved back and the well will be drilled into the pay this week. This is the first shallow producer south of the States' Harrell.

The Hamor tract is 200 acres, joint operation with the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company, and is located four miles west and a mile north of Ranger.

STEEL MILLS AT GARY RUN AT NORMAL OUTPUT

GARY, Nov. 18.—The steel mills at Gary today are running at their normal capacity for the first time since the strike of the steel workers officials announced today.

REGARDLESS OF U. S., TREATY TO BE ENFORCED

PARIS, Nov. 18.—Regardless of the American government's attitude, the peace treaty will be put into force, according to the prevalent views.

Peace conference officials have received notification of the report that President Wilson might withdraw the treaty from the United States senate.

STEEL MILLS MUST CLOSE IF EMBARGO IS ON

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Nov. 18.—The steel mills of Mahoning valley would have to close within ten days under the general freight embargo, officials said today.

The local fuel director says that the district has less than ten days' supply of fuel, including the domestic supply.

WOULDN'T TALK TO GOVERNOR OF KAN. ON STRIKE

PITTSBURG, Kan., Nov. 18.—August Dorsey, vice president of district 146 United Mine Workers of America, today declined an invitation to meet with Governor Allen and talk over the coal situation.

He said that he had no authority to discuss the question of the miners returning to work.

Louisville Not to Hear Kreisler

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 18.—The proposed appearance Thursday of Fritz Kreisler, Austrian violinist, has been cancelled by the Louisville Fine Arts League upon complaint of the local chapter of the American League.

The legion officers said the action was based upon a resolution adopted by the national convention at Minneapolis, which condemned all efforts to generate sympathy for Germany or her allies through operas, plays, performers or artists of the enemy countries.

MAYOR DOUBLES WATER STORAGE HAGAMAN LAKE

Ranger's usable water supply will be doubled by an addition to the dam at the lower end of Hagaman Lake, which Mayor M. H. Hagaman is having constructed. The present height of the dam, thirty-six feet, is being increased to forty feet by the use of 10,000 yards of dirt. Water storage in the basin will be increased from 200,000,000 gallons to 250,000,000 gallons. This amounts to doubling the capacity as the water near the bottom of the lake which cannot be used.

This improvement is being made by mayor Hagaman himself. For the time being, it goes a long way toward meeting the question of water to supply Ranger's growing needs.

According to an inspection which the mayor made this morning, the Ranger Waterworks company's filtration plant is about ready for operation. The completion of the plant, expected some time ago, was delayed through a change of plans. Concrete work at the station is complete and a pump house is being erected.

OMSK CRIMES WILL STAGGER ALL HUMANITY

VLADIVOSTOK, Nov. 18.—A memorandum embodying the (Zeech) situation in the Siberian situation has been delivered to the allied representatives.

"Unbearable conditions cause us to ask the allies to consider means for the safe conduct to the motherland, which the allies have promised," the document says. "Military authorities of the government at Omsk are permitting criminal actions that will stagger the entire world. Burning of villages, the murder of masses of peaceful inhabitants, the shooting of hundreds of persons of democratic convictions, and all those suspected of political disloyalty, occur daily. The responsibility for this will fall on the peoples of the world, inasmuch as they possess sufficient strength and do not prevent this lawlessness."

Paris Papers Break Records

PARIS, Nov. 18.—Records of the circulation of daily newspapers here were broken Monday when 6,000,000 copies were issued.

The Press de Paris distributed the papers and the "copy" was centralized at the office of the Petit Parisien.

15,000,000 WORKMEN WOULD BE THROWN OUT OF WORK IMMEDIATELY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Director General of Railroads Hines and seven regional directors will meet here late today to consider the necessity of declaring a nation-wide freight embargo to conserve the country's supply coal.

If Hines approves of the recommendations of the regional directors the order may be issued immediately, closing all non-essential industries, and cutting passenger service throughout the country 40 per cent.

Fifteen million workmen would be thrown out of employment.

POLICE HONOR BROTHER SHOT IN DOING DUTY

Bill Shamblin, who was placed under arrest Sunday night following the shooting of Alf Jordan, a former Texas ranger and a recently appointed member of the police force, waived preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace J. E. T. Peters and was remanded to the custody of the sheriff without bail.

At the inquest held yesterday by Judge Peters a verdict was returned that Alf Jordan met his death by pistol wounds inflicted by Bill Shamblin.

The body of Jordan was sent to Texarkana today by the Millford Undertaking company. The entire available police force turned out to act as an escort to the train. Friends of Jordan from Texarkana, accompanied the body.

Bill Shamblin, who was wounded by Jordan after the latter had been shot three times, was able to walk yesterday afternoon. His wound is very slight. Feeling over the tragedy ran high in this city yesterday and there were threats of lynching.

Investigation into the case has failed to develop any personal difference existing between Jordan and Shamblin. The only explanation advanced for Jordan's failure to draw on Shamblin when he saw him approaching, gun in hand, is that Jordan did not want to kill Shamblin in the presence of the latter's wife.

City officials and members of the police force escorted the body of Alf Jordan to the train yesterday.

Active pallbearers were officers Thompson, Hunt, Coggin, Hamilton, Denning and Stillwell.

Honorary pallbearers were Mayor Hagaman, Messrs. A. Davenport, Mills Davenport, T. G. Deffenbach, M. R. Newham, A. G. Armstrong and George Hemmingson.

Roy Denning, a recently appointed member of the police force, accompanied the body of Jordan to Texarkana, his former home. Friends from Texarkana also accompanied the body.

I. C. C. RATE MAKING BILL IS VETOED BY PRES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—President Wilson today vetoed the bill restoring to the Interstate Commerce Commission its prewar rate making powers.

Chairman Cummins, author of the bill, declared that it was unlikely any attempt would be made to pass the bill over the President's veto, as the rate-making power will be restored to the commission when the roads are returned to private operation January 1.

U. S. CITIZENS IN MEXICO SHOULD BE PROTECTED

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 18.—The Government was criticized for its attitude toward Mexico and laborers demanding a 30-hour week were denounced at the convention of the American Mining Congress here today.

A resolution by Walter Douglas of New York protested to the State Department against "further disregard by the American Government of conditions in Mexico that make it unsafe for American citizens there."

Douglas recommended that the United States take immediate steps to insure the constitutional rights of American citizens, protect them on our own borders and go with them throughout the world.

Recalling that forty-five Americans engaged in mining in Mexico were murdered since 1910 and that eighteen of these murders occurred since 1916, "after the United States had recognized the present government," the resolution declares that "no steps have been taken by the United States in these matters to have provided constitutional protection to its citizens."

DEADLOCK IS STILL ON OVER MINE SCALES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Negotiations between the bituminous coal miners and operators of the central competitive fields continue at a standstill, the operators again obtaining a postponement of the joint conference of the wage scale committee on the ground that their counter-proposals have not yet been completed.

These Editors Hanged in Effigy

BRUSSELS, Nov. 18.—Directors and editors of the Germanophile newspaper Bruxelles, condemned to death as traitors, were publicly executed in effigy before the city hall today.

The death penalty exists in Belgium, but never has been carried out except in effigy.

Senate Passes Reimbursement

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Legislation authorizing the creation of an equipment trust to reimburse the government \$100,000,000 for locomotives and cars bought during the federal control of the railroads was passed by the senate today and sent to the President for approval.
