### NOTHING FROM WILSON ON PACT UNTIL DEC. 1ST

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—President Wilson will take up the whole matter of the subject of the treaty of Versailles in his message to congress Dec. 1, it was stated officially at the White House today.

Until then the President will have nothing to say concerning the senate's action in rejecting the treaty.

Before Congress convenes it was said that Administration senators will confer and it is possible that the military reservations of the Republicans will participate with a view of working out an acceptance of a compromise on reservations.

Regardless of who is elected to succeed late Senator Martin as Democratic leader in the Senate, there will be change in the leadership of the treaty fight, it was said today at the White House.

President Wilson considers that Senator Mitchell conducted the fight for the treaty ably.

### WEEK EXPECTED TO BE RECORD FOR BUILDINGS

Building is reaching a high note in Ranger with the first extensive dry spell of six months. Building permits issued today aggregated \$21,025, which is about the daily average this week.

### OKLAHOMA TO MAKE BIG FIGHT FOR OIL LANDS

FORT WORTH, Nov. 21.—Following the failure of the conference between the governors of Texas and Oklahoma over the Red River boundary dispute yesterday, it is probable that the attorney general of Oklahoma will go direct to Washington to seek the appointment of a trustee to take charge of the oil properties in the disputed area; the trustee being empowered to operate the properties.

Oklahoma also is expected to ask prompt court preventing further litigation between the two states. Texas, it is believed, is opposed to both steps.

In the meantime Texas Rangers remain in possession of the disputed property.

### PEACE TREATY TO BE RATIFIED DEC. 1 AT PARIS

PARIS, Nov. 21.—The Supreme Council today agreed upon December 1 as the date when the German peace treaty will be formally ratified.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—The increasing coal shortage began today to menace additional industries and threaten slightly the nation's food supply with further prospect of the curtailment of passenger traffic within the next 24 hours.

**STATES MAY TAKE CONTROL OF THE MINES**

OLUMBUS, Nov. 21.—Recognizing the necessity of some decisive action which will place the coal mines in national hands, Governor Cox telegraphed Governor Harding of Iowa today that if the federal government does not intervene and operate the mines in case of the failure of the mine operators to reach an agreement at the Washington conference the states will have to take charge of the mines.

### RUSS REBELS ENCIRCLE CITY OF MOSCOW NOW

LONDON, Nov. 21.—Moscow is surrounded by insurgents and the Bolsheviks regard the rebellion in the city of importance, according to a Copenhagen dispatch, which states that Tomburg, in the Urals has been seized by a hostile army of 55,000 men.

### 10,000,000 Oil Co. at Shreveport

Howard of the Home Oil Refining company of Texas, Grant Gillette of Texas, and H. M. Gillette of Louisiana.

### DEADLOCK IS GROWING IN THE MINE MEETING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Bituminous coal mine operators served today what was practically an ultimatum on the miners' representatives, telling them that the offer yesterday of 15 cents a ton and a 20 per cent wage increase was the utmost that could be given.

The miners went into conference immediately to consider the offer. After the miners' conference, President Lewis announced that no conclusion had been reached.

**450,000 MEN IN 3 YEARS CAN "CLEAN" MEXICO**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—State department officials discussing the Mexican situation today disclosed that three years ago the army general staff estimated that an army of 450,000 men and three years would be required for complete intervention in Mexico by the United States. The present estimate is understood to be less due to the new instruments of warfare and the enormous increase in American war material.

### INSURANCE FOR BOOZE NOT TO BE ISSUED AT N. Y.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Thefts of liquor have become so numerous that many large insurance companies have decided not to issue any more specific liquor policies.

### 2nd Largest Steel Mills May Close

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Nov. 21.—The mills in Mahoning and Shenango valleys, forming the second largest steel producing region in the country, today faced the possibility of being forced to close on account of a shortage of coal.

Orders were issued by local fuel director Murray cutting off supplies to all factories.

**TO PUT TREATY INTO EFFECT DESPITE U. S.**

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The inability of the United States representatives at Paris to deposit President Wilson's ratification of the peace treaty at the same time that those of the other powers are filed, will not prevent the remaining allied associated powers to carry the treaty into effect," said Andrew Bonar Law, government leader in the house of commons, today.

### NO DECISION ON WAR-TIME PROHIBITION UNTIL DEC. 8TH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Final argument as to the constitutionality of war-time prohibition was before the Supreme Court of the United States today.

No decision is expected until the court reconvenes December 8, after a recess beginning next Monday.

**CALL FOR CONDITION OF 950 STATE BANKS.**

AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—A call for the financial statements of the 950 state banks and trust companies at the close of business November 17 was issued today by the commissioner of banking and insurance.

The banks are given a ten days in which to file their statements.

**COTTON GINNED.**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Cotton ginned prior to Nov. 15 amounted to 5,577,826 bales lint, including 83,643 round bales; 17,067 bales of American-Egyptian cotton and 4,226 bales of Sen Island cotton, the census bureau announced today.

### SOVIET RUSSIA FACES FAMINE AND BLOODSHED

ARCHANGEL, Nov. 21.—The situation in soviet Russia daily is getting more serious.

In several towns workers are without employment and are desperately hungry. As a result they have revolted against the Bolsheviks.

No sugar is obtainable anywhere in Russia. The red terror is spreading throughout the country, the red army is becoming demoralized and the troops, torridly mobilized, are deserting. Fugitives are arriving at Archangel, bare-footed and in rags.

### KANSAS CITY TO BE OUT OF COAL BY TONIGHT

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 21.—The available coal supply of the Kansas City market will be exhausted by tonight.

Drastic regulations will be necessary.

**U. S. Naval Officer Drowns in Rio Bay**

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 21.—Lieutenant Commander Lathrop attached to the United States naval mission in Brazil, was attacked with heart failure, while bathing in Rio Bay, recently, and was drowned.

**U. S. Exchange Worries Britons**

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The condition of American exchange is causing anxiety in trade circles as the prevailing rates mean a tremendous premium has been paid by British buyers for goods purchased in the United States.

### STANFORD NO. 2, NORTH OF FRANKELL, MAKING 6,000 BARRELS DAILY

Hamon & Kell's new townsite of Frankell, to be opened Dec. 8, hopped into the oil limelight today with authentic report from Stephens county of the completion of the biggest well since the Sinclair's Manning, two miles due north of the location of the new town. It is Stephens county's leading well this month, a 6,000-barrel gusher.

Stewart & Samuels are the operators, on the J. D. Stanford tract, 320 acres, in section 20, block 6. The No. 2 well was shot with 200 quarts from 3,288 to 3,376 feet, and made 5,000 barrels the first day. The second twenty-four hours production went to 6,000 barrels, pipe line run figures. The No. 1 well of the same operators is a completion, but not a big boy.

Texas company has large holdings in this section, the W. L. Carey tract, 425 acres; R. O. Jackson, 160 acres; A. C. Spear, 160 acres; H. D. Truesdale, 140 acres, and L. W. Wright, 80 acres.

Swensonsdale Oil company, on the P. Swenson farm, shot its No. 4 well with 100 quarts through a shallow pay, from 1,785 to 1,881 feet, and has a 400-barrel well. This farm is three miles northeast of Cotton Plant.

### TWO SOUTHWEST WELLS GUSHING NOT COMPLETED

Two wells to the southwest of Ranger not yet completed, are adding a couple of thousand barrels to the field's new production. R. O. Harvey on the Mrs. B. F. Cotton, a mile north of Olden, is drilling at 3,394 feet in the No. 3, and making a flow estimated at from 65 to 90 barrels an hour. Top of the sand is 3,379 feet. The tract is 100 acres between the Magnolia T. W. concession on the north and N. B. and W. A. Harris farms on the south.

Riley Drilling association also secured with No. 1 on the Sue farm, which adjoins the Cotton farm on the southwest. The well is reported by scouts to be worth from 500 barrels upward, with sand from 3,474 to 3,478 feet.

### STAYED FROM ENFORCING DRY ACT IN ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 21.—Federal Judge Pollock today granted a temporary injunction against the district attorney and the internal revenue collector from enforcing the provisions of the Volstead act, pending further litigation.

In effect Judge Pollock sanctioned the lifting of the lid on beer in St. Louis. The order is made operative at once.

Judge Pollock held that beer of non-intoxicating alcoholic content was not intoxicating.

**CLAIM TEXAS GAS PUMPS ARE SHORT MEASURE**

AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—Gasoline pumps of practically all filling stations in Texas are giving short measure, according to a statement today from the department of weights and measures.

Proprietors are being warned that short measuring subjects them to heavy penalties, and their pumps may be confiscated and destroyed.

### NATIONAL BANK CALL MADE FOR NOVEMBER 17

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The comptroller of the currency today called for the condition of national banks at the close of business November 17.



# THIS PRIEST AIDED EDITH CAVELL IN WORK

LONDON, (By mail)—Exploits of Father Meens who warned London of impending German air raids during the war and who worked with Edith Cavell, the martyred British nurse in aiding British prisoners to escape from Belgium have just been disclosed by the Roman Catholic periodical, The Universe. Father Meens, who lived in Brussels, was associated with the Allied Intelligence Department.

Once he disguised himself as a cattle driver and, making his way to Ostend, found the hiding place of the German submarines.

Air raids to England, the priest learned, were usually preceded by a dinner of the officers of the Zeppelins and Gothas. By pretending to be a pastry cook he discovered when the dinners were to be held. Carrier pigeons carried his message to Holland, and before 8 p. m. the British admiralty would have word of the coming raids.

Escaped British prisoners seeking Nurse Cavell proceeded, disguised, to Brussels and were met there by a

little girl of eleven. She used to carry a big doll, run about and play and look in the shop windows. Without any sign on her part of recognizing the soldiers, she would lead them to the house where Nurse Cavell awaited them. There the men were bandaged transformed into "hospital patients" and turned over the "Baron Janssen," otherwise Father Meens, who took them across the frontier.

On the night of Nurse Cavell's arrest, Father Meens had been sent to Holland to carry a message for Cardinal Mercier, thus escaping death, as he had arranged to meet at midnight two other conspirators, both of whom were taken and shot.

## FAVORITE OLD BOSTON TAVERN CLOSES DOORS

It's a fact. The old tavern, established back in 1795 by "Old Jimmy" Wilson, Boston town crier, to combat New England rum and gin with ale and porter, has succumbed to prohibition.

Daniel J. O'Connor, manager of the Bell-in-Hand, says he hopes to re-open. Perhaps a soda fountain will be installed to combat the influence of near-beer. Who knows?

# D'ANNUNZIO IS POSSESSOR OF QUEER TRAITS

LONDON, (By mail)—Gabriele d'Annunzio's seizure of Fiume and issuance of an ultimatum of defiance to the world—has brought out many stories in England concerning the alleged eccentricities of the Italian poet-warrior. Among these are the following published by John O'London's weekly.

"If the artistic temperament is the hall-mark of the self-conscious showman, d'Annunzio has it to a supreme degree. It manifests itself in many ways. He is the possessor, for instance, of a wardrobe which might make a Hummel envious.

"Like the elder Dumas, he is a rapid worker. On one occasion he completed a play containing 3,000 verses in seventeen days. He finds that he works best at night, and his usual procedure is to start after dinner, at about eight o'clock, and write on steadily until nine the following morning. Then, after a light breakfast, he retires to bed for the remainder of the day.

"A fondness for strange pets is one of his characteristics. Some

years ago he tamed a small salamander and kept it three years. On its death d'Annunzio burst into tears. It was solemnly buried under a large mantle-piece of the vault in which is closed by a black marble slab, upon which in letters of gold are inscribed the words, "scatula salamandrisae sacrum."

"At one time he kept over forty horses in Florence. One of the strangest of his pets, however, is a "oldfish, on which he has bestowed the name of Lou-Pe-Li-Tel. Of this curious inmate of his household d'Annunzio has declared that 'it possesses the two qualities most rare in life—it is clean and silent.'

"The subject of death looms large in all his writings, and he has already built a tomb for himself among the Anconines, not far from the source of the river Pescara, to which so many references are made in his works."

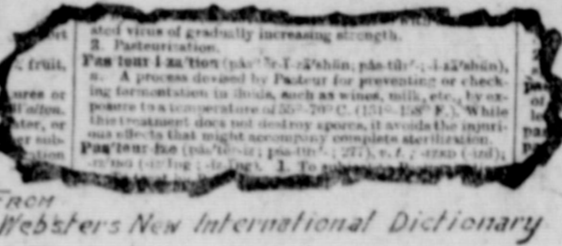

## WESTERN UNION DOING BUSINESS OF GREAT CITY

A. A. Davis, district commercial manager for the Western Union Telegraph, with headquarters in Dallas, is in the city inspecting the company's business and planning for improved service in keeping with the Western Union's unswerving policy.


Mr. Davis said that business has been phenomenally good in West Texas this year. The company at present has three gangs of linemen putting on cross-arms and stringing new wires into Ranger oil fields. The company has established lines to Decadema and Breckenridge at enormous initial expense in order that the people may be served efficiently regardless of expense imposed.

He is pleased with the outlook at Ranger and declared this morning that the telegraph business at this point was in volume as large as that transacted in any settled city of 100,000 inhabitants in the United States.

"The company is finding it increasingly difficult to secure Morse operators for its stations," said Mr. Davis this morning. "This in spite of the fact that the company at present is handling more than forty per cent of its business by means of the typewriter-telegraph invention known as the multiplex."

"Business is constantly on the increase in Ranger," he said. "It has been necessary in the last few months to install additional operators and clerks. The service here has been improved as rapidly as was possible. The company is now paying its messengers 25 cents an hour and will continue to increase this force in order to facilitate the delivery of telegrams. In a short time, when sidewalks and streets have been finished, the company will put on a special messenger service commensurate with the demand and along lines employed in the larger cities of the nation."

Mr. Davis intimated that the company is preparing to make some wonderful changes in Ranger in the near future as soon as building conditions justify. However, he said that these plans had not developed sufficiently.

### OLDEN PLANS BIG BUILDING PROGRAM SOON

By Leroy A. Wilke.  
OLDEN, Nov. 21.—Construction of several new streets, installation of a street lighting system, and telephone exchange, and plans for the erection of an apartment house, to cost approximately \$12,500, were the principal topics of discussion at the regular session of the Olden Chamber of Commerce and Olden Building Club.

In every way, the meeting was the largest and most enthusiastic ever held by the two organizations, and a large number of new members were present.

Reports from the committee on streets and sidewalks showed that several hundred feet of new streets are being constructed and graded, and that work is proceeding rapidly on the laying of a large stretch of sidewalk between the T. & P. depot and the business section of the town.

Plans whereby the entire town will be lighted by natural gas also are under construction, and it is expected that within two or three weeks Olden will have a "great white" gas system to no town in the West Texas fields.

A telephone exchange, with connections to accommodate every merchant in the city, also will be installed in the near future, following a report of the committee to the effect that long distance connection is now being established.

Details of the plan for the erection of an apartment house, to contain sixteen apartments, at an approximate cost of \$12,500, were outlined, and definite action will be taken in the matter at the meeting next week, when detailed plans and specifications for the building will have been completed.

Reports of the building club committee showed that three new residences are nearing completion, and will be ready for occupancy of tenants by next week. These houses are being built by the building club, and are of practically fireproof construction.

Merrill E. Brown, state industrial secretary of the Y. M. C. A., with headquarters in Houston, was a guest at the meeting, and outlined in a brief talk the aims of the Y. M. C. A. in the oil fields, and told of the establishment of four buildings already, at Olden, Caddo, Breckenridge and Burkburnett, and the proposed erection of other buildings at Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Desdemona and other oil field towns.

A number of committees were named, and other business of a routine nature disposed of. Following the meeting, an informal turkey dinner was served.

### Y. M. C. A. DOES GREAT WORK IN THE OIL FIELDS

EASTLAND, Nov. 21.—Activities of the Young Men's Christian Association, throughout the oil fields, through the establishment of industrial recreation centers is being very received, and the popularity of these centers is attested by the response which have been met by the association's campaigns for both members and funds for the work.

Four buildings already have been erected in the Texas fields, according to Merrill E. Brown, State Industrial secretary of the Y. M. C. A., who is now making a tour of inspection through the fields, and several other buildings are being projected.

The first building to be completed and opened for oil field workers was at Caddo, where opening exercises were held August 29. This work is in charge of Samuel W. Lothlin, secretary, who is enjoying large success in his work.
