Even with that, however, it's a reasonably cheap fare out of the Southwest Conference jungle.

Uncle Mat says most people think that the guy who first used the expression "Drop Dead," was a suburban undertaker looking for business. Similarly, people are certain that Horace Greeley said, "Go West Young Man," that Mark Twain said, "Everyone complains about the weather but nobody does anything about it," and P. T. Barnum said, "There's a sucker born every minute."

As a matter of fact, if you care for facts, none of the statements quoted above were made by the men to whom they are now attributed.

The guy who really advised the young people to scam toward the setting sun was Soule, editor of the Terre Haute Indiana Express. Soule wrote an editorial about opportunities in the west for young men in 1851 and concluded by saying that no better advice could be given by the great Greeley than "Go West, Young Man."

Ever since that time Greeley has collected the acclaim for the crack. It got to the point where Greeley himself reprinted a 13 editorial written by Soule, giving the credit where it was due. In spite of this, however, the attribution remained.

The crack about the weather was not made by Mark Twain but by his cousin Cyril Clemens as explained by Charles Dudley Warner. Warner made the remark in an editorial he wrote for the Hartford Press and Courant.

The remark about a sucker being born every minute was not made by Barnum but by his circus rival Adam Forepaugh. During a review in the late eighties Forepaugh made the remark and was asked if he could be quoted. Fearing public reaction he told the reporters it was one of Barnum's favorite slogans which he was borrowing.

Barnum thanked his rival for the publicity.

Seemingly despondent after two consecutive losses, the Ranger Junior College Rangers roared back into the thick of the Pioneer Conference race Saturday night by downing the Tarleton State Ploowboys, 13-6, in Stephenville.

It was more than sweet revenge for the Rangers who were edged by Tarleton 14-13 in a homecoming tilt last year. The Ploowboys then went on to sew up the loop favorites to repeat this year.

Sparkplug of the Ranger defense was Eastland track star J. D. Hansen, who suited out only three weeks ago, and turned in a sterling performance at three backfield positions.

Even though he didn't score any one of the Rangers' two touchdowns, his yards rushing in 16 attempts kept the Ploowboys reeling through the four quarters.

With Hansen leading offensively, Jim McCurry, the Rangers' sole captain, Eddie Joe Jones, Joe Rosentritt, and two starting guards, Buddy Caddell and Teidy Henderson, who saw most of the action at those positions, defensively stymied Tarleton's torrid ground attack.

Ranger took the lead in the contest in the first quarter on a one yard plunge by Sherman Adcock after his teammates consumed 60 yards in a sustained march. Harold Cartwright, halfback, converted.

## District 7-A Title At Stake Friday Night

### Ranger-Cross Plains Seek Conference Bid

Ranger's Bulldogs, fresh from their 45-4 victory over Rising Star Friday night in their first conference outing, seem destined to field an injury-free starting squad at Cross Plains Friday in what is expected to be the battle for the District 7-A flag.

The starting eleven came out of the Rising Star contest unscathed even though John Swinney, a reserve halfback, chipped a bone in his knee and will be lost for the season.

Weeding out of the weaker teams in the title chase got down to earnest last week. Gorman and Rising Star, with three confer-

ences losses in as many title contests, were mathematically eliminated for consideration.

The results of the Ranger-Cross Plains contest should give the winner nearly a strangle hold on the top position even though the Eastland Mavericks can not be counted out as yet. The Mavericks have one district win in their first round of district competition and is expecting little trouble with Rising Star Friday.

So already the district race shapes up as a three team affair. With Rising Star and Gorman already disposed of and Wylie, who is expected to finish near the cellar, and with a 1-1 conference record now, the picture of the top three teams is now practically complete and will be nearly settled following Friday's outcome.

Scout reports indicate that Cross Plains is about on the same level as Ranger offensively or as far as their passing attack is concerned anyway.

For the Buffaloes have done little in as far as aerial wizardry is concerned.

The Bulldogs likewise have done little passing this season to any success until Friday night's encounter with Rising Star when they completed seven of 18 attempts for 170 yards. Even then the Wildcat pass defense was even poorer than poor.

However, the Bulldog's passing may have improved enough at this point to give them a few more teeth in their offensive game.

The season-long weaknesses has not been so much by the triggermen but rather in the receivers. Jerry Wharton emerged as the number one receiver in the Rising Star contest and his catches with the hard-working, steady and dependable end, Jerry Cantrell, may solve the passing problem.

### C-C Guest Speaker, Top School Pioneer

Dr. Laurence DeFee Haskew, who will be principal speaker at the Chamber of Commerce's annual banquet, Nov. 3, is vice president for developmental services College and Education dean of the University of Texas.

Born in Perote, Ala., in 1907, he attended Emory University in 1922-26, receiving the Bachelor of Philosophy degree. He was elected to Phi Beta Kappa Scholarship fraternity and Sigma Delta Chi journalism fraternity. He played basketball and was art editor of the campus newspaper and yearbook.

Dr. Haskew holds Master of Arts (University of Chicago, 1934) and Doctor of Philosophy (University of Georgia, 1941) degrees, and has done graduate study at several other major universities.

Dr. Haskew came to the University of Texas in 1947 as College of Education dean. Since that time enrollment in that college has more than doubled, and many outstanding scholars have been added to the faculty. The University of Texas' College of Education is now consistently recognized as one of the top 10 in the U. S. In September, 1954, Dr. Haskew was appointed by the University's Board of Regents to the post of vice president for developmental services.

School and college administration and teacher education are Dr. Haskew's chief professional interests. He was technical consultant to the Gilmer-Aikin Committee of Education in Texas, 1947-48, which resulted in legislation reorganizing the public school finance system for the state.

As executive secretary of the American Council on Education's Committee on Teacher Education, 1945-48, he visited colleges in 40 states. In 1946, he also served as technical consultant for the President's Commission on Higher Education.

Although busy with many professional duties, Dean Haskew also is a leader in civic and religious affairs in the Austin Community. He has served as president of the Austin Council of Churches and teaches a Sunday School class of college youth.

He is married and has two children, Mrs. Rosemary Lowrey and Larry Haskew.

The frost here this morning was light and spotty and was not a "killing frost."

First "killing frosts" usually fall in this area around the middle of November, varying a few days either before and after usually.



**Woman's Society of Christian Service Has Second Session In Mission Study**

The Woman's Society of Christian Service met at 3:30 Monday, Oct. 24 at First Methodist Church for the second session in the current mission study, "Revolutionary World."

Mrs. J. L. Turner discussed "The Hunger of the Body," telling of farming in India, land reform in Asia and the experiences of a farmer in Manila.

Mrs. B. S. Dudley, Jr. whose subject was "Hunger of the Mind" stated that 1 in 10 adults in India can read at present. She told of the literacy movement and the work of Dr. Labour with the natives in New Guinea where the greatest ambition is political freedom and the motto of the missionaries is "each one teach one."

Mrs. R. L. Willis spoke on "Hunger in an Atomic Age," saying that humanity is so divided that one country is ignorant of the other. She told of mission work with the Mau Mau tribe in Kenya; white prestige in China and the experiences of a mechanic in prayer for peace. She told also of the United Nations vision of unity including 60 nations.



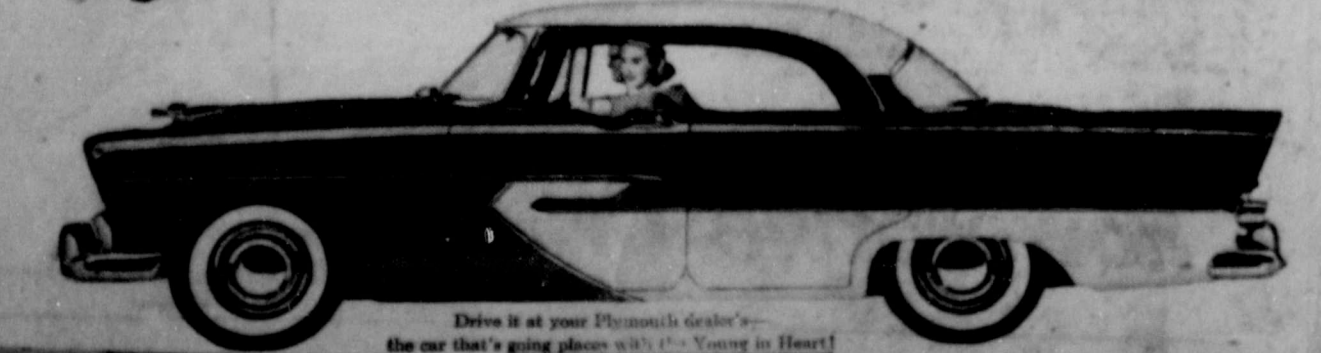
