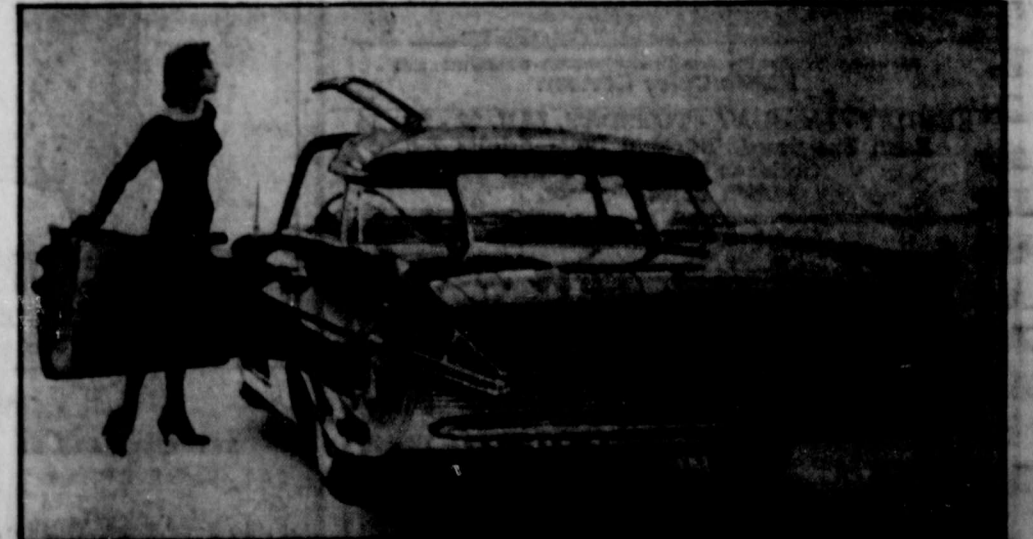

Hatch Amending Bill Explained

The House of Representatives this week passed a bill to amend certain provisions of the Hatch Act, which governs the political activities of federal employees.

Chairman Omar Burleson, of the committee on house administration which handled the legislation, explained that this bill, HR 3084, would free those state and local public employees now subject to the act, and return them to the full jurisdiction of their state or local employing agency. As the Hatch Act now operates, it applies to state and local employees if their principal employment or activity is financed, even in part, by federal funds.

Chairman Burleson said, "The federal government all too often intrudes too far into the rights and prerogatives of our state and local government operations, and

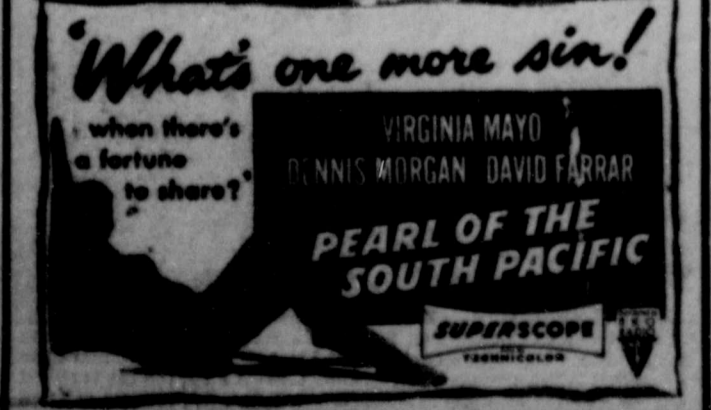
